# Israeli MKs Propose Giving Diaspora Jews a Formal Role in Israeli Affairs

# How much of a say, if any, should Diaspora Jews have in Israeli affairs?

This perennial question, debated often in op-eds and speeches as well as at Jewish conferences, always has been somewhat ephemeral.

But proposed Knesset legislation that would give Diaspora Jewish leaders a formal role in Israeli affairs may herald a new era in Israel-Diaspora relations.

The bill, which has been endorsed by Israel's Diaspora Affairs Ministry, would require the

Israeli government to consult world Jewish leaders on issues it deems crucial to the 8 million or so Jews who live outside of Israel. Knesset member Tehila Friedman of the Blue and White party sponsored the measure.

"This would potentially be one of the most significant events in Israeli-Diaspora relations in decades," said David Butler, chair of the Israel and Overseas Committee of the Jewish Federations of North America, the umbrella group for 146 Jewish federations and 300 independent communities in North America.

The federations collectively send hundreds of millions of dollars each year to Israel in the form of grants to nonprofit organizations that work on behalf of Israelis from across the sectors of society, including the federations' two main overseas partners: the Jewish Agency for Israel and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee. In late October, Jewish Federations hosted a panel discussion during its annual General Assembly, held online this year, on the subject of

"How much say should world Jewry have in internal Israeli affairs?"

"I believe Israelis, and the Israeli government, should want to hear from us, to learn and understand our perspectives," said Eric Fingerhut, a former member of Congress from Ohio who now heads the Jewish Federations network. "We don't want to try and tell the Israeli government what to do, but we do want them to hear our input on matters that impact our community."



# OpEd- 2020 Election Could Transform the Future for Evangelical Americans

With the election in a contentious campaign season, the coronavirus pandemic, and after a summer of racial unrest, 54 percent of Americans believe that the nation's best days are yet to come, as Presidents Reagan and Obama both famously said years ago.

Behind these numbers lies a peculiarity. While religious Americans are more optimistic about the future of the country than the average person, Trump's most loyal base of support, white evangelicals, are the only religious group in America to believe (by a majority) that America's best days are behind us, according to a recent American Enterprise Institute survey of more than 4,000 adults.

Sixty-six percent of Hispanic Catholics and 58 percent of Black Protestants believe America's best days are ahead, yet only 46 percent of white evangelicals think the same. The pessimism is starker among white evangelical women than men, and 28 percent of white evangelical women think the American dream is out of reach. By way of contrast, it is worth noting that 80 percent of religious Gen Zers consider America's best days to be ahead, compared to 60 percent of their nonreligious peers.

President Trump's rhetorical pugilism may galvanize the support of people who want a fighter on their side, but it has apparently done little to foster optimism. In a 2019 AEI survey of 3663 adults, only about a third (34 percent) of white evangelicals think people who grew up middle class are likely to move up the economic ladder, compared to 58 percent of Hispanic Catholics and 43 percent of Black Protestants. In a June 2020 survey of 3504 adults, 61 percent of white

evangelicals agreed that economic policy changes benefit some people at the expense of others, compared to just 39 percent of Black Protestants and 49 percent of Hispanic Catholics.

Evangelical gloom is in part a reaction to the sense of unsteadiness that social change creates. A plurality of white evangelicals and Black Protestants believe that their denominations should preserve their traditional beliefs and practices rather than adjust to new circumstances or adopt modern practices altogether. They are the only religious groups to do so.

However, the gap is much wider among white evangelicals: 73 percent favor preserving traditional beliefs over the 22 percent who favor making adjustments. Among Black Protestants, the split is 48 percent to 37 percent, and for all other religious groups, a plurality favors making adjustments. White evangelicals are the only religious group in which less than half believe America is successful because of its ability to change rather than because of its reliance on long-standing traditions. An average of 62 percent in all other groups say the same.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, then, evangelicals are more likely than other groups to think liberals exert more influence on American culture than conservatives. Forty-six percent of white evangelicals hold this view compared to 24 percent of white mainline. Protestants and 35 percent of white Catholics. Only 16 percent of Black Protestants and 19 percent of Hispanic Catholics think liberals exert more influence. The majority of most religious Americans believe liberals

and conservatives influence the culture equally, but only 39 percent of white evangelicals agree.

One thing that attenuates evangelical gloom somewhat is one's level of religiosity. For instance, white evangelicals who attend church infrequently are twice as likely as the more devout to think the American Dream is out of reach. But overall, despite their generally locked vote for Trump, white evangelicals paradoxically show less confidence than others in keeping "America great."

As anyone like myself who grew up within evangelicalism understands, evangelicals have long viewed the future with a kind of wariness due to a mix of eschatological (or end of times) theology and an awareness of cultural forces opposed to them. That could certainly be at play here. But more evident in the survey data is a sense of darkness consistent with fires that Trump himself has stoked. White evangelicals are much more likely than other religious groups to think immigration is bad for their local economy, discrimination against whites is a problem, and Confederate monuments are symbols of southern pride. Swayed by Trump's rhetoric, white evangelicals have now become stark outliers to other religious Americans on some of America's most divisive issues.

If Trump loses on election day, many white evangelicals will continue to view the world through a lens he has shaped for them, but it would also create an opening for new evangelical leadership to step up and offer a vision of the future that is more consistent with the positive social engagement that has also characterized its past.

### Joe Biden and Israel 📙

Joe Biden is a true friend of the Jewish state, friends and even political adversaries of the emerging president-elect agree.

