Mendelson, who has been with the ADL since 2000, evaluates the activity and tactics of extremist groups and movements, training the law enforcement community and publishing reports on a wide range of extremist topics. To date she has trained over 12.000 federal, state and local law enforcement officers, prosecutors, military personnel, judges and public officials throughout the country.

She has testified in numerous court cases on the white supremacist and sovereign citizen movements. She has shared her expertise with national and international media outlets on topics related to domestic terrorism, include CNN's Headline News, CBS's 48 Hours, the BBC and many other media outlets.



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Changing Hate and Violence

From the CEO

Is there anything we can do to change the hate and violence that permeates the news and impacts our lives? Our country suffered the deadliest attack against Jews in U.S. history, at a time when anti-Semitism is on the rise. We are not imagining it. Statistics confirm that anti-Semitic acts are on the increase. The good news is that all over the country people are fighting hate, standing up to promote tolerance and inclusion. More often than not, when hate flares

up, good people rise up against it — often in greater numbers and with stronger voices. But is it enough to keep us safe?

Many efforts have been launched since the Pittsburgh atrocity, here as well as across the country to keep Jewish communities safe. As we have reported in past months, our Federation is working with Secure Community Network (SCN) and local Law Enforcement to shore up security at synagogues and other local organizations.

These security measures address our immediate safety, but the lingering uneasiness isn't resolved by law enforcement and security at the entrances of our events. That uneasiness is mitigated when we come together as a Jewish community, as "Jewish congregation" in its most

inclusive sense. We gain strength and resolve when we come together in pursuit of a shared vision.

Our tradition compels us to work together to continually improve ourselves and the world around us. It calls us to serve others with kindness, to pursue justice, to welcome the stranger, to protect the vulnerable, and to instill our shared values in the next generation.

Our work is more important than ever. At a time when hate is taking a devastating and deadly toll on our country, we must strive to bring our highest ideals to life. This work is already underway here and around the country. Together, we are building a community that cares for one another, that stands with each other and for each other, that treats everyone with dignity and respect. We are building a community that welcomes people of all abilities and

backgrounds, that strengthens the bonds we have with each other, with Israel, and with the global Jewish people. We are building a community that honors Jewish tradition while receptive to changing expression.

Most important, we are building a community that acts as a force for good in the world. When we ask "where do we go from here?", the answer must be that we come together as a community to light the way forward. 

Rep Ilhan Omar appointed to House Foreign Affairs **Committee**

Minnesota congresswoman Ilhan Omar was named last week to the House Foreign Affairs Committee. The BDS-supporting rep, who accused Israel of 'evil doings,' announced excitement at appointment to committee that 'oversees all foreign assistance, national security affecting the country's foreign policy, treaties, peacekeeping and war powers."

In a strongly-worded letter sent to House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, the Coalition for Jewish Values (CJV), representing over 1000 traditional rabbis in matters of public policy, called the appointment of Representative Ilhan Omar to the House Foreign Affairs Committee a "slap in the face" and "tantamount to saying that anti-Semitism is acceptable to the United States House of Representatives." The CIV called for Omar to be removed from the committee, and compared her situation to that of Representative Steve King, who was stripped of all committee assignments by Republican leaders despite denying an endorsement of white nationalism attributed to him and sharing in its condemnation.

As detailed in the CIV's letter. Omar declared that Israel "has hypnotized the world" and prayed that "Allah awaken the people and help them see the evil doings of Israel" when Israel defended itself against an unprovoked Hamas missile barrage aimed at civilians in 2012. On CNN this week, Omar defended these comments and said they were aimed only at the "Israeli regime.



Machine Learning IDs Blood-Cancer Cells Earlier Than Ever


Discovery might help multiple myeloma patients receive earlier and more precise treatment and prevent relapse.

Israeli researchers have developed a new technology that profiles the genetic makeup of cancerous cells, allowing for better diagnosis and treatment.

Multiple myeloma is the second most-common type of blood cancer. Multiple myeloma occurs when plasma cells in the bone marrow – the cells that produce antibodies – proliferate out of control and lead to organ failure and death.

A major stumbling block in diagnosing myeloma is that each patient is unique and current blood tests are incapable of identifying early disease onset and classifying which patient should receive which treatment.

