We've Come A Long Way

As I begin my year as Board chair, I've been thinking about our Federation's past. Before 1970, Jewish community needs in the desert were handled as an offshoot of the activities of Temple Isaiah,

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with Rabbi Hurwitz raising funds as required to meet needs as they arose. Irving Winston was one of our first community leaders to see the need for an independent Jewish Federation here in the desert and served as the founding president from 1970 to 1972. Regardless, communal needs continued to be run, as Rabbi Hurwitz recalled, from the bottom drawer of his desk. It was almost ten years before a part-time director, Sam Rosenthal, was hired, and another three years before Nat Bent was hired as the first full time Executive Director, in July 1983.

Becoming an independent entity proved a wise choice. The success of the 1982-3 campaign made the Desert Sun, which reported \$1 million had been raised under the leadership of Federation's fifth president Jim Greenbaum.

In the intervening years, a total of 21 individuals have assumed the mantel of Federation President (now Chairman of the Board), including the two we honored at our Annual meeting on May 8th, Celia Norian and Allan Lehmann. Celia and Allan have served with distinction, with their own special qualities and talents, and their strong commitment to Jewish life that is deep and proud. We thank them and are grateful for their many years of service.

In 1983 Federation had its offices in the Sun Center in Palm Springs, upstairs above a drug store, Jewish bakery and other small businesses. No sign was on the building. Later the Federation office was moved to El Cielo, hidden in a small business complex across the street from the Palm Springs airport. No sign was on the building. Next the Federation office was moved to offices upstairs in the Atrium in Rancho Mirage. Again, there was no sign on the building.

Now, since 2011, we are in our own building with our name boldly painted above our entrance. "Jewish Federation." Not hidden now; the community knows where we are.

But we are not just a building. What is most important are the people in Our building; our staff, our Board, our volunteers, our community who attend our programs. We all join together with like-minded people who share the same passions and goals. This is the place for people who need help and know that they are welcome here. We must realize the important work that we do here and how our decisions affect many non-profits here in the desert, Israel, and over 70 countries throughout the world.

WHAT IF THERE WAS ONE PLACE to meet the needs of lews and non-Jews, young and old, wherever they live? One place inspired by bold, often daring pursuits of social justice and human rights. By rich traditions of advocacy, education, responsibility and TZEDAKAH? What if there was one place where you could make the difference? Where you could help repair the world? One place where you could make the connection to Jewish values, Jewish people and lewish communities all over the world. There is. FEDERATION. One place that belongs to us.

California's Proposed Controversial Ethnic Studies Curriculum Scrapped

Program contained serious anti-Semitic/anti-Israel bias

The decision on August 12th by the California State Board of Education to scrap its proposed Ethnic Studies Curriculum was met with relief by Jewish organizations throughout the state. The anti-Semitic/anti-Israel proposal appeared to be yet another attempt by Jew haters to institutionalize their attacks on Jews and the Jewish state.

The California Department of

Education's proposed Ethnic Studies Curriculum was the latest example of the use of harmful Jewish stereotypes and the marginalization of Jews that is increasingly appearing in mainstream discourse, and particularly virulently prevalent on college campuses throughout the United States today.

The AMCHA Initiative, a nonprofit dedicated to fighting campus anti-Semitism, praised the decision in a statement: "We are pleased the State Board of Education has recognized the severe problems with this curriculum and agreed to go back to the drawing board." However, AMCHA warned that the Board of Education "must establish overall safeguards" to ensure that future efforts don't repeat the failings of the most recent curriculum. A week earlier, AMCHA wrote

including regular security updates and resource sharing, as well as community-wide protocols for communication in an emergency.

• Implementation of a security training program including centralized, regionally-based and organization specific trainings.

We will continue to assess community needs, help develop security plans, advise and oversee matters of security and incident response for the Federation and partner organizations in the Jewish community, including:

• Establishing trusting relationships with key stakeholders, including CEOs, executive directors, clergy, community leaders, local law enforcement SCN (Secure Community Network), FBI and Department of Homeland Security.

• Provide consulting to organizations, which may include conducting facility assessments, review of security plans, developing recommendations on upgrades or improvements in security operations and procedures, and assisting with submissions for Department of Homeland Security grants.