"He has a deep feeling for Israel," said Michael Oren, who served as Israel's ambassador to the US when Biden was vice president. Oren opposed almost all the Middle East policies championed by Biden and his boss, Barack Obama, especially on Iran and the Israeli-Palestinian question. Still, he annually attended Biden's Rosh Hashanah party, and asserts that Joe BIden is genuinely concerned about Israel's well-being.

"Biden is from a generation that remembers 1967 and 1973," Oren said, referring to the Six Day War and the Yom Kippur War, respectively. "He has Israel in his heart. He actually gets it. He gets Israel."

A native of Scranton, Pennsylvania, Biden was raised by Catholic parents who were staunchly supportive of Israel and imbued in him a great respect for the Jewish state.

"You were blessed with one of the greatest generations of founding fathers and mothers of any nation in the history of the world — David Ben-Gurion, Golda Meir, Menachem Begin, Ariel Sharon, Yitzhak Rabin, Shimon Peres. They all fashioned Israel into a vibrant democracy," Biden said in 1915. "And in the process, you built one of the most innovative societies on Earth. In the process, you defended your homeland and became the most powerful military in the entire region. And all these years later, things have changed, but the danger still exists," he added. "And just to be an Israeli — it still demands uncommon courage."

Biden has known every Israeli prime minister since Golda Meir. He has retold many times the story of his

meeting with Meir in the summer of 1973, during his first overseas trip as a young senator: The Israeli premier showed him maps and told him about the militarily precarious situation her country found itself in. Biden looked depressed, but Meir cheered him up, telling him that Israelis have a secret weapon against the Arabs: They have nowhere else to go.

During his decades in politics Biden
— who has Jewish grandchildren, as
two of his three children married Jews
— met countless world leaders. But he
still describes his interaction with Golda
Meir as "one of the most consequential
meetings I've ever had in my life."

### No apologies for supporting Israel

Biden has been one of Washington's most outspoken advocates for US aid to Israel. "It's about time we stop apologizing for our support for Israel. There's no apology to be made, none," he said in the Senate in June 1986. "It is the best \$3 billion investment we make. If there weren't an Israel, the United States of America would have to invent an Israel to protect her interests in the region."

During the 2020 campaign, Biden was one of the few Democratic

candidates who said that they would not use American aid to Israel as a means of pressuring Israel for concessions. (Another one was his eventual running mate, California Senator Kamala Harris).

Biden's warm feelings and staunch support for the Jewish state has not meant he was not at times bitterly critical of some of its policies, especially on the Palestinian question.

In a 2016 address he stated, "I firmly believe that the actions that Israel's government has taken over the past several years — the steady and systematic expansion of settlements, the legalization of outposts, land seizures — are moving Israel in the wrong direction. They are moving us toward a one-state reality, and

that reality is dangerous. We have an obligation to push them as hard as we can toward what they know in their gut is the only ultimate solution — a two-state solution."

Biden's opposition to the settlements has led him to oppose Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's intended unilateral annexation of parts of the West Bank. The plan has since been suspended to allow for the normalization agreement with the United Arab Emirates, but Biden made plain that he would not allow it to happen under his watch.

According to his campaign website, Biden "will urge Israel's government and the Palestinian Authority to take steps to keep the prospect of a negotiated two-state outcome alive and avoid actions, such as unilateral annexation of territory and settlement activity, or support for incitement and violence, that undercut prospects for peace between the parties."

At the same time, he has vowed to push the PA toward ending its policy of paying stipends to individuals imprisoned for acts of terrorism. He also promised to "urge Arab states to move beyond quiet talks and take bolder steps toward normalization with Israel."

While he was not in favor of moving the US Embassy to Jerusalem, he said he would not relocate it back to Tel Aviv.

# Introducing Dr. Sherri Wise

If Dr. Sherri Wise is right, everything happens for a reason, and we are all born lucky—if we can find a way to turn what happens to



us into something good. She did. Twenty-one years ago, a simple choice to have lunch at a restaurant in Jerusalem changed her life when she became the victim of a triple suicide bombing in Jerusalem. One of the explosions occurred only steps away from where she was sitting. Wise had just switched seats with a friend. That small decision may have saved her life.

Over 25 people were murdered that day, and 196 wounded—including Wise. It took six months of medical care, and many more months of healing after that, before she could resume her life and return to her career in dentistry. Some of the physical and emotional damage has been permanent. And of course, the haunting question remains: why did she survive while so many others did not? Wise has spent the past twenty-one years answering that very question.

When the Canadian Coalition Against Terror contacted her to help pass the Justice for Victims of Terrorism Act, she embraced the project. Seven years later, the bill became law. Wise went on to win the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal of Honor for her achievement, an emotional moment for her as it symbolized how a positive contribution could come

out of a terrible experience.

She now speaks about the power of choosing forgiveness over anger, blame or hatred. It is her fervent belief that the terrorists who were involved in the suicide bombing were not born with hatred in their hearts. They were victims of hatred, just as she was. This belief has empowered her to move forward after the tragedy, rather than allowing it to define her life.

Instead, Wise is defined by gratitude—so many people helped in her recovery, and she now has the opportunity to give back. Her belief that she was spared for a reason fuels a desire to share her story with others who might be struggling with difficult things that happened in their past.

### Why the UAE is Looking to Israel to Secure its Food Supplies

Myriad deals between the two countries run the gamut from health tech to diamonds, though food tech and agritech are also top priorities.

Food security is emerging as a key area in which the United Arab Emirates is eager for Israeli expertise, investors in each country tell ISRAEL21c.