This is the problem researchers from the Weizmann Institute of Science and clinicians from Israeli hospitals wished to solve.

Using machine-learning approaches to automatically identify malignant cells out of tens of thousands of cells, their method sequences the RNA in thousands

of individual cells from patients' blood or bone marrow, capturing the specific gene program that is active in each individual cell.

Their research, recently published in Nature Medicine, found that while the plasma cells of healthy individuals are similar to each other, myeloma cancer cells are extremely heterogeneous.

This makes it possible to identify even a small number of malignant cells in the blood at an early, pre-cancer stage, allowing for more precise diagnosis and the ability to make better-informed choices about treatment.

In the future, the discovery might help multiple myeloma patients receive earlier and more precise treatments, avoid relapses and be monitored with blood tests that are far less painful than today's painful bone marrow biopsies.

"We are entering an era in which measuring big data and using machine learning will provide clinicians new insights and understanding into devastating diseases like multiple myeloma," says Dr. Assaf Weiner of the Weizmann Institute of Science's Immunology Department.

Weiner was the lead author of the paper along with Guy Ledergor. The paper's 33 authors are mostly Israeli, along with several scientists from New York, Arizona and Spain.



Israel outranks US and South Korea for percentage of citizens aged 25-64 holding a degree in higher education, whether academic or vocational.

Israel is the third most educated country, according to 2017 data compiled by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). OECD calculated the percentage of each country's population between the ages of 25 and 64 who have completed a two- or four-year degree beyond high school – including both academic and vocational programs.

The data shows that 50.9 percent of Israelis in the target age bracket have a higher-education degree. The report noted that Jewish Israelis enter college at a later age than most Western counterparts because most serve in the military for at least two

years after high school.

The United States came in at No. 5, with only 46.4 percent of its population in the target age group having completed a higher-education program – even though half of the world's top-ranking universities are American.

South Korea came in at No. 4, with 47.7% having completed a higher-education program, but it tops the list of most educated people aged 25-34 (66.6%).

Japan is No. 2 (51.4%) and the most educated country in the world is Canada (56.7.%) – although Canada faces an overeducation, underemployment problem.

WIESENTHAL, a Play About the Renowned Nazi-Hunter, Starring Award-winning Actor Tom Dugan

Theatrical producer, Jay Kholos, brings the critically acclaimed oneman play Wiesenthal to the UCR Palm Desert Campus stage on Saturday March 9, at 7:30 p.m. The internationally acclaimed actor and playwright Tom Dugan portrays Nazi hunter and concentration camp survivor who made it his life-long pursuit to bring over 1,100 Nazi war criminals to justice.

The 90-minute play relates the details of a few of Wiesenthal's investigations. Among them are the pursuit of Franz Stangl, the former commandant of the Treblinka death camp, arrested in Brazil in 1967 and sentenced to life imprisonment for the mass murder of 900,000 people; Adolf Eichmann, a major organizer of the Holocaust, arrested in Argentina and hanged in 1962 in Israel; and, when challenged by Austrian Holocaust deniers to prove that Anne Frank actually existed, he tracked down Karl Josef Silberbauer, the officer who arrested Anne Frank and her family sending them to concentration camps.

The play was written by and stars Tom Dugan, who researched Wiesenthal's character and conducted worldwide searches for war criminals for a year to write this play.


"While Wiesenthal is known for dedicating his life to memorializing the millions of Jews who were killed in concentration camps by hunting down their murderers, many people are still not so familiar with the justice he served," said Jay Kholos, Producer, with North American performances scheduled in over 150 venues for 2019. "This is a powerful

and compelling production that takes the audience beyond history books to better understand some of the complexities of the aftermath of the Holocaust." Wiesenthal died in his sleep at age 96 in Vienna on September 20, 2005.

Immediately following the performance, actor/writer Tom Dugan and a representative of the Simon Wiesenthal Foundation will conduct an engaging post show Q&A.

Israeli Drone Dome Rescues London Airport from Shutdown

Rafael's Drone Dome pinpoints a suspicious drone and jams the radio frequencies used by its operator to control it, rendering the UAV unable to move.