• Establish a system of collaboration, coordination, and communication between organizations, which will create synergies and allow for resource sharing to leverage best practices.

a letter, representing a coalition of 83 groups, to the board expressing their concern over the proposed curriculum. The letter observed that there was a "shocking omission of information about American Jews and anti-Semitism, its use of classic anti-Semitic stereotypes, and its blatant

community-wide protocol and system for communications during an emergency.

• Design and coordinate a security training program with input from community organizations on needs and interests, offering centralized and organization specific programs. This might include disaster preparedness, proactive security measures, incident response, first aid and CPR.

• Review intelligence reports and information regarding security situations in the local community, Israel and around the world; advise agencies on responses to threats or relevant security situations and develop appropriate communitywide communications.

• Manage security approach for major Federation events, ensuring necessary security staffing and coordination with facility security and local law enforcement.

• Represent the Federation and the Jewish community in public forums, taskforces or meetings concerning security matters.

Security experts agree that simple, well-established, and consistently implemented safety measures are the most effective at minimizing harm: drills that teach rapid lockdown and evacuation strategies, doors that can be secured in seconds, and other lowcost equipment for communication.

Perhaps the greatest threat to the Jewish community is amnesia, when we forget about Pittsburgh and

negative stereotypes about Jews, singles out Israel for criticism and would institutionalize the teaching of anti-Semitic stereotypes in our public schools."

In announcing its decision to scrap the curriculum, the state's Board of Education stated, "A model curriculum should be accurate, free of bias, appropriate for all learners in our diverse state, and align with Governor [Gavin] Newsom's vision of a California for all. The current draft model curriculum falls short and needs to be substantially redesigned."

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German Anti-Semitism Tsar Endorses Probe Over Anti-Jewish Tweets

Pressure has continued to pile on Christian Clages, Germany's official diplomatic representative to the Palestinian Authority in Ramallah, after an investigation by the newspaper Bild revealed that several anti-Semitic and anti-Zionist posts on Twitter had received "likes" from his verified account.

The German Foreign Office immediately launched a probe into the tweets, with some German parliamentarians and government officials expressing shock at the revelation that Clages' account had, among other offenses, liked a tweet posted by the former Ku Klux Klan leader David Duke condemning "Jewish supremacists."

Among those who voiced support for the probe into Clages was Felix Klein, Germany's federal commissioner tasked

with combating anti=Semitism, who described the scandal as fundamentally a question of "trust."

"If German interests are to be effectively represented, it is necessary that the representative in Ramallah has good relations not only with Palestinians in the West Bank, but with Israelis too," Klein added.

A spokesperson from Germany's Foreign Ministry told Bild that it distanced itself "emphatically" from the tweets that had been approved from Clages account, describing them as an "unacceptable" deviation from German government policy that "will not be tolerated."

The 64-year-old Clages has worked for the German diplomatic service since 1985, and has previously served as Germany's ambassador to Rwanda, Senegal and Lebanon.


One of the goals of the Foreign Ministry probe is to establish whether it was Clages himself who liked the tweets, or whether there was unauthorized access to the account,@GerRepRamallah. According to the magazine Spiegel, more than one person in the Ramallah office had access to the account. Clages has meanwhile distanced himself from the tweets.

The tweets liked included a rant by Duke on April 10, in which the American neo-Nazi leader tweeted a lie popular on the far right and the extreme left: "On this day 71 years ago, Jewish supremacists invaded the Palestinian village of Deir Yassin, where they slaughtered men, women and children. Innocent Palestinians were mutilated, raped and paraded through Jewish neighborhoods before being summarily executed."

Other tweets liked by the German diplomat included one by an activist asking "when will Israel occupy the moon?" — a possible reference to Israel's recent "Beresheet" moon mission — while another claimed falsely that the Jewish state only "respects its own religious holidays."

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Eye-Catching Window Wonderland Opens in a Jerusalem Park


Jerusalem has never seen anything quite like this before.

"Window Stories," a towering installation made of 550 windows salvaged from across the city, in a variety of shapes and styles from different eras, is open free to the public through September 21 in Jerusalem's Gan HaSus (Horse Garden) on King George Street downtown.