The Gulf states import more than 90 percent of their food. This has long been a concern, but the issue intensified when pandemic-related transportation stoppages disrupted supply for several months. The UAE now has a food security minister and Food Security Council.

The Abraham Accords announced between Israel and the UAE on August 13—and with Bahrain a month later—give these countries access to promising food-supply solutions from the ground up.

"The Gulf states see how we produce vegetables in the desert and are very impressed. This is essential to them and they seek companies that can deploy technologies tomorrow," says Edouard Cukierman, chairman of Cukierman Investment House and managing partner at Catalyst Fund.

He and senior partners of his Tel Aviv-based firm recently met with Hamed Ahmed Ali, CEO of Nasdaq Dubai and the local stock exchange, to discuss opportunities for Israeli businesses.

"One topic that came up again and again is food security," Cukierman tells ISRAEL21c. "They are ready to allocate a lot of funds to assuring their food supply."

Established Israeli companies in fields such as precision agriculture and irrigation, seed treatment, desalination and solar energy can step swiftly into the welcoming UAE landscape and perhaps even partner with UAE ag-tech startups.

have identified 200 companies that we think fit the food-security sector and we'll choose about 20 that have a major opportunity to deploy in the UAE," says Cukierman.

He plans to introduce them at the first UAE version of his firm's Goforlsrael investment conferences, which normally happen in Tel Aviv, China and European countries such as Switzerland.

Dhabi-based investor Ahmed Nasser Al Nowais confirms that producing food locally is a top priority. His country hopes to incorporate Israeli methods to do so economically and sustainably in a semiarid climate.

"In our part of the world, they are not focusing on agritech enough.

I heard Israel has the best startup ecosystem and agri-tech is a big part of that," says Al Nowais.

Cukierman learned that it's not only human food security at stake. The UAE's multimillion-dollar camel racing industry requires a million tons of ultra-premium feed annually.

"They are looking for technology to help with that, and the head of our life-sciences division, Dr. Laurent Choppe, happens to be a veterinarian," relates Cukierman.

### Power in Collaboration

Nasser Ahmed **Nowais** tells ISRAEL21c that the Emiratis are "maybe even more excited than you guys" about the normalization agreement with Israel.

"You have more excellent ideas than I ever saw from one country," he says.

Coming from an investment family office, Al Nowais has been an entrepreneur since age 16 and founded Annex Investments in 2017. His broad interests encompass sectors from automotive to fitness, tourism and telecom. Annex has worked with VCs in Germany, India and the Silicon Valley.

In addition to Israeli agricultural

technologies, he is also looking at health tech, ed tech, cyber security and machine learning.

Al Nowais chairs the events committee of the new nonprofit, government-supported Emirates Angels Investors Association, which signed a partnership deal with Tel Aviv Capital investment bank and co-hosted an online investor summit on September 22 with Jerusalembased OurCrowd.

"We're excited about this historic moment for the region, and to expand a community of peaceful coexistence and, most importantly, build a powerful engine of economic and cultural exchange," Emirates Angels Chairman Masaood Al Masaood told the multinational audience of about 1,000.

About 2,000 people registered for a follow-up event, "UAE Tech Investment Landscape: Introduction for the Israeli Ecosystem," broadcast from Abu Dhabi on October 13.

Emirati investors entrepreneurs talked about opportunities for collaboration in what Sabah al-Binali, OurCrowd's new venture partner and head Gulf called Region, the continued on next page

### Friedman: Palestinian Narrative of Victimization 'Coming to an End'

An astonishing level of criticism from Arab commentators, intellectuals and journalists has been leveled at the Palestinian leadership in recent weeks in response to its condemnations against countries such as the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Sudan, which have just signed normalization agreements with Israel.

Five years ago, it seemed that the Palestinians could never fall out of grace with Americans, the Arab world or even the Europeans. These days, all this seems to have changed.

Uzi Rabi, head of the Moshe Dayan Center at Tel Aviv University, sat down for a discussion with U.S. Ambassador to Israel David Friedman to discuss the peace agreements and the future of the Middle East on the impact of the recent agreements.

Friedman said he believes the normalization agreements have proven that "the sky's the limit."

He expressed hope that "in our lifetimes, God willing, we will see an end to the Arab-Israeli conflict as we've traditionally thought of it—the notion of a 22-member Arab League that is united in their opposition to Israel. I think it will come to an end."

"It doesn't mean all 22 Arab League nations will come on board," he added. "It will be incremental. But I have no doubt it will grow five, 10,

maybe more countries over time. And we are having discussions with many of them now. Each one has their own issues, their own population dynamics. It's not a one-size-fits-all type of arrangement. I'm enormously optimistic."

The new relationships are impacting the activities of Iran. Compared to just a few months ago, Israel now has the UAE and Bahrain as allies right on the Straits of Hormuz, and "in that region, there will be more," said Friedman. "What the Iranians are seeing are two things. They see their situation is deteriorating. Internally, they have enormous challenges. But they also see those opting for a path towards peace with Israel and strengthening their relationship with America."

"Some of us in Washington have looked at it simply as: The Iranians hate the agreements with the Emirates, Bahrain and others, and if they hate it so much, it must be good for the world and the region, and I think it is," he said.

As for the Palestinians, Rabi pointed out that they "feel as if they were neglected and left behind."

"Some say this Palestinian leadership is unable to move forward," he said and questioned whether there are alternative or younger Palestinian leaders who can take the lead and move towards normalization with Israel.

Friedman disagreed with the notion that the Palestinians have been neglected by the Arab world, saying he "would say just the opposite."