After mysterious unmanned aerial vehicles caused 36 hours of paralysis at London's Gatwick Airport in late December, stranding more than 100,000 travelers, the British military saved the day with one of six Drone Domes it had purchased a few months earlier from Israel's Rafael Advanced Defense Systems.

the suspicious drone and jams the radio frequencies used by its operator to control it. The UAV then either flies out of control or crashes to the ground. The system incorporates cutting-edge technologies including electrooptics, radar and signal intelligence.

The Drone Dome system reportedly has been used to protect against hostile drones during battles against ISIS in Mosul and eastern Syria. Drone Dome can be operated

from a stationary or mobile position. The UK Ministry of Defence was its first foreign customer.

Friday night, two people were arrested in connection with the UAV incident, and by Saturday Gatwick began functioning again following the cancellation of 1,400 flights due to the drone disruption.

Report: In Letter to Pompeo, Palestinian Authority Forgoes All US Aid, Fearing New Anti-Terror Law

The Palestinian Authority has reportedly informed the United States government that it is waiving all American financial aid due to a recent anti-terror law that could open PA officials to lawsuits.

According to Israeli daily Yediot Ahronot, Palestinian Prime Minister Rami Hamdallah informed the US of the decision in a letter sent to

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo in December. The letter directly connected the PA's decision to the 2018 Anti-Terrorism Clarification Act (ATCA), which would expand the jurisdiction of American anti-terror laws, giving victims of terrorism the ability to sue any entity responsible for providing funds for terrorist activity.

The law applies in particular to countries that receive aid from the US, making the PA vulnerable to potentially huge financial damages.

A number of lawsuits against the PA brought by terror victims and their families are currently pending. Damages have not been claimed so far because the US lacked jurisdiction over the PA. The ATCA is deliberately

intended to change this.

According to Yediot, the withdrawal from receiving aid would likely have a significant impact on the Palestinian security services and their coordination with Israel, as much US aid to the Palestinians has already been cut. The primary remaining aid is for security, in the amount of \$61 million annually.

Ohio Doctor Seeks Forgiveness from Jewish Community for **Anti-Semitic Tweets**

The Ohio doctor, who came America, meaning, under scrutiny recently after a number of anti-Semitic tweets she wrote were unearthed, has issued an apology.

Lara Kollab — a graduate of the Touro College of Osteopathic Medicine — has faced calls for the revocation of her medical license over dozens of tweets she made between 2011 and 2017, including a 2012 threat to "purposely give all the yahood the wrong meds." The Arabic term "yahood" means Jews in English.

Other tweets the time period which same documented by the were anonymous website Canary Mission, before they were deleted — claimed that the Holocaust "exaggerated," alleged that "Zionists are the spawn of Hitler," and expressed support for the Palestinian-led boycott, divestment and sanctions (BDS) campaign against Israel.

In one 2013 tweet, Kollab wrote, "look, Haifa is sweet (nice), but it's

it wasn't that special to me," according a translation by Canary Mission, which aims to expose anti-Semitic and anti-Zionist bigotry.

The Cleveland Clinic. where Kollab worked as a supervised, first-year medical resident starting this past July until September, confirmed that her "departure was related to those posts."

In her apology Kollab wrote, "Several social media comments posted on my twitter account years ago have surfaced recently, causing pain, anguish, and a public outcry. I wish sincerely and unequivocally to apologize for the offensive and hurtful language contained in those posts. This statement is not intended to excuse the content of the posts, but rather to demonstrate that those words do not represent who I am and the principles I stand

have gotten a bad rap. In a lecture to over 250 fascinated attendees at UCR/Palm Desert on January 15th, Gal explained why he feels differently. "Although artificial intelligence is a young technology - it's only been around a few years – it has taken such a strong presence in our daily lives and it doesn't communicate very well with people. We are used to communicating with other people as team players," said Gal, who is head of BGU's Human Computer Decision-Making Lab and an associate in Harvard University's School of Engineering and Applied Sciences. His work investigates representations and algorithms for making decisions in heterogeneous groups comprising both people and computational agents. He has worked on combining artificial intelligence algorithms with educational technology aimed at supporting students' educational efforts and teachers' understanding of students' learning strategies.

"The vision of both these groups their achievements truly represent a chance for Israeli hope," he said.