This palace of windows was created by Yoram Amir, Itamar "Faluja" Paloge and Lior "Lili" Peleg in conjunction with the upcoming annual <u>Mekudeshet</u> cultural festival in the capital city.

There's a wooden English window alongside an Armenian hatch-window, an Ottoman decoration next to a Christian creation, a frame in the shape of a Star of David attached to an Arabic arch – and much more. There are even windows from the precursor to the Waldorf Astoria hotel and from market stalls.

As night descends, a spectacular set of lights transforms the window tower into a glittering lighthouse.

"On a night of languages, voices and cultures that do not always get along together, [we] will unite to form one house that has more open windows than hidden walls," the creators proclaimed.

The windows were collected and preserved for decades by the

late Yoram Amir, described as "an artist, activist, photographer, Don Quixote, prophet, and, more than anything, a lover of people and Jerusalem."

Amir salvaged the windows from abandoned buildings or buildings slated for demolition. Just before his death, he joined forces with Mekudeshet, the Jerusalem Municipality through Eden, the Jerusalem Center Development Company, and the artistic duo of Paloge and Peleg to construct this majestic exhibition unveiled July 7.

Visitors to Window Stories can listen to podcasts in Hebrew, Arabic and English, telling Yoram's story and the story of the window palace to children and adults. Each Wednesday, the site will host artistic and musical activities for the whole family.

Mekudeshet (formerly called the Sacred Music Festival in English) runs through September 21 and features music, art and unusual cultural events designed to provide a different perspective on Jerusalem.

Notorious British Anti-Semite and Holocaust Denier Banned from France Until 2059

A notorious British anti-Semite and Holocaust denier has been banned from entering France for the next 40 years.

According to The Jewish Chronicle, Alison Chabloz was stopped from boarding a train to Paris on August 12th.

In a Twitter post, she claimed to have been "banned from entering France until 2059." "My passport bleeped," she said. "Questioned first by gendarmes and then Met CTU [Counter Terrorism Unit] under Sec 7 at St Pancras," an apparent reference to an anti-terrorism law that permits officials to block entry to France by criminals and terrorists.

Chabloz was sentenced in June 2018 to 20 weeks' imprisonment, which was suspended for two years. Using her YouTube channel, Chabloz produced content including speeches by Holocaust deniers and Palestinian solidarity videos, alongside a selection of openly anti-Semitic songs sung to the camera.

In one song, "(((Survivors)))," Chabloz mimicked a "Jewish" accent while singing lyrics that defamed the survivors of the Nazi death camps as liars motivated by

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The judge, John Zani, said to Chabloz at the sentencing, "It appears to this court that no proper remorse is forthcoming from you."

"I don't know whether you want to be a martyr to your cause," he added. "Only time will tell. This sentence will test your resolve."

The Jewish advocacy group Campaign Against Anti-Semitism called Chabloz "a remorseless and repulsive anti-Semite who has spent years obsessively inciting others to hate Jews, principally by claiming that the Holocaust was a hoax perpetrated by Jews to defraud the world."

At an appeal hearing in February of this year, the judge called Chabloz "manifestly anti-Semitic and obsessed with what she perceives to be the wrongdoing of Jews."

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Pro-Israel Scholars Counter Move by Major US Academic Association to Boycott Israel

Pro-Israel professors are once again gearing up to prevent the Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) campaign from hijacking an upcoming academic association conference.

The Academic Engagement Network (AEN) on August 15th sent a letter to Stephen Rathgeb Smith executive director of the American Political Science Association (ASPA), which will be holding its annual meeting on August 31 — warning that BDS activists, who are "uninterested in debate or dialogue" could take over the meeting of the Foundations of Political Theory.

The AEN letter was signed by Mark Yudof, Chair of the Advisory Board, Miriam Elman, Executive Director, and Michael Atkins, the Deputy Executive Director of the organization.

Robyn Marasco, the chair of the meeting, acknowledged in an email obtained by *The Algemeiner* that while a pro-BDS resolution will be discussed at the meeting "there will be no vote on this resolution at APSA." She explained that "votes on new policy can only take place at the Business meeting," which was why she scheduled the discussion of BDS at an "Open Meeting."