According to Friedman, the Palestinians "have been indulged by the Arab world, by the European Union, by others. People have made excuses for their malign activity for generations."

He said the Palestinians have received "enormous amounts of money," although he acknowledged the United States was a major contributor.

"We spent an enormous amount of money trying to build up Palestinian society," he said, but "no one has anything to show for it. The leadership has put a lot of money in their pocket. [Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas] is wealthy. His friends are wealthy. The prime minister of Israel travels on a chartered El Al flight. [He] flies on a \$75 million Boeing business jet wherever he wants all around the world when he has a GDP per capita 1/20th the size of Israel."

Friedman blamed the Palestinian leadership for being concerned only for "their own personal interests against the will of the Palestinian people."

"They failed. And to a certain extent the world has enabled that failure," he said.

He also noted that when he first began serving as ambassador, he noticed that the Palestinian leadership "repeatedly rejected economic opportunity in the West Bank because they felt it would hurt their narrative of victimization."

"So they would prefer their people suffer and remain angry than get the benefits of economic aid—real economic aid," he said. "I don't mean handouts. I mean real investments in the West Bank. It's been on the table

for three years. They don't want it. They don't want to normalize until they get everything they want."

# 'The reality is there is no leadership'

Friedman said the Palestinian leadership's policy of holding its population hostage "is terrific if you are the leader, and you're wealthy and you live in a palace and you have everything you want. It's a terrible policy for the 2.5 million people living in Judea and Samaria who can live better."

"Who is the leadership?" Friedman asked regarding the Palestinians. "The reality is there is no leadership. You couldn't shake hands with anybody today with any sense of assurance that tomorrow we'd move forward on an agreement because no one can deliver the Palestinian people because they have thrived on conflict."

So where will this lead?

"We put a plan on the table, and it may not be everything they like," said Friedman, "but it presented a realistic solution that would have also resulted in a highly favorable economic boom to the region. Again, investment and infrastructure—not charity. The leadership ran to the U.N. General Assembly and ripped it all up publicly."

Friedman said that countries in the region "are starting to realize that if they hold their own progress back in order to facilitate the Palestinians, they could be waiting forever."

"If the Palestinians are reading the tea leaves correctly, they need to engage," he advised. "They need to stop relying upon the narrative of victimization. It served them well for a couple of generations, but I think that time is coming to an end."

## Report: Israel in Top Four Out of 47 Nations Fighting International Bribery

Transparency International's global index ranks Israel in its highest category with respect to enforcing laws barring the bribery of foreign officials.

Transparency International, a watchdog group fighting corruption worldwide, named Israel in its top category for enforcement against corruption in international transactions, financial daily Globes reported in mid October. This is the second successive year in which Israel has gotten top marks for combating this type of corruption.

The United States, the United Kingdom and Switzerland were also given top marks among the 47

countries surveyed, according to the report.

Transparency International operates in over 100 countries and its Israeli office is headed by the former president of the National Labor Court Judge Nili Arad.

Recognizing the efforts that Israel has invested in enforcing laws designed to eliminate corruption from international deals, the report said that between 2016 and 2019, local law-enforcement agencies have launched 10 investigations

into such cases. One criminal indictment was filed and three cases concluded with imposing sanctions on the suspected parties.

According to *Globes*, the report made note of directives issued by the State Attorney's Office in October 2019, outlining policy with regard to indicting corporations and the relevant penalties under the law. Investigations of foreign bribery cases are carried out by the Israel Police's National Fraud Unit and are supervised by the

Lahav 433 Major Crimes Unit. Some involve the Israel Securities Authority and Tax Authority.

A statement by the Justice Ministry said, "Israel sees effective enforcement of the prohibition against bribery of a foreign official as an important element in the campaign to create an international climate free of corruption that also contributes to the strengthening of the maintenance of honest practices within Israel."

# White Supremacist Jailed Over Plot to Bomb Las Vegas Synagogue, ADL

A white supremacist who told an undercover FBI agent about his plans to firebomb a synagogue or attack a Las Vegas bar catering to LGBTQ customers was sentenced November 13 to two years in prison. As member of offshoot of neo-Nazi group Atomwaffen Division, Conor Climo expressed hatred of Jews, African Americans and gay people; was found collecting bomb-making materials

Conor Climo, 24, apologized before US District Judge James Mahan sentenced him to prison followed by six months of home confinement with electronic monitoring. Prosecutors recommended a 30-month prison sentence. "I was truly wrong for all of this," Climo said. "I even have come to really regret everything, everything that I was involved with."

Defense attorney Paul Riddle said his client is grateful that FBI agents arrested him when they did because he knows that he was on a "very dark path."

"But he's not on that path anymore,

and he's the not same person that was arrested," Riddle said.

The FBI said it began investigating Climo in April 2019 after learning of his encrypted internet chats with members of Feuerkrieg Division, an international offshoot of a US-based neo-Nazi group called Atomwaffen Division. Climo told FBI agents that he joined Feuerkrieg Division but left because he "became bored with the group and their inaction," according to a court filing.

Climo, in pleading guilty to a firearm charge, acknowledged that he discussed attacking a synagogue or other targets during his online communications with an undercover FBI agent and an informant. Agents who searched Climo's Las Vegas home found bomb components and two rifles.

Climo was "not just talking about what he believes and intends to do, but rather is planning, and has engaged in actions," a federal magistrate judge wrote after Climo's arrest.



### European Jewish Population at Lowest Share for a Millennium and Declining

Jews' share of the population of Europe is as low now as it was 1,000 years ago and is declining even further, according to a landmark new demographic study.