BGU President Prof. Rivka Carmi noted that "nanotechnology, electric cars and brain research are very important. But if there is one thing



Former Women's March Leader Upbraids 'Anti-Semite' Linda Sarsour for Posting Article Claiming Jews Are Waging War on Black People

Anti-Israel activist and Woman's March co-chair Linda Sarsour was excoriated as an "anti-Semite" on January 20th by a former ally who once headed the DC chapter of the popular political movement.

Mercy Morganfield, who is also the daughter of famed American blues singer-songwriter Muddy Waters, took to Facebook to upbraid Sarsour after the latter posted a link to an article that accused the Jewish community of waging a "profound war on black people."

Alpha Radiation Startup Eliminates 70% of Cancerous Tumors

Now going into clinical trials for specific types of cancer, Alpha Tau's technology shows potential for treating any solid tumor.

A breakthrough Israeli technology that eliminates cancerous tumors in 70 percent of cases was nearly lost in bureaucracy and university politics.

Professors Yona Keisari and Itzhak Kelson of Tel Aviv University discovered a way to use alpha radiation to destroy tumors. Their approach was revolutionary – alpha radiation is so powerful it can snap both strands of a cancer cell's DNA, but it won't harm surrounding healthy tissue as other types of radiation do.

However, alpha radiation can't travel more than about 50 microns (1/20 of a millimeter) inside human tissue. Treating a tumor of, say, 5cm would require hundreds of thousands of short ranged alpha-emitting sources – a seeming impossibility.

Keisari and Kelson discovered that, when delivered via a particular isotope of the element radium, alpha radiation can travel as far as 3mm. The isotope, Radium 224, releases atoms that diffuse inside a tumor and then emit their own alpha particles. This approach enables the much farther distribution of alpha particles to kill entire tumors.

The professors and Tel Aviv University patented the technology in 2003. More research was conducted and 12 peer-reviewed papers were published. But squabbling between the various stakeholders over the intellectual property kept their breakthrough in limbo until 2015 when Uzi Sofer was recruited to sort things out.

Sofer had an impressive track record in medical technology. He previously co-founded and served as CEO of Brainsway, which develops treatments using transcranial magnetic stimulation (TMS) for depression, PTSD, OCD and other brain disorders and addictions. The company grew under his leadership from two to 70 employees.



Alpha Radiation Therapy on Malignant Tumor

Realizing what the professors had, Sofer formed a new company – Alpha Tau (the "Tau" stands for Tel Aviv University) – to further develop the technology. Earlier this year Alpha Tau raised \$29 million from Shavit Capital, Medison Ventures and Our Crowd.

Stimulates immune system

Alpha Tau is the only company to use alpha radiation to treat solid tumors. All other types of brachytherapy (where a sealed radiation source is placed inside or next to the area requiring treatment) use beta or gamma radiation.

"But that only causes a singlestrand break in the DNA, from which the cell can recover," Sofer explains. "And it's not as focused. As a result, it causes a lot of side effects and destroys healthy tissue."

When the healthy tissue around the tumor is not destroyed along with the cancer, the immune system is stimulated to recognize and attack the same type of tumors elsewhere in the body. These kinds of metastases are the cause of death for 85% of cancer patients.

"We believe that DaRT technology has tremendous clinical value not only in destroying the tumor but preventing cancer from spreading to other organs," Sofer says.

Clinical trials

Thousands of animal studies have been done on the company's Alpha DaRT ("Diffusing Alpha-Emitters Radiation Therapy") technology.

The first human trials of Alpha DaRT have been taking place in Israel

and Italy for squamous cell carcinoma (SCC) tumors, a form of skin and head and neck cancer.

Further clinical trials of DaRT for all types of skin cancer (Cutaneous and Mucosal malignant Neoplasia – CMN) are planned for 2019 and will take place in Israel, Italy, France, New York and Montreal.

Trials for other indications are currently in process and expected to be initiated in the next 3-6 months in Montreal and New York, US (pancreatic and skin cancer), Obninsk, Russia (breast cancer), Cambridge, UK (vulvar) and Israel (prostate cancer). Additional trials will later be initiated for more than 20 other indications – such as cervical, renal and colon cancer – at medical centers in more than 25 countries.

"It's amazing to see patients who have been told their life expectancy is in weeks get treatment under local anesthesia and, 60 days out, they're clear, they have no evidence of any tumors."