She also claimed that her reason for entertaining the discussion is "with the hope and expectation that political theorists can discuss controversial issues that impact our professional (and not just our political) lives." She added that "I do not believe Foundations should be a partisan organization nor do I believe that I am promoting an agenda or that the organization has been 'captured' by activists.

However, in their letter, AEN

warned that "the resolution's sponsors have already shown that they are uninterested in debate or dialogue with those opposed to academic boycotts in general, and of Israel's academy in particular."

The AEN recalled that last year, the samegroup now calling for a discussion of a BDS resolution organized a session that explicitly stated "we have no interest in giving another platform to BDS opponents" in its description.

The behavior of the pro-BDS group in the past raises concerns that this year's political theory meeting could turn into a "lopsided discussion," in which "only BDS proponents will be heard," even if they are outnumbered by APSA members who oppose academic boycotts.

The AEN letter asked that Smith and Marasco "ensure that the discussion at the August 31 meeting is robust and even-handed."

In recent years, pro-BDS activists have inserted themselves into academic associations to shut down debate and promote their agenda. Two years ago, the Louis D. Brandeis Center for Human Rights Under Law reported that emails discovered in the course of a lawsuit showed that pro-BDS activists took over key leadership positions in the American Studies Association prior to passing a resolution calling for an academic boycott of Israel in 2013.

Earlier this month, a pro-BDS resolution was narrowly defeated at the annual meeting of the Society for the Study of Social Problems (SSSP). The motion failed by a vote of 37 to 34 in an association comprised of approximately 2,000 members.

Israeli Robotics Team Wins First Place in China

The robotics team of the Tichonet high school of Tel Aviv returned to Israel from China after winning first place an international robotics in competition, beating teams from 71 countries around the world.

Arutz Sheva spoke with the team's mentor, Raanan De Haas who said the structure of the competition in China dictated that after the preliminary stage, every four teams converged into one team that competed from the quarterfinals to the final itself. The Israeli team joined the New York. China and Hawaii teams and achieved first place.

"Every year there is a new mission, a new challenge to build a robot. This year, the goal was to

target discs in different places on the field," De Haas said, adding that each robot had to protect its own discs as well as attack the discs of the other robots. "For us. the defense was better than the attack," De Haas admitted.

"We learned a lot from the Chinese groups and part of our job was to teach," De Haas said. "Three days before the competition we adopted a new group from China

and passed on our knowledge to them," he said, adding that they spoke together in English with the help of hand gestures.

Preparations for the competition start months before. "We received the mission in January, built a robot in a month and a half, and then began entering competitions with it until the national finals. We qualified for the competition in the US and after our success there we were invited to the competition in China," said De Haas. He added that the robot cannot be replaced; the same robot must be used for all competitions. The competition in China was the fifth round of judging competing with the same robot.

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Fearing PR Blow, Hamas Asks Gaza **Border Rioters Not to Fly Swastika Flag**


The Gaza Strip-ruling Palestinian terrorist group Hamas has told rioters on the border with Israel to not to fly the Nazi swastika flag after a photo of them doing so was tweeted by the IDF in early August..

The flag was flown on the border fence as part of the Hamasorchestrated "March of Return" riots that have become a near-weekly occurrence since March 2018.

The IDF tweeted the image of the swastika flag sandwiched between two Palestinian flags, calling it "a symbol of murder and sheer hatred."

"In the face of this hatred," the army added, "stand IDF soldiers, alert and determined, ready to defend Israel."

In response, the Israeli news site Mako reported that Hamas issued a message to rioters, asking them not to fly the swastika, "so that the Israeli occupation cannot take advantage of it."



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104-Year-Old Holocaust Survivor Celebrates Birthday at Western Wall With 400 Descendants

A 104-year-old Holocaust survivor celebrated her birthday last week by gathering over 400 children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and other relatives at the Western Wall in Jerusalem.

The Israeli news site Walla reported that Shoshana Ovitz requested that all her "children, grandchildren, and descendants to come together at the Western Wall," and her children and grandchildren worked hard to realize her dream.

"We do not have an exact number, but there are probably 400 grandchildren and descendants," said Shoshana's oldest granddaughter, Panini Friedman.