The study published October 21 by the London-based Institute for Jewish Policy Research found 1.3 million people who describe themselves as Jewish in continental

Europe, the United Kingdom, Turkey and Russia.

That figure has declined by nearly 60% since 1970, when there were 3.2 million Jews in the same area, wrote the report's authors, Daniel Staetsky and Sergio DellaPergola.

That decline, which follows the death of about 6 million European Jews in the Holocaust, owes mostly

to the emigration of more than 1.5 million people following the collapse of the Iron Curtain, their data shows.

But Western Europe, too, has lost 8.5% of its Jewish population since 1970. It is home to just over a million Jews today compared to 1,112,000 in 1970.

In particular, the Jewish community of Germany is in a "terminal" state

because more than 40% of its 118,000 Jews are above the age of 65, whereas less than 10% are under 15, the study says. This reality, which exists also in Russia and Ukraine, "foreshadows high death rates and unavoidable future population decline," according to the study.

### Jonathan Sacks, Former UK Chief Rabbi and Jewish 'Intellectual Giant,' Dies at 72

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, the former chief rabbi of the United Kingdom whose extensive writings and frequent media appearances commanded a global following among Jews and non-Jews alike, has died at age 72. He was in the midst of a third bout of cancer, which he had announced in October.

Sacks was among the world's leading exponents of Orthodox Judaism for a global audience. In his 22 years as chief rabbi, he emerged as the most visible Jewish leader in the United Kingdom and one of the European continent's leading Jewish voices, offering Jewish wisdom to the masses through a regular segment he produced for the BBC. He had a close relationship with former British Prime

Minister Tony Blair, who called Sacks "an intellectual giant" and presented him with a lifetime achievement award in 2018.

Sacks was also an immensely prolific author, addressing pressing social and political issues in a succession of well received books.

"When anger erupts in a body politic, there is quite often a justified cause. But then the political domain has got to take that anger and deal with it very fast," he told JTA's opinion editor Laura Adkins. "Because anger exposes the problem but never delivers the solution."

But he did take public stances on two topics that were often ensnared with European politics: Israel and anti-

Semitism.

Sacks spoke out publicly as Britain's Labour Party was engulfed in an anti-Semitism scandal under its previous leader Jeremy Corbyn, calling Corbyn an anti-Semite.

"We have an anti-Semite as the leader of the Labour Party and her majesty's opposition. That is why Jews feel so threatened by Mr. Corbyn and those who support him," Sacks said in 2018 during an interview with the New Statesman.


That judgement paved the way for the current British Chief Rabbi Ephraim Mirvis to harshly condemn the Labour Party, a precedent-setting event in British Jewish life.


Corbyn was replaced in April by centrist Keir Starmer, who has apologized for how anti-Semitism was allowed to flourish in Labour's ranks under Corbyn. Starmer, who is married to a Jewish woman, expressed his condolences to "the entire Jewish world." Sacks "was a towering intellect whose eloquence, insights and kindness reached well beyond the Jewish community. I have no doubt that his legacy will live on for many generations."

Sacks was also vocal in his opposition to the forces that lead to anti-Semitism on the far left and the far right. "Anti-Semitism has little to do with Jews — they are its object, not its cause — and everything to do with dysfunction in the communities that harbor it."

Sacks is survived by his wife Elaine, three children and several grandchildren.

# Israel Signs COVID Vaccine Deal Days After Netanyahu Noted How Pfizer CEO is 'Proud' of his Jewish Heritage

Israel's government has signed an agreement with the Pfizer pharmaceutical company to acquire 8 million doses of its vaccine.

"This is a great day for the State of Israel and a great day on the way to our victory over the coronavirus," Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said in a statement November 13, adding that he is working "to ensure that we will receive the vaccine together with the leading countries around the world and that we will not get pushed back in line."

The announcement came days after Netanyahu said in a video address that Israel would be able to sign a deal with Pfizer in part because the company's CEO, Albert Bourla, told Netanyahu he is proud to be Jewish.

"Albert Bourla is very proud of his Greek heritage and of his Jewish heritage, from Thessaloniki," Netanyahu said. "After this conversation, which was very productive and very practical, I'm convinced we will complete the contract with Pfizer."

Pfizer announced on November 9 that late-stage trials of its vaccine were more than 90% effective. The pharmaceutical giant is now the leader among several companies working to develop a vaccine for COVID-19. Its

vaccine still needs to be approved by the Food and Drug Administration, along with Israel's equivalent agency.

After keeping its COVID-19 cases to a minimum this spring, Israel began experiencing recordhigh numbers of

cases in the summer and fall. While the numbers have since gone down, Netanyahu's government has been criticized for inconsistency in its lockdown policies, and for providing

exceptions to Israel's haredi Orthodox population, which has experienced particularly high case numbers.

"We must all continue to keep the directives and the rules until the arrival of the vaccines, and even afterwards," Netanyahu said. "If we continue to work together with the same caution, responsibility and unity, we will be among the first in the world to successfully exit the coronavirus crisis."

Netanyahu said that the vaccine should begin arriving in the country in January.

### UAE Ambassador 'Excited and Optimistic' about Israel Ties

UAE Ambassador to the US Yousef Al Otaiba says Middle East divided into extremist and pragmatist camps.

United Arab Emirates Ambassador to the United States Yousef Al Otaiba spoke about the Abraham Accords and the changing political makeup of the Middle East in an address to the online session of the Institute for National Security Studies (INSS) on November 11.