"Once approved by the regulatory authorities, we can treat any kind of solid tumor," Sofer tells ISRAEL21c, "including cancers where there is no other chance and this is a patient's last chance to live."

Pancreatic cancer, for example, today has no cure; patients usually die within five years of diagnosis. Alpha Tau's DaRT "seeds" may be able to flip that prognosis.

"In our SCC studies, we were able to eliminate more than 70 percent of the tumors entirely and to cause shrinkage of 100 percent of the tumors," Sofer says. "Encouraged by these promising results, we hope to eliminate pancreatic tumors as well or to shrink them so that it will be possible to remove them surgically."

Personalized treatment kits

Despite the power of alpha

radiation, it's actually safer than conventional beta or gamma treatments.

"You don't need so much radioactivity to get the same effect," Sofer explains. "We can ship our treatment kit to hospitals almost in regular boxes. Patients can be treated in an outpatient setting with no radioactive shielding."

After less than a week, 50% of the alpha radiation will already be gone from the body. In two weeks, there will be no radioactivity left at all.

However, once a DaRT kit is assembled (for example, a patient with breast cancer might need 12 needle applicators with 6 DaRT seeds in each) it must be sent to the treatment facility fast.

"If for some reason a patient doesn't come on time, the next day you'll need to put the whole kit in the trash," Sofer says.

Because of DaRT's fast decay, Alpha Tau will need to build production facilities close to the main treatment centers. The first one is already working in Israel. The company has received approval to build a facility in Massachusetts. The third will be in Japan with a fourth in Europe, Sofer says.

Under Sofer's leadership, Alpha Tau now has 26 on staff in Israel, including the professors who invented the core technology. Following clinical testing, Sofer hopes Alpha DaRT will receive its European Union approval by 2020 with the US and Japan coming in 2022.

"We are already saving lives in the trials," he says. "It's amazing to see patients who have been told their life expectancy is in weeks get treatment under local anesthesia and, 60 days out, they're clear, they have no evidence of any tumors. OpEd: Why the US Diaspora Misunderstands Israel

Israel is meant to be the nationstate of the Jewish people. But for some time now, we have been hearing that the US community is distancing itself from Israel.

The links are becoming more tenuous because the assimilation rate is now more than 70 percent. Most Jews in the United States have even been called "non-Jewish Jews." Many adhere to universal, not particularist values, that some claim will in the end destroy Judaism itself. The US Diaspora predominantly belongs to the Conservative and Reform streams of Judaism. The "Women of the Wall" controversy has only served to introduce more tension in the relationship between the United States and the Israeli government.

American Jews are well known for their overwhelming support for the Democratic Party. As the old adage goes, they earn like Episcopalians and vote like Puerto Ricans. This has already put them in conflict with Israel's interests. President Barack Obama's 2015 Iran deal did not seem to dent Jewish support for him. Similarly, so hostile do most Jews feel towards US President Donald Trump that when Trump has made pro-Israel decisions, such as moving the US embassy to Jerusalem, they have hesitated to support him. (The General Assembly of Jewish Federations of North America, when convening in Israel, always meets in Jerusalem, but this year moved the venue to Tel Aviv.)

As we saw with the tragic events at Pittsburgh, American Jewry has a problem with anti-Semitism, but it's a problem that it sees coming from the far-right, exacerbated by Trump's populism. However, there is also a pernicious anti-Semitic anti-Zionism

now penetrating the left. Jews in general are seen to enjoy power and "white privilege," despite their history as an oppressed minority and ethnic origins in the Middle East. The new vogue for "intersectionality" pointedly excludes Jews.

What does the Diaspora find alienating about Israel? Eric Goldstein, CEO of UJA-Federation of New York, recently criticized the Israeli government for its treatment of the Palestinians, its attitude towards asylum-seekers, and the dominance of the Orthodox rabbinate in Israel.

But these concerns show a fundamental misunderstanding of Israel and of the conflict. Progressives (and not just in the United States) think that the two-state solution would fulfill Palestinian aspirations. In reality, the ultimate Palestinian objective is the "right of return" — overrunning Israel proper with Arab refugees. They believe that time is on their side.

The US Diaspora also misunderstands what makes Israelis tick. Israeli support for Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is a response to rockets and terror tunnels. But many Israelis view the Palestinian jihad as just the latest chapter in a long story

of Arab and Muslim anti-Semitism predating anti-Zionism. Anti-Jewish hatred goes to the very heart of the conflict.

