# Landside Vote: Senate Votes 97-3 Making U.S. Embassy in Jerusalem Permanent

The bi-partisan amendment was approved 97-3, with the only objectors being Democratic Senators Bernie Sanders, Elizabeth Warren and Tom Carper.

In a landslide vote February 4, 2021, the Senate approved a budget resolution amendment making the U.S. Embassy in Jerusalem permanent, so that it could not be moved out of Israel's capital in the future.

"Pleased the Senate overwhelmingly passed the amendment Senator Hagerty and I introduced to make sure the U.S. Embassy to Israel remains located in Jerusalem, the capital of Israel," tweeted the bill's co-sponsor, Republican Senator Jim Infofe of Oklahoma.

"I am proud to introduce legislation to protect the U.S. Embassy from relocation or being downgraded," Inhofe said "It was an honor to see the U.S. Embassy moved to its rightful location in Jerusalem in 2018 after over 20 years of bipartisan effort and Sen. Hagerty and I are clear in our efforts to ensure it stays there. Israel is a true friend to the United States and I look forward to many more years of friendship."

The amendment, co-sponsored by 21 Republicans led by James Inhofe of Oklahoma, was added to the massive \$1.9 trillion budget bill the Senate passed as part of President Joe Biden's relief package. The bipartisan amendment was approved 97-3, with the only objectors being Democratic Senators Bernie Sanders, Elizabeth Warren and Tom Carper. During the election campaign Warren said that "if Israel takes steps counter to peace, I am prepared to freeze or reverse the limited



embassy functions that have moved to Jerusalem," and Sanders said he would "take into consideration" moving the embassy back to Tel Aviv.

The amendment sets aside funding to maintain the U.S. embassy in Jerusalem making it harder to reverse the move of the embassy from Tel Aviv. Biden had said he was not, in any case, going to move the embassy.

"The Trump Administration kept its promise to move the U.S. Embassy to Jerusalem, the eternal and indivisible capital of the Jewish State of Israel, and it should remain there," said Hagerty. "As former U.S. Ambassador to Japan, I know how important it is to recognize the core concerns of our allies, and it was a travesty that our government ignored U.S. law and declined to recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital for so many decades."

The Trump administration decision to move the embassy and recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital sparked wild predictions that violence would erupt across the region and set the quest for peace back by years.

However, not only did the embassy move shatter the myth that it would cause major conflict, but two years later, Israel signed peace treaties with five Muslim countries.

# New Israeli Drug Cured 29 of 30 Moderate/Serious COVID Cases in Days

A new coronavirus treatment being developed at Tel Aviv's Ichilov Medical Center has successfully completed phase 1 trials and appears to have helped numerous moderate-to-serious cases of COVID-19 quickly recover from the disease, the hospital said on February 5.

Hailing a "huge breakthrough," the hospital said Prof. Nadir Arber's EXO-CD24 substance had been administered

to 30 patients whose conditions

were moderate or worse, and all 30 recovered — 29 of them within three to five days.

The medicine fights the cytokine storm — a potentially lethal immune overreaction to the coronavirus infection that is believed to be responsible for much of the deaths associated with the disease.

It uses exosomes — tiny carrier sacs that shuttle materials between cells — to deliver a protein called CD24 to the lungs, which Arber has spent decades researching.

"This protein is located on the surface of cells and has a well known and important role in regulating the



immune system," said researcher Shiran Shapira of Arber's lab.

The protein helps calm down the immune system and curb the storm. The drug is designed to treat moderate and serious cases of the coronavirus and is given to patients via inhalation directly into the lungs. "The preparation is inhaled once a day for a few minutes, for five days," Arber said. "The preparation is directed straight to the heart of


the storm — the lungs — so unlike other formulas... which selectively restrain a certain cytokine, or operate widely but cause many serious side effects, EXO-CD24 is administered locally, works broadly and without side effects."

The medicine will now move on to further trial phases, but hospital officials were already hailing it as a possible game-changer in fighting serious COVID-19 illness.

Ichilov director Roni Gamzu,

the former coronavirus czar, said the research "is advanced and sophisticated and may save coronavirus patients. The results of the phase 1 trial are excellent and give us all confidence in the method [Arber] has been researching in his lab for many years."

He added: "I am proud that at Ichilov we are... possibly bringing a blue and white remedy to a terrible global pandemic."

Our Jewish Federation disburses funds in two major categories.

On one hand we address and respond to the needs and promote programs in our local community; and then, partnering with other Jewish Federations and Jewish organizations throughout the United States and around the world, we support projects in Israel and assist with the care of Jews in need throughout the world.

One of our longest affiliations is with the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI), an organization established in 1929 to assist Jews worldwide.