Addressing the growing relationship between Israel and the UAE, Ambassador Otaiba said: "We are optimistic and enthusiastic about this relationship. I hope Israelis are equally excited to get to know our people, heritage and values - not just our shiny buildings and nice airports."

"Having trade, investment, research, a joint space program - it's good for our two countries. As for me, I promised a good friend of mine we'll visit Israel when the time is right, as soon as Covid is a little more under control & things look somewhat more normal," he said,

"We still believe the 2 state solution is the only game in town. You need to move forward with this. The Palestinians are not going away. At the end of the day - all we can do is create the space. We're going to have tough conversations with the Israeli government about the Palestinians and the Palestinian state.

This requires diplomacy and more importantly willingness and political courage from the leaders to make compromises and resolve this issue.

He said that he was proud that the UAE was the first Gulf State to normalize ties with Israel. "What we did with Israel kind of broke the ice and broke the taboo. This is no longer impossible. Bahrain and Sudan followed right after, this is not one or two countries doing something unconventional. This is a trend, a pattern."

"I was talking to a young gentleman from the Economic Department in Abu Dhabi and he said they're overwhelmed by the number of Israeli companies that want to set up businesses in Abu Dhabi. I took that as a very good sign.

Addressing the political make-up of the Middle East, Otaiba said that "our part of the world is divided into 2 camps: (1) Turkey, Iran and Qatar that promote radicalization and inject religion into any debate; (2) UAE, Bahrain, Jordan, Egypt and Saudi Arabia - who are more focused on a pragmatic approach and their future."

"This is the big fault line in the middle east today, the defining conflict of ideologies. We think our approach is better for us, for our societies and for our kids. There are other countries who just prefer to look backwards and focus on religion and extremism."

### Dutch Senate Calls to Affirm Jewish Ties to Temple Mount

On November 10 the Dutch Senate passed a motion calling for the Netherlands to vote against UN resolutions that use only the Arabic name for the Temple Mount, thus denying Judaism's connection to its holiest site.

The motion, by Sen. Peter Schalk of the Christian SGP faction, asked the government "to vote as much as possible against UN resolutions referring to the Temple Mount using only the Arabic name 'al-Haram al-Sharif' and to encourage other European Union countries to do the same"

The Senate approved the motion with 50 in favor and 25 opposed.

The vote came after the Netherlands voted in favor of six out of seven annual UN resolutions concerning Israel in early November, including "Israeli Practices Affecting the Human Rights of the Palestinian People in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, Including East Jerusalem," which refers to the Temple Mount, Judaism's holiest site, only as al-Haram al-Sharif.

This is not the first time that lawmakers in The Hague called on their government to vote with Israel at the UN. In 2017, the Dutch parliament called on the government to come out against the disproportionate focus on Israel at UN institutions. That motion was an initiative of Kees van der Staaij,

also of SGP.

In the ensuing years, there have been numerous parliamentary questions and calls for the government of the Netherlands to act on the motion, but it has not done so.

That the Senate, which rarely tables motions on foreign affairs, adopted a motion calling on the government to change its UN votes can be seen as a reprimand to the executive for ignoring a motion from parliament.

Ambassador to the Netherlands Naor Gilon applauded the motion, which he said "fights the continuing discrimination towards Israel in the UN.

"This is a clear message against

attempts by different factors to erase the historic connection of over 3,000 years between the Jewish people and Jerusalem," Gilon stated.

Hague-based Israel advocacy group CIDI welcomed the motion, as well, saying that "the Dutch government should respect [the 2017 motion] and act against disproportionate scheduling of Israel at UN institutions. All members of the UN should receive the same, equal treatment.

"The motion adopted now by the Senate should be a wake-up call for the Dutch ministry of foreign affairs that it has to truly start working on implementing the parliamentary adopted motion [by] van der Staaij," CIDI's statement read.

### German Think-Tank Survey: Palestinians Prefer Binational State with Jordan if No Statehood Possible

A new extensive multi-country survey released by the German think-tank Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung on November 11 assessed attitudes from multiple countries on a wide arrange of topics related to the Middle East, Abraham Accords and Israeli-Palestinian relations, which was covered in part here.

Citizens from multiple countries participated in the survey, hailing from Israel, the United Arab Emirates (UAE), Bahrain, the Palestinian Authority, Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Morocco, United States and Germany, focusing numerous topics such as Israel's status as a Jewish state, a future Palestinian state and views on the US election.

On the question of a future Palestinian state, a clear majority of citizens of the UAE (81%),\_Bahrain (72%), Palestinian

Authority (84%), Saudi Arabia (88%), Morocco (90%) and Qatar (85%) support the creation of such state, in contrast to a plurality of Germans (47%) and Americans (45%) who support the idea. Likewise, a majority of Israelis (58%) said they are opposed to the creation of the Palestinian state, while 35% support the idea.

Under the assumption that a Palestinian state is not possible, respondents were asked alternative options. A plurality of respondents in Bahrain (50%), Palestinian Authority (47%), Saudi Arabia (37%), Morocco (47%), Germany (42%) and the US (44%) said they are unsure. Interestingly, the second most preferred option among the Palestinians, Moroccans, Qataris and Saudis was a binational Palestinian-Jordan state, while the second most

preferred for Germans was an Israeli-Palestinian federation. For citizens of the UAE, the most preferred option was an Israeli-Palestinian federation.

Among Israelis, the same question was posed. A slim plurality of Israelis (26%) said they would prefer a Palestinian-Jordanian binational state, followed by Palestinian remaining under Israeli rule, without being given citizenship (24%), the same amount of whom said they are unsure, an Israeli-Palestinian binational state (17%) and Israeli-Palestinian federation (9%).