Most Jews are in Israel because of the Arabs, not the Nazis (although Arabs and Nazis were allied during World War II). They vote for Netanyahu because of this legacy of bitterness and mistrust. Arabs will only respect a strong Israel, they believe. These Jews, their parents, and their grandparents left Arab countries due to pogroms, institutionalized inferiority, and state-sanctioned laws. Most left as destitute refugees with a single suitcase. Israel rescued them. Jews in the West may take their freedoms and rights for granted. Jews from the Middle East and North Africa do not.

When the United States — and indeed, the Western press and media — does focus on Mizrahi Jews, it is to promote the folklore that passes for Mizrahi history —

Czech President Disavows Two-State Solution, Calls for One State of Israel

Czech President Miloš Zeman also continues to support the Czech Republic moving its mission from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem.

On a visit to Israel, Czech President Miloš Zeman, expressed his doubts that the creation of a Palestinian state would be helpful in solving the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

"I was inspired by your idea about one state with two nations. And I know this idea is provocative. Any big and great idea is provocative," Zeman told President Reuven Rivlin during an official meeting in Jerusalem.

"I wonder what will be your arguments for this idea because for many, many decades, there is a discussion about two independent states," he said. "But frankly, I do not see an independent state in Gaza because I understand Hamas as a terror organization and not as a state."

As part of his trip, Zeman inaugurated the "Czech House" in Jerusalem, which is generally accepted to be a first step before inaugurating an official Czech embassy in Jerusalem.

"In the current situation, our friendship is more important than ever," Rivlin told Zeman. "We welcome your support for the eventual move of the embassy of the Czech Republic to Jerusalem. Jerusalem is the city of peace. "May peace begin in Jerusalem, and may it spread from Jerusalem to all the world."

In April, Zeman announced that the Czech Republic would begin the process of moving the Czech mission from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem.

Zeman addressed Israel's Knesset and laids a wreath at the Mount Herzl military cemetery in Jerusalem. He also visited the Yad Vashem Holocaust memorial museum and had lunch with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu.

The Czech embassy has been located in Tel Aviv since 1949. Israel and the Czech Republic have enjoyed diplomatic relations except during the years of the Communist regime in Prague between 1967 and 1990.



Number of Countries With Whom Israel Has Diplomatic Relations Reaches All-time High with Resumed Ties with Chad

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Chadian President Idriss Déby on January 20 announced the reestablishment of diplomatic relations, bringing the number of countries that Israel has formal ties with to a record of 161.

"Chad is a very important country, and very important for Israel," Netanyahu said during a joint appearance with Déby at the N'Djamena's presidential palace. "There is a lot that we can do together. We discussed ways to deepen our cooperation in every field, beginning with security, but also agriculture, food, water, energy, health and many more. We are being welcomed here respectfully, just as we welcomed

President Deby with great respect in Israel," he said. "Israel is breaking into the Muslim world. This is the result of a great effort during the last few years. We're making history, and we're turning Israel into a rising world power."

Chad severed ties with Israel in 1972 due to pressure from Libyan strongman Muammar Gaddafi.

Déby said his country and Israel had agreed not only to renew diplomatic ties but also to increase bilateral cooperation in a wide range of fields. "Chad will do everything it can to strengthen the ties between the two countries and the bilateral cooperation in various matters," he said. Déby also reiterated that Chad's renewed commitment to relations with Israel does not negate his support for the Palestinian cause. "Our friendship to Israel does not replace our concerns on the Palestinian issue. We are in favor of advancing a peace process between Israelis and

Palestinians. And therefore I renew my call on the State of Israel to engage in a peace process... based on previous agreements," he added. He concluded his remarks by wishing for Israel to "live in peace and security next to a Palestinian state."

The last country to renew diplomatic ties with Israel was Nicaragua, in March of 2017. The Central American country had severed diplomatic relations seven years earlier, in protest over an incident during which violent pro-Palestinian activists and IDF troops clashed aboard the Gaza-bound Mavi Marmara ship.