# Bon Appetit Magazine Edits Hamantaschen Article

As part of its "Archive Repair Project," Bon Appetit magazine changed the headline and content of a 2015 article about the Purim cookie hamantaschen and apologized for its "stereotypical characterizations of Jewish culture."

In an "editor's note" published at the start of the piece, the magazine said, "The original version of this article included language that was insensitive toward lewish food traditions and does not align with our brand's standards ... We have edited the headline, dek and content to better convey the history of Purim and the goals of this particular recipe. We apologize for

the previous version's flippant tone and stereotypical characterizations of Jewish culture."

The article's original headline "How to Make Actually Good Hamantaschen" was changed to "5 Steps to Really Good Hamantaschen." Appetit removed the sub-heading in which the article's non-Jewish writer said in "full disclosure" that because she attended "roughly three Bar or Bat Mitzvahs a weekend during 1992" and cooks professionally, she thought she could "at least weigh in on the Jewish cookie department."

Among other things changed

in the article's content was the description of the lewish holiday of Purim. Writer Dawn Perry, who is also Bon Appetit's digital food editor, originally said "The story of Purim involves a bad guy, Haman, a nice Jewish lady, Esther, and her ultimate victory over his plot to destroy the Jewish people."

Bon Appetit also deleted six sentences about Perry's observation that lews and non-lews alike on the BA staff "could only call up childhood memories of dry and sandy hamantaschen that left your mouth coated with a weird film." and her desire to "convert the

haters ... To create a hamantaschen that we could all enjoy, regardless of religious upbringing or tainted Hebrew School memories."

The response seemed unnecessary to some Twitter users, who found nothing offensive in the article's original text or headline.

"What was supposed to offend me? I don't get it. I always liked the regular hamantaschen. I like the ones filled with poppy seeds," wrote one user.

am confused," tweeted another. "... because every hamentashen I have has been good?"

# Israel's Inovytec Ventilator Coming to California By Abigail Klein Leichman, Israel 21c

Israeli medical device firm Inovytec has signed a deal to deliver 1,500 advanced portable ventilators to Global Medical Supply, a distributor that works with the state of California.

The Ventway Sparrow breathing machines will be used to aid patients with respiratory illnesses during the Covid-19 pandemic and beyond.

"When looking for a partner that could quickly supply us with the quality ventilators we needed, Inovytec answered the call. Its lightweight and durable ventilators give patients the flexibility needed to be transported between wards or hospitals seamlessly," said Edward Kim, a partner at Global Medical Supply.

"At the same time, Inovytec's ventilators are affordable, meaning we could care for more patients and the lack of constant maintenance allows us to keep them in storage if need be while knowing they will be ready when needed."

The Ventway Sparrow weighs only 1 kilogram (2.2 pounds) and



allows for invasive or noninvasive ventilation.

This ventilator is already being used in Covid-19 wards in Italy, Brazil and Israel. It is cleared for use in Canada, Australia and the United States under FDA Emergency Use Authorization.

Udi Kantor, co-founder and CEO of Inovytec, said ventilators have been an invaluable resource in recent months.

"Looking beyond the pandemic, our ventilators will enable paramedics and hospitals to safely and easily transfer patients, and we look forward to serving other medical facilities in California and other states."

Inovytec also makes the Sali first-aid

system for respiratory and cardiac emergencies; and the Lubo airway management and neck stabilization

system for emergency medical teams. The company was founded in 2011.

U.S. President Joe Biden's nominee to be U.S. ambassador to the United Nations pledged to combat the anti-Israel bias at the United Nations.

"I look forward to standing with Israel, standing against the unfair targeting of Israel, the relentless resolutions proposed against Israel unfairly," said Linda Thomas-Greenfield at her nomination hearing in front of the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee. "I look forward to working with Israel to develop a

strategy with them for engaging with countries that would appreciate having Israel's expertise to support their development efforts."



Linda Thomas-Greenfield

Thomas-Greenfield, a 35-

year diplomat, expressed hope that those countries that have normalized ties with Israel under the Abraham Accords—the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, Sudan and Morocco—"will also see some opportunities to be more cooperative at the U.N. and more supportive of Israel's presence there."

On Iran, Thomas-Greenfield assured that the Biden administration will work to prevent the regime from

getting a nuclear weapon.

"We've seen a tremendous amount of backtracking since" the United States withdrew from the 2015 Iran nuclear deal, she said. The withdrawal in May 2018 was followed by reimposing sanctions lifted under it, along with enacting new sanctions as part of what the Trump administration called a "maximum pressure" campaign.

Thomas-Greenfield said America would work with its allies and other members of the U.N. Security Council to "ensure that we hold Iran accountable."

Additionally, she noted that the United States would rejoin the U.N. Human Rights Council and the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, or UNESCO.

The United States withdrew from

the UNHRC in June 2018 after then-U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Nikki Haley cited the world body's "chronic" bias against Israel as one of the primary factors for the withdrawal.