A question of importance to Israelis, survey respondents were asked whether Israel has the "right to exist," and the "right to exist," as the "Nation-State of the Jewish people." As expected, a vast of majority of Israelis (81%), in addition to Emiratis (61%), Americans (69%) and a

plurality of Germans (46%) agreed that Israel has the "right to exist" as the "Nation-State of the Jewish people." A plurality of Bahrainis asked said they are unsure, while the vast majority of Palestinians (76%), Saudis (63%) and Moroccans (61%) disagreed that Israel has the "right to exist" as the "Nation-State of the Jewish people." A plurality of Qataris also disagreed.

When rephrased as simply a "right"

when rephrased as simply a right to exist," the results remain largely unchanged, with clear majorities in the UAE, US and Germany agreeing, and the majority of citizens of the Palestinian Authority, Saudi Arabia, Morocco and Qatar disagreeing, with a slight rise in support in each country in favor of Israel's "right to exist."

# Morocco Warmly Praised for National School Curriculum Teaching Judaism

Morocco has introduced a component covering its storied Jewish community into the national curriculum for school students, earning praise from Jewish leaders for the North African nation's positive approach to pluralism.

A statement in early November from the Association Mimouna — a Moroccan NGO that promotes awareness of the country's Jewish culture — explained that the curriculum for primary school students focuses "on the Hebraic/Jewish cultural component enshrined in the constitution, the historical royal visit to Bayt Dhakira and a short glimpse of the history of Moroccan Jews."

Dhakira is described as a "spiritual and heritage space" for Moroccan Judaism that is based in the historic Jewish quarter in the city of Essaouria.

"After almost 14 years of hard work, determination and perseverance, Moroccan Judaism has finally made it to the Moroccan educational system," the Association Mimouna said.

On November 5, two US Jewish leaders warmly praised King Mohammed VI of Morocco for his commitment "to perpetuate the Judeo-Moroccan legacy as an integral part of the Moroccan identity."

Moroccan Jews." In a joint statement,
Inaugurated last January, Bayt Jason Guberman of the American

Sephardi Federation and Malcolm Hoenlein of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations emphasized that the curriculum had been "released without outside prompting or fanfare in the Western press, a testament to this development being a genuine expression of Moroccan values."

"Ensuring Moroccan students learn about the totality of their proud history of tolerance, including Morocco's philosemitism, is an inoculation against extremism," the statement remarked. "We hope other countries take note and emulate the Kingdom's exceptional example."

Morocco has taken several steps in recent years to embrace its Jewish culture and history into school studies, including a course on the Nazi Holocaust that was incorporated in 2018.

Almost 500,000 Jews of Moroccan origin — the vast majority — presently live in Israel. The size of the community in Morocco is currently estimated at 2,500.

### Israel's Navy to Receive First German-made Sa'ar 6 Ship

One of four Sa'ar 6 ships currently being made for the IDF will be arriving in Israel in early December.

The first of the new missile ships set to defend Israel's shores and strategic sites will arrive in early December, after it was handed over to the Navy from the Thyssenkrup Marine shipyards in Germany.

The first of four new Sa'ar 6 ships,

built in Germany by ThyssenKrupp Marine Systems in conjunction with the needs of the IDF, will be named "INS Magen," and is intended to protect the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) in Israel's Mediterranean Sea. It is also intended to be capable of facing asymmetric battle methods facing the Navy from land, having been "tailor-made" for the threats facing the country.

Command over the ship was officially transferred on October 29 from Germany to Israel. In the first few weeks after the Navy receives the ships, they will perform numerous exercise cruises intended to allow the teams to practice on the new equipment. It will anchor in several ports along the way in order to replenish supplies.

The Sa'ar 6-class corvette is a class of warships initially ordered for Israel's Navy in 2015. Similar to the German Braunschweig-class corvette, the Sa'ar 6 can accommodate an array of Israeli sensors and missiles such as the Iron Dome defense system and a handful of Electronic Warfare (EW) devices by Israel's Elbit Systems.

The ship will arrive from Germany to Israel without these defense supplies and will be equipped upon arriving in the country. The IDF will need to make the ship fully operational within a year and a half.

Despite there being numerous underwater and otherwise difficult threats that are not on land, the threats on land are currently the most critical

and therefore the Navy decided to go forth first and foremost with the Sa'ar 6.

Part of the need for the ship is due to threats to Israel's natural gas reservoirs along its border. Approximately 70% of Israel's electricity today is produced from natural gas and is expected to grow overtime, so its continued accessibility is crucial.

However, the gas rigs are a strategic target for the country's enemies. Assault ships such as the Sa'ar 6 are ideal for defense of these strategic spots.

Just north of the border, Hezbollah has an estimated arsenal of 130,000-150,000 missiles and rockets, the majority of them facing Israel's civilian home front and strategic infrastructure.

One such missile, the advanced anti-ship Russian-made Yakhont (P-800 Oniks), represents a serious threat and can endanger both Israeli commercial vessels in Israeli shipping lanes and Israel's gas rigs. Also at risk are the navy ships that operate in the area.

In May of last year, during a violent round that saw Hamas and Palestinian Islamic Jihad launch 690 rockets and mortars toward Israel over the span of less than 48 hours, Energy Minister Yuval Steinitz ordered the suspension of natural gas supplies from the Tamar field, over concerns that it could be targeted.