Before taking off for N'Djamena, the prime minister alleged that Iran and the Palestinians were trying to prevent Israel's diplomatic push. "This is very disturbing and even causes outrage in Iran and among the Palestinians who are trying to prevent this. They will not succeed," he told reporters. He called his half-day visit "another historic and

important breakthrough" that is part of a "revolution that we are doing in the Arab and Islamic worlds."

Netanyahu also indicated that additional Muslim countries in Africa would soon warm up to Israel. "There will be more major news. There will be more countries," he said, without elaborating.

Chad is located in a potentially strategically important place for Israel, as it could enable Israeli aircraft to shave off several hours in flight routes to Latin America (though for this to happen Israel would also need to get overfly rights from Sudan, which does not appear imminent).

Netanyahu's flight, which had to skirt Libya and Sudan, lasted nearly eight hours, despite N'Djamena being only 3,000 kilometers (1,800 miles) from Tel Aviv. Rather than flying directly, Netanyahu's Boeing 747 took a huge detour, flying over Ethiopia, Kenya, Uganda, the Democratic Republic of the Congo and the Central African Republic.

Netanyahu has traveled three times to Africa in the last two years, visiting Kenya, Rwanda, Ethiopia, Uganda, and Liberia.

He regularly vows to expand ties with all countries on the continent, including those that do not have diplomatic relations with Israel.

In July 2016, the Republic of Guinea, a small, overwhelmingly Muslim country in West Africa, renewed diplomatic relations with Israel, after it had cut ties with the Jewish state in 1967.

Since then, Netanyahu has met with leaders of additional African Muslim-majority states, such as Mali and Somalia.

170,000 Anti-Semitic Searches Made on Google Each Year in UK — Study

New report found sharp rise in number of searches after Labour head Corbyn met with Jewish leaders on anti-Semitism in his party, but some were result of Google autofill

Some 170,000 searches containing anti-Semitic content are made each year in the United Kingdom, according to a new study published Friday.

The report, released by the Community Security Trust and Anti-Semitism Policy Trust, said some 10 percent of these searches included violent language or intentions, with "evil" and "racist" being the negative terms most commonly searched in connection to Jews.

However, the number of searches for "Are Jews evil?" dropped by 10% after Google removed the phrase from its autocomplete function, which the study said showed the search giant caused more people to make more anti-Semitic searches than would have otherwise.

Most of the anti-Semitic searches on Google were for jokes

about Jews and the report noted that those who looked up Jewish jokes were more likely to also search for racist jokes about other minority groups. Queries with the word "Jewish" were less likely to be anti-Semitic than those with "Jew."

The area of the UK with the highest number of anti-Semitic searches was Wales, according to the study, while such searches were just as common in cities which primarily vote for the opposition Labour Party as those that mainly support the Conservatives.

The report recorded a 79% jump in anti-Semitic searches in April, with most of these coming the day after Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn met with Jewish leaders to discuss rampant anti-Semitism in the party's ranks.

Labour has grappled with allegations of anti-Semitism under

the leadership of Corbyn, who himself has regularly come under fire for a series on incidents, including his remark about British Zionists not understanding irony, his attendance at a memorial for Palestinian terrorists, and Labour's reluctance to fully adopt May. the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance's (IHRA) definition of anti-Semitism — a move which, when finally adopted, he unsuccessfully attempted to undermine by seeking a caveat asserting that branding Israel a racist endeavor is not anti-Semitic.

He has also come under fire for his soft treatment of anti-Semitic statements made by party allies.

The study, which included data from 2004 to 2018, also recorded a 25% rise in searches for "Zionism" in April 2016 after former London

mayor and Corbyn supporter Ken Livingstone claimed Nazi dictator Adolf Hitler supported Zionism "before he went mad and ended up killing 6 million Jews." He was later suspended by Labour over the remarks and quit the party in May.

Other notable findings from the study was that searches for the Rothschilds, a Jewish banking family that is the subject of many conspiracy theories, were higher than for a number of contemporary Jewish celebrities, and that there was a 30% jump in anti-Semitic searches after Israel won last year's Eurovision Song Contest.



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US Military Purchases Israeli Missile-Defense Systems

The Trophy consists of a radardetection system that recognizes incoming missiles and projects their trajectories, with launchers that shoot metal pellets, causing the incoming missile or rocket to explode away from the tank.