Even 400 people, however, did not cover everyone, as Friedman says "we're missing about 10 percent of them."

"It wasn't a simple thing to organize this rare event," she added, saying relatives used email, phone calls, and SMS messages to bring everyone together.

Shoshana, says Panini, "asked us to make her a list of all the grandchildren and great-grandchildren so she could pray for them, but it was too complicated."

Instead, Shoshana said she would pray that "everyone gets everything they need."

Only when everyone was gathered together, says Panini, did she realize the size of the gathering.

"Everyone was there with tears in their eyes," she said. "It was very emotional."

Shoshana Ovitz survived the Holocaust and met her husband while searching for surviving family members. They lived in a transit camp in Austria and then moved to Haifa. She has two sons and two daughters.

Israeli Company Announces Successful Trial of Radiation Vaccine

On July 31 an Israeli company announced that it had developed a highly-effective vaccine against radiation poisoning.

The Israeli news site Mako reported that the Haifa-based company Pluristem Therapeutics made the announcement together with the US Department of Defense.

The company said that the vaccine showed extremely-improved survival rates among animals subjected to high levels of radiation.

Use of the vaccine increased survival rates by 74 percent, the company stated, compared to only four percent in the control group.

The vaccine, called PLX-R18, involves the injection of placental cells into the subjects 24 hours before radiation exposure and 72 hours after.

After the treatment, subjects showed strong improvement in the

amount of platelets and white blood cells, as well as bone marrow, all of which are severely damaged by exposure to high levels of radiation.

The vaccine has already been given preliminary approval by the US Food and Drug Administration, meaning it can be used to treat victims following an emergency nuclear event. It has yet to receive full marketing approval.

President and CEO of Pluristem Yaky Yanay said, "We are very pleased with the positive results from the trials, which show that PLX-R18 can be used as a preventive treatment before exposure to radiation."

"These results make a significant contribution to the protection of rescue and security forces that need to enter radiation-contaminated areas," he added.

"Let them make Me a sanctuary that I may dwell among them..." (Ex. 25:8) These are the words that are found near the beginning of Parashat Terumah, the commandment to create a holy place where the Children of Israel could commune with G-d. The Torah teaches us that those whose "heart so moved them" gave Terumah (gifts) to be used in the construction of the Mishkan.

Israelis Develop Haptic Vests for Rescue and Service Dogs

Painless vibrating vest created at Ben-Gurion University enables delivery of remote commands to four-legged assistants. By Naama Barak ISRAEL 21C

Search-and-rescue dogs and service dogs do absolutely amazing work, saving lives and assisting those in need on a daily basis by command. But what if their handlers are unable to deliver verbal commands, either because of their surroundings or disabilities they may have?

Step in the haptic dog vest, which emits painless vibrations that dogs are trained to recognize as various commands. It was developed by an interdisciplinary research team from Ben-Gurion University of the Negev and is set to be presented at the World Haptics Conference in Tokyo this month.


Haptics technology, which simulates the senses of touch and motion, can be helpful in delivering remote commands to dogs for use in search-and-rescue operations, in assisting disabled handlers and in other service-animal applications.

The commercially available mesh canine vest contains four small vibrating motors positioned over a dog's back and sides that can be used to train or direct dogs to respond to different, painless vibrations sent via wireless remote control. The handler can elicit different commands by controlling the site and duration of vibrations.

In a demonstration video released by the research team, Tai, a six-yearold Labrador retriever-German shepherd crossbreed, responds to several distinct commands such as "Spin," "Down," "To me," and "Backpedal."

"Our research results showed that dogs responded to these vibrotactile cues as well or even better than vocal commands," said Prof. Amir Shapiro, director of BGU's Robotics Laboratory. "Our current proof-of-concept study shows promising results that open the way toward the use of haptics for human-canine communication."

Future research is planned to test the haptic vest on dogs of different breeds, ages and training



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Human Rights Experts Hail Challenge to Palestinian Authority Anti-Semitism at UN Committee Session

On August 15th, human rights experts praised a United Nations' committee for its pointed questioning of the Palestinian Authority over its anti-Semitic incitement.

The UN's Committee to End Racial Discrimination (CERD) grilled the PA's delegation in Geneva earlier this week over its official incitement, including in schools. The PA was subject to the review, having signed on to the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (ICERD).

Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD), a number of pro-Israel NGOs submitted documentation of Palestinian violations of the prompting searching convention, of the Palestinian questioning delegation.


The Palestinian delegation seemed to be surprised by the adversarial tone of many of the questions and insisted that "96 percent of the Palestinian curriculum is in with UN and international standards."

"Palestinian officials have a standard Prior to the review by the UN's set of phrases and accusations about

Israel, which they repeated in the first round. They almost never have to respond to detailed criticism, particularly in the UN. So, in this case, they were obviously surprised when the committee asked real questions," Gerald Steinberg, president of Israeli research institute NGO Monitor, explained to The Algemeiner. He added: "To respond, they could only invent ridiculous claims that had no factual support to defend themselves. The Palestinians and their allies, including the committee chair from Algeria, clearly lost this round. The question is whether the

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final report will reflect this outcome."

In his statement to the CERD, Steinberg noted that the Palestinians in their submission used the term "apartheid" 32 times. Given that an apartheid state has no right to exist, Steinberg said, "It is a call for the elimination of a member state of the United Nations. It is a form of racism itself."

"Any society exposed to the levels of hatred and violence present in the PA and Hamas controlled territories cannot be expected to seek peace," Hillel Neuer and Dina Rovner, respectively the executive director and the legal advisor to UN Watch, wrote in their submission to CERD. "The only way future generations of Palestinians will be able to pursue peace with Israel is if they are educated with messages of peace and tolerance rather than hatred. We hope the Committee will address these important issues in its review."

Marcus Sheff — CEO of IMPACT-SE, a non-profit organization that monitors the content of school textbooks — told The Algemeiner that an informal meeting with the UN committee members was decisive. During that meeting, Sheff showed them textbooks with examples of the anti-Semitism that is rife in the Palestinian educational system.

In particular, he noted that the South Korean committee member, Chinsung Chung, was prompted to ask the Palestinian delegation about the official anti-Semitism after viewing the books. Chung also delivered a rebuke to the Palestinians saying, "The Palestinian Authority should undertake serious reforms in its political system."

Major Study Shows Gut Microbes May Impact Course of ALS

The findings suggest that in the future, various means of altering the microbiome may be harnessed for developing new therapeutic options for ALS.

A trailblazing study by Israeli researchers suggests that intestinal microbes may have a direct effect on the course of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), the incurable, fatal neurodegenerative disease also known as Lou Gehrig's disease that affected physicist Stephen Hawking.

Published today in Nature, the study by researchers at the Weizmann Institute of Science revealed that the progression of an ALS-like disease in lab mice was slowed after the mice received certain strains of gut microbes or substances known to be secreted by these microbes.

Mounting evidence of the gut microbiome's effect on brain function and disease is what prompted the Weizmann study. Further research must be done to determine whether regulating the gut microbiome might have the same effect in humans with ALS as it did with the mice.

"Our long-standing scientific and medical goal is to elucidate the impact of the microbiome on human health and disease, with the brain being a fascinating new frontier," said Prof. Eran Elinav of the Weizmann's immunology department.

Scientists in Elinav's lab, working with colleagues in the lab of Prof. Eran Segal of the computer science and applied mathematics department, first demonstrated that the symptoms of an ALS-like disease in engineered mice worsened after these mice were given antibiotics to wipe out a substantial portion of their microbiome.

In addition, the scientists found that ALS-prone mice had a hard time surviving when grown in germfree conditions where they cannot develop a gut microbiome at all.

Using advanced computational methods, the scientists identified 11 microbial strains that became altered in ALS-prone mice as the disease progressed or even before the mice developed overt symptoms.

The scientists isolated these microbial strains and gave them one by one to the ALS-prone mice, following antibiotic treatment to wipe out their microbiome. One particular strain, Akkermansia muciniphila, significantly slowed disease progression in the mice and prolonged their survival.

To reveal the mechanism by which Akkermansia may be producing its effect, the scientists examined thousands of small molecules secreted by the gut microbes. They zeroed in on one molecule called nicotinamide (NAM) and found that its levels in the blood and in the cerebrospinal fluid of ALSprone mice were reduced following antibiotic treatment and increased after these mice were supplemented with Akkermansia, which can secrete nicotinamide.