Hezbollah's secretary-general Hassan Nasrallah has made it clear that the gas rigs are targets for the group should another war with Israel break out, and according to Harel, "when Hezbollah has nothing left to lose, and they have their back against the wall, they will try to hit the Karish."

The Sa'ar 6 has a handful of

unique capabilities intended to handle such threats. It has numerous communications systems operated by the IDF in order to communicate with a handful of units and branches of the army, as well as an Anti-Ballistic Missile (ABM) system and radar-based steepshot shooting interception. The goal of these is to defend the country's maritime borders from Tactical Missile Systems (TMS) which the country's enemies apparently possess.

"It's a larger vessel with advanced and hi-tech systems along with long-range missiles, air-to-air, surface, and sea-to-air missiles. The radar is bigger and more advanced than what is on the Sa'ar 5. With a further range, you can operate the Sa'ar 6 in open seas and in rough sea conditions," said Rear Admiral Eyal Harel, the head of IDF naval operations.

The Sa'ar 6 will be fitted with two naval Iron Dome short-range defense missile launchers with 20 Tamir missiles for each launcher, 32 vertical launch cells for the Barak-8 long-range surface-to-air missile naval defense system, and 16 anti-ship missiles.


The ships, in addition to having interception missile defense systems, will also have 16 anti-ship missiles, one 76-mm. Oto Melara Super Rapid main gun, two Typhoon 25-mm. remote weapon stations and two 324-mm. torpedo launchers for Mark 54 Lightweight Torpedoes. Each ship will also be outfitted with

cyber and electronic warfare systems and ELTA's EL/M-2248 MF-STAR active electronically scanned array radar capable of tracking both air and surface targets.

As the EEZ spans over a far larger space than the land of Israel as a whole, the Sa'ar 6 allows the Navy to dominate a larger space and provide a protective shield around Israel's borders. In addition, the ship is capable of staying out at sea for an extended period of time in order to provide a more extensive period of protection in the more vulnerable regions of the EEZ.

The ships will additionally be armed with the means for detecting aerial and field targets, allowing the Sa'ar 6 to face a wide range of threats. It can also carry a Sea-Hawk helicopter.

### Have A Nosh With Miriam

Chanukah begins the evening of December 10<sup>th</sup>, and a great excuse to pull out the large frying pan and make latkes. The traditional recipe is always a winner, but the other two remind us of the many creative and delicious options possible. Wishing you a happy Chanukah! M.H.B.



### **CRISPY TRADITIONAL POTATO LATKES**

2 lbs. Russet or Yukon Gold potatoes 1 medium onion ½ cup chopped scallions (green onions) 2 large eggs, beaten

Salt & pepper to taste Vegetable oil for frying

Peel potatoes and drop in cold water until all are peeled. Using a grater or food processor, coarsely grate the potatoes and onion. Place together in a fine-mesh strainer and press out all the water over a bowl. The potato starch will settle to the bottom. Carefully pour off the water and retain the potato starch, adding it to the potato/onion mixture in a bowl. Add the scallions, eggs, salt and pepper. Mix well.

Heat a thin film of oil in a non-stick frying pan. Use about 2 tablespoons of the potato mixture per latke and add to pan, flattening the mixture out with the back of the spoon or spatula. Fry until golden then flip and brown second side. Drain on paper towels. Serve immediately, traditionally with sour cream or applesauce. Makes 24-28 latkes.

### YAM & CRYSTALLIZED GINGER LATKES

1 egg ½ teaspoon fresh lemon juice ½ teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon freshly ground pepper 2 Tablespoons minced crystallized ginger 1½ Tablespoons honey 1 garlic clove, minced

2 medium yams (about 1 lb.), peeled & grated 1 small onion, grated 1½ teaspoons flour 1/4 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 to 1/3 cup vegetable oil 1/3 cup sour cream or chunky applesauce

In a large bowl, combine egg, lemon juice, salt and pepper and beat until well blended.

Add ginger, honey and garlic and mix well. Stir in grated yams and onion. Sprinkle flour and baking powder over yam mixture, mixing well.

In a large frying pan, over medium heat, add 2 tablespoons oil. Drop tablespoons of mixture into the hot oil and flatten with back of a spoon. Cook, turning once, until golden on both sides, about 5 minutes total. Drain on paper towels and keep warm in a low oven until all batter has been made into latkes. Serve warm, with sour cream and/or applesauce. May be made ahead and refrigerated up to two days. To heat, place in a single layer on a cookie sheet in a 450 oven for five minutes, or until heated through. Makes 24-30 mini latkes.

### APPETIZER CORN CAKE LATKES WITH GUACAMOLE

1½ cups corn kernels, preferably fresh 1/3 cup cornmeal

2 egg yolks 2 Tbsp. chives

½ cup milk

½ teaspoon each salt & pepper 1 Tbsp. oil

⅓ cup flour

4 Tbsp. melted unsalted butter

½ cup clarified unsalted butter

2 eggs

34 cup of your favorite guacamole recipe

Roughly chop the corn kernels by hand or with a few quick bursts in food processor until a chunky but creamy consistency is reached. Place in a large bowl and whisk in the cornmeal, milk and flour until no lumps remain. In a separate bowl combine the 4 Tbsp. melted butter, eggs and egg yolks. Stir in the corn mixture, add the chives and season with salt and pepper. Heat a large saucepan to medium high heat. Pour in the oil and half cup clarified butter. Using a ladle, make dollar size corn latkes, frying them approximately 2 minutes per side. Keep hot in a warm oven. Serve with a dollop of guacamole on top. Makes about 20 appetizer size latkes.