Court Rules Ultra-Orthodox Party Must End Ban on Women within 21 Days

Though coalition's Agudath Israel agrees to change regulations, it stresses move is 'symbolic' and 'devoid of meaning,' as its rabbis won't allow women to run regardless

The High Court of Justice instructed ultra-Orthodox party Agudath Israel on January 10 to change its party regulations within 21 days to allow women to run for office, in line with an agreement reached in September on the matter. Currently a clause in the regulations stipulates that only men may run on the platform.

Agudath Israel along with the Degel HaTorah party forms United Torah Judaism in the Knesset, and sits in the governing coalition. The two parties announced a split this week, though they called it a "procedural" move and said they may reunite before the upcoming April elections.

The party agreed in September to remove the clause, following a three-year legal battle over petitions filed by multiple women's groups, including some representing ultra-Orthodox women.

The party stressed at the time of the agreement that it was a

symbolic move only, as the Council of Torah Sages — which decides on the party's makeup and guides its actions — would not approve a female candidate for office.

However, the court in its ruling this week stressed that in future, women who claim to meet requirements and are barred from the party will be able to take legal action on the basis of the decision.

Following the ruling a senior source in Agudath Israel told Haaretz it was "largely populist and devoid of meaning."

"The party does not discriminate against women and represents them well. Not putting women on the list is based on a historic decision of leading rabbis since the state's foundation, and the High Court knows there is no plan to change this," he said.

"We will respect the High Court's instructions by changing the wording of the party regulations because these are semantics without any real significance," he said, but stressed that "this isn't going to change in the next few decades."

The petition to the court was brought by Tamar ben-Porat, a secular woman, who was joined by attorneys Neta Ziv and Neta Levy of Itach Ma'akei — Women Lawyers for Social Justice, representing 10 women's organizations that wished to join the petition. The petition was also supported by Nivcharot, an ultra-Orthodox women's movement that likens itself to the suffragettes of the early 19th century.

Nivcharot representative Estee Rieder-Indursky told i24 news following the September agreement that symbolic victories were also important. "For us it is not 2018. It is 1918," she said. "We are in the middle of the suffragist fight."

Attorney Neta Levy disagreed that the ruling was insignificant, saying the court was "sending a

clear message that women cannot be discriminated against in Israeli parties."

Yesh Atid MK Aliza Lavie, former head of the Knesset's Committee on the Status of Women and Gender Equality, took issue with the claim the male ultra-Orthodox legislators gave proper representation to women, noting that "at Knesset deliberations on the health, well-being and personal security of ultra-Orthodox women, ultra-Orthodox MKs were usually absent."

Lavie called the court ruling "the beginning of a process" and expressed hope it would have "many implications on the daily lives of ultra-Orthodox women as well as the upcoming [female] ultra-Orthodox leaders."

About 11 percent of Israel's 8.5 million citizens are Haredi, or ultra-Orthodox.

Not only are women excluded from politics, but most of Israel's ultra-Orthodox media — which includes four daily newspapers, two main weeklies and two main websites — refuse to show images of women, claiming it would be a violation of modesty.

EU Gives Nearly \$1 Million to Map Jewish Cemeteries

The European Union has awarded close to \$1 million to a project that aims to map and survey at least 1,500 Jewish cemeteries in Eastern Europe.

The European Jewish Cemeteries Initiative, or ESJF, announced its winning an EU tender affording it 800,000 euros, a sum equivalent to \$922,000. Since the group's establishment in 2015 with a German government grant, it has helped protect over 120 Jewish cemeteries in seven Central and



Eastern European countries.

The mapping process, to be undertaken using state-of-the-art technology specially designed for the project, involves engineering

drones surveying and photographing the sites from the air, following an in-depth historical research process of centuries—old records across many countries and languages, ESJF said.

Around the cemeteries that ESJF maps and demarcates, the organization typically sets up perimeter fences that it says dramatically reduce the risk facing the site. Eastern and Central Europe has well over 10,000 Jewish cemeteries in various degrees of risk.

"The aim of our unique and sacred mission is to rescue and preserve Jewish cemeteries, the resting place of our forefathers," said Rabbi Isaac Schapira, Founder and Chairman of the ESJF Board. "Today, there are many different threats to these cemeteries due to deterioration, vandalism and antisemitism, but also where they are threatened for financial reasons and expanding local city planning ordinances."