To confirm that nicotinamide was indeed a microbiome-secreted molecule that could hinder the

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course of ALS, the scientists continuously infused the ALSprone mice with nicotinamide. The clinical condition of these mice improved significantly. Brain studies showed that the substance seems to have improved the functioning of their motor neurons.

How this relates to human ALS patients

Then came a step that shows the most promise in relation to human ALS patients.

The researchers examined the microbiome and metabolite profiles of 37 people with ALS and compared them to those of family members sharing the same household.

And not only did they find that the gut microbiomes of ALS patients were distinct from healthy family members in composition and functional features, but they also found that microbial genes involved in the synthesis of nicotinamide were significantly suppressed in ALS patients.

An analysis of thousands of small molecules in the blood also revealed a distinct pattern in ALS patients as compared to controls. Here too, many of the intermediary molecules involved in nicotinamide synthesis were altered in the blood of ALS patients.

The researchers also found the levels of nicotinamide itself to be significantly reduced in both the blood and the brain of 60 human ALS patients as compared to controls. Moreover, there was a correlation between reduced nicotinamide levels and the degree of muscle weakness in the patients.

"These findings are only a first step toward achieving a comprehensive understanding of the potential impact of the microbiome on ALS," Elinav said, "but they suggest that in the future, various means of altering the microbiome may be harnessed for developing new therapeutic options for ALS."

The study was led by postdoctoral fellows Eran Blacher and Stavros Bashiardes, and by staff scientist Hagit Shapiro from Elinav's lab. They collaborated with postdoctoral fellow Daphna Rothschild from Segal's lab and with Dr. Marc Gotkine, head of the Motor Neuron Disease Clinic at Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center, as well as with other scientists from Weizmann, Hebrew University, Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, the University of Gothenburg in Sweden.



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Revolutionary Blood Test Will Detect Stage 1 Lung Cancer

Israel's Savicell says its test measures the metabolic 'signatures' of immune cells circulating in the blood in response to disease. By Brian Blum ISRAEL 21C

Of all cancers, lung cancer is the deadliest, largely because it is so difficult to diagnose early on. With very few nerve endings in the lungs, this type of cancer doesn't cause painful symptoms until a tumor has grown quite large – and by that time, it's often too late.

"If the cancer is detected at stage 1, the survival rate is 80 percent," explains Giora Davidovits, CEO of Israeli startup <u>Savicell</u>, which is developing a new blood test to diagnose lung cancer.

Davidovits explains that most lung cancers found early are usually the result of a patient undergoing radiological imaging for an entirely different issue.

"If the cancer is not detected until stage 2, the survival rate drops to 13-14%," he adds."By stage 4, it's down to just 4 percent."

When a physician suspects lung cancer, a CT scan is done. If a lump (nodule) is found, a biopsy is the only way to really know what's going on. However, since 95% of nodules are benign, and since the biopsy is a risky, highly invasive procedure, doctors prefer to wait and see if the CT finds changes over time. If it does – and it is cancer – the final diagnosis can be at a tragically late stage.

Savicell's alternative, a simple blood test that can detect lung cancer, is part of a fast-growing specialization known as "liquid biopsy" – a market worth some \$1.2 billion in 2018, according to Zion Market Research.

Most liquid biopsies are based on sequencing a patient's genetic material (such as DNA and RNA) to



search for any cancerous material that a tumor secretes. That can be hard to find.

"These kinds of tests are very good at defining disease and showing which genetic segments have been impacted," Davidovits explains. "But they have difficulties when it comes to early detection at stages 1 and 2."

Immunometabolism

Savicell takes an entirely different approach. Rather than gene sequencing, Savicell measures the metabolic state of immune cells circulating in the blood – that is, how energy is used by the cell.

This new field – known as immunometabolism – has revealed that immune cells take on specific metabolic "signatures" when they encounter different diseases.

Savicell has developed a diagnostic kit with 384 "wells," each containing one of 16 chemical stimulants in increasing concentrations. When immune cells drawn from a patient's blood come in contact with the stimulants, they use energy (i.e. their metabolism is activated) differently.