The United States defunded UNRWA in September 2018, claiming that the refugee agency, which serves Palestinians, inflates the number of Palestinian refugees and furthers the Palestinian refugee problem. Critics have also said that UNRWA has inspired violence against Israel.

Finally, Thomas-Greenfield expressed opposition to the BDS movement against Israel, saying that it is "unacceptable" and "verges on anti-Semitic," and "it's important that they not be allowed to have a voice at the U.N., and I intend to work against that."

# To Battle Holocaust Denial, Facebook Announces Tool to Connect Users with Facts

In an effort to contend with Holocaust denial on its platform, Facebook announced that it will begin to connect users to a site with facts about the 20th-century atrocity that killed 11 million people, including 6 million Jews.

"We honor the memories of the victims and recognize the role we can play to help fulfill the promise 'Never Again.' We will begin to connect people with authoritative information about the Holocaust," said Facebook in a statement. "Anyone who searches on Facebook for terms associated with either the Holocaust or Holocaust denial will see a message from Facebook encouraging them to connect with credible information about the Holocaust off Facebook."



The Facebook tool connecting users to a website with facts about the Holocaust will first be available in English-speaking countries, including Australia, New Zealand, Canada, United Kingdom, Ireland and the United States. It will be available in more languages and countries over the coming months, according to the social-media platform.

That website to connect users with factual information is aboutholocaust. org, which was created by the World Jewish Congress with the support of

the U.N. Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, or UNESCO.

"Holocaust denial, Holocaust distortion and the spreading of conspiracy myths about the Holocaust generally have become cornerstones in the vicious incitement of anti-Semitic hatred on the part of white supremacists, neo-Nazis and other extremist forces," said WJC president Ronald S. Lauder in the Facebook statement.

In October 2020, Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg announced that the platform would be banning posts that deny or distort the Holocaust and would redirect users from posts that deny or distort the Holocaust to "authoritative sources to get accurate information."

Our recent projects have focused on children and youth programs. Two years ago we supported the building of their outdoor classroom, and this year's allocation is supporting their Center for Children with Special Needs and Pitchat Nitzana's children and youth programs.

# 17,000 Israeli Holocaust Survivors Died in 2020, at Least 900 From COVID-19

Nearly 17,000 Holocaust survivors died in 2020, with 900 of the fatalities being attributed directly to the coronavirus pandemic, according to a new report released by Israel's Central Bureau of Statistics in late January. The annual report is traditionally

published on the eve of International Holocaust Remembrance Day.

According to the bureau, the death rate stands at 17%, while nearly 5,300 survivors have been infected by COVID-19, a percentage similar to that of the general population in the

same age group (16%). In women, the percentage of deaths from contracting the disease was lower than in men — 15% versus 21%.

According to the Central Bureau of Statistics, at the end of 2020, there were around 180,000 people living

in Israel recognized by the Authority for the Rights of Holocaust Survivors.

Among them, 850 Holocaust survivors have reached the age of 100 and over, it was said. The average age of a Holocaust survivor in Israel is 85.

# While Skies Officially Shut, Exception Made for 300 Ethiopian Jewish Immigrants

Newcomers taken from Ben Gurion Airport to 14-day quarantine period, but 6-year-old passenger in need of emergency heart surgery whisked to hospital By Cnaan Liphshiz, JTA

Ben Gurion Airport reopened briefly on February 12 for 302 new immigrants from Ethiopia, including a 6-year-old boy in need of emergency heart surgery.

The newcomers were taken to a 14-day quarantine period, but the boy was quickly moved to a local hospital.

The Ethiopians, among about 8,000 with Jewish ancestry awaiting immigration to Israel, had been tested for COVID-19 in Gondar prior to arriving, according to a statement by the International Christian Embassy Jerusalem, or ICEJ, an evangelical group that sponsored

their arrival and chartered the plane that brought them.

From Gondar, the immigrants traveled on buses for 12 hours to Addis Ababa before the four-hour

flight to Israel.

"Now their dreams have come true of finally reuniting with their families in the Promised Land," ICEJ another group President Jürgen Bühler said in a statement. "We also have many Christians worldwide to thank for making this flight possible."

The airport has been shuttered since January 26 as part of the government's attempts to curb the spread of the coronavirus. They are slated to remain closed until at least February 20.

The Ethiopians, known as Falash Mura, are widely believed to have converted to Christianity under duress while adhering to some Jewish traditions.

Israel completed the airlifting of another group of Ethiopian Jews known as Beta Israel in the 1990s.

The Israeli government has allowed the Falash Mura to immigrate under the country's Law of Return for Jews and their relatives.