If the pattern matches, Savicell's Well-Shield platform can identify lung cancer "with 91 percent sensitivity," Davidovits says. Savicell is not the only company looking at immunometabolism, but other companies focus on activating immune cells as part of the therapeutic process. Savicell is unique in using immunometabolism for diagnosis.

Diagnose lung cancer in hours

Savicell can diagnose lung cancer in a matter of hours, rather than the days or even weeks required for gene-sequenced liquid biopsies, says Davidovits.

That naturally raises comparisons with Theranos, the Silicon Valley blood-testing startup that raised over a billion dollars in what turned out to be the largest biomedical fraud in US history. Theranos also promised results from its inpharmacy diagnostic machine in hours.

Davidovits dismisses any superficial similarities with Theranos. "They weren't scientific," he tells ISRAEL21c. "They never published."

While Theranos eventually did publish a single paper in 2017 – some 14 years after the company was founded – the results from Savicell's research with 200 patients in Israel appeared in the medical journal Cancer Immunology and Immunotherapy in 2018.

Giora Davidovits started Savicell with his brother Eyal in 2013. Giora received his BA in biochemistry from Brandeis and an MBA from Cornell. He has worked in the healthcare industry for 25 years, including management stints at Procter & Gamble and Johnson & Johnson.

Eyal, Savicell's COO, worked for many years in finance and marketing positions for Intel and has a BS in manufacturing engineering and business studies.

The technology behind Savicell was initially developed by Tel Aviv University Prof. Fernando Patolsky, who doubles as the company's principal investigator. When Savicell took on commercialization of Patolsky's research, it was already at a clinical stage with a working proof of concept.

It is not yet commercially available; development and clinical studies are continuing. For a noninvasive diagnostic test, however, the time to market can be relatively short.

Savicell has raised \$9 million and has R&D labs in Haifa, headed by Eyal, with a US office in Boston headed by Giora.

Among other players in the liquid biopsy space is an Israeli firm, Nucleix, which uses DNA sequencing to detect cancer cells. The company was founded in 2008 and has raised \$11.4 million. Nucleix's Lung EpiCheck can detect non-small cell lung carcinomas, the most common type of lung cancer, with 83% accuracy at stage 4 but only 59% at stage 1.

Savicell is focused today on lung cancer, but the same immunometabolism approach should work with other types of cancer, as well as autoimmune conditions. The company has already done preliminary research on developing a diagnostic kit to identify breast cancer via blood test.

Court Orders Neo-Nazi Website Founder to Pay \$14 Million for Inciting Violence

The founder of the alt-right website The Daily Stormer was ordered by court on August 8 to pay a Jewish real estate agent \$14 million for inciting his readers to harass her family, The Associated Press reported.

U.S. District Judge Dana Christensen entered Tanya Gersh a default judgment after Andrew Anglin did not appear for a scheduled deposition in the civil lawsuit case. Anglin is ordered to pay Gersh more than \$4 million in compensatory damages and \$10 million in punitive damages. He is also required to permanently remove all posts, comments and images about Gersh and her family.

Anglin accused Gersh of trying to run the mother of white nationalist Richard Spencer out of town in 2016. He published her family's personal information on his neo-Nazi website and asked his readers, "Are y'all ready for an old fashioned troll storm?"

Gersh said she and her family received threatening and anti-Semitic messages for months.



A Nazi swastika flag raised on the Israel-Gaza Strip border, Friday, August 2, 2019 Anglin does not live in the United States, but Gersh's attorney, David Dinielli of the Southern Poverty Law Center, said that he "will go to the ends of the earth to collect the judgment ... whether it's cash, assets or intellectual property."


This is the second multimilliondollar award against Anglin recently, according to The Associated Press. In June, a federal judge in Ohio awarded a Muslim radio host \$4.1 million after Anglin falsely accused him of terrorism.

Anglin's lawyers, who argued that his writings were protected by the First Amendment, dropped their client when he failed to appear for his deposition in April.


Immigration Officer who Drove into Rhode Island Jewish Protesters Put on Leave

"The Wyatt supports the First Amendment right of citizens to peacefully protest on public property surrounding the facility, and the First Amendment right of journalists to report on the facility."