# Auschwitz Vaccine Poster Puts Corbyn's Brother in Jail

Former United Kingdom Labour Party head Jeremy Corbyn's brother Piers was arrested in late January for posters bearing his name that criticize vaccines using an image of the Auschwitz death camp, where the Nazis slaughtered close to a million Jews during the Holocaust.

Piers' brother, Jeremy Corbyn, was forced to step down from his post as head of Labour after getting trounced in national elections following an anti-Semitism scandal that rocked the very core of his farleft faction.

Piers Corbyn is an anti-vaccination activist and "came up with the 'concept idea' for the poster which depicts Auschwitz but changes its infamous phrase at its gate from 'Arbeit Macht Frei', meaning 'work sets you free', to 'vaccines are safe path to freedom," Jewish News reported.

"Police confirmed 'officers investigating reports of malicious



Piers Corbyn and 'Auschwitz' poster material in the form of a leaflet being circulated in south London in late January have made two arrests," Jewish News added, referring to the Corbyn arrest.

The report continued, "The leaflet contained material that appeared to compare the Covid-19 vaccination program with the Holocaust."

Another member of the Labour party, Neil Coyle, reported the leaflet to the police, commenting he was "absolutely sickened by anti-vax conspiracy theory crackpot leaflets put through some doors in SE17 today."

Under Jeremy Corbyn's stewardship, the Labour party committed "unlawful harassment"

against Jews, according to a 130-page report by the UK's Equality and Human Rights Commission (EHCR). Corbyn flat out denied the EHRC's findings and blamed a "political conspiracy" for the investigation, prompting his suspension from the party, though he was reinstated in short order.

The anti-Semitism that festered on Corbyn's watch did not evade reproach from some of the biggest leaders in the Jewish community. In a 2018 interview with The New Statesman, the late Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks, who served as the Chief Rabbi of Great Britain for 22 years, warned that Corbyn gives "support to racists, terrorists and dealers of hate, who want to kill Jews and remove Israel from the map," adding that the Labour leader uses "the language of classic pre-war European anti-Semitism."




# ICC Chief Justice Says His Colleagues Were Wrong About Israel Ruling

Judge Peter Kovacs says judges who ruled against Israel were wrong and jumped to conclusions not based in law. By Paul Shindman, World Israel News

The senior judge at the International Criminal Court said his colleagues were wrong about the Palestinians and Israel, issuing a dissenting opinion February 7 detailing the mistakes they made.

Judge Peter Kovacs wrote that the majority of his colleagues had erred repeatedly in their interpretation of the law when they ruled that the ICC has jurisdiction in the Palestinian territories, even though the Palestinians are not a state member of the ICC and Israel does not belong to the court at all.



appropriate in answering the question before this Chamber, and in my view, they have no legal basis in the Rome Statute and even less so in public international law," Kovacs wrote in his dissension.

criticized Kovacs also his colleagues for jumping conclusions, saying they were wrong to assume that there was such a thing as a state called "Palestine."

"These formulas ('early realization' — in French: 'en vue de la réalisation rapide' - and 'in preparation for independence') can hardly be interpreted as referring to an already existing, independent and sovereign State," the judge wrote.

"I agree neither with the conclusion, nor with the Majority's reasoning and analysis in reaching such a conclusion," he said.

The Palestinians and other anti-Israel groups had petitioned the court to charge Israel with war crimes over not only military action taken in Gaza following Hamas rocket attacks on Israel, but they also claim that Israeli housing in Judea and Samaria is a "war crime."

The court ruling could pave the way for the court to prosecute members of the IDF for actions the Palestinians claim were against international law. While the court hinted it might also look at actions of the Hamas terror group, its arbitrary decision to consider the Palestinians as an existing nation, even though their only status is that of "observer-state" at the UN, angered both Israeli politicians and the IDF.

Kovacs says the other judges failed to take into account

numerous statutes and agreements and had only considered "pre-1967 borders' type formulas" that he said do not stand alone and should have been read alongside the Oslo and other agreements signed in 1993 and later.

"Had we referred to the Oslo Accords... this would have provided us with a more nuanced and, in my view, far more solid basis for the decision," Kovacs gave as one example.

"We find ourselves in ambiguous and delicate situation," Kovacs wrote, noting in one section that the large number of countries treating the Palestinians as a country did not legally turn it into a nation member of the ICC.

Reporter Eylon Levy noted that Judge Kovacs' intricately detailed 163-page dissension is worth reading because the criticism of the other judges' ruling comes from a recognized legal expert who is not connected to Israel at all.

# Coronavirus: El Al Becomes World's First Airline to Vaccinate **Entire Staff**

In a sign that we one day might return to normalcy, El Al Israel Airlines has announced that all employees that come into contact passengers have been vaccinated, Israel Hayom reported February 12.

With this announcement, El Al has made history for being the world's first airline to have all of its relevant staff, including attendants, security personnel, pilots, and other service

In a statement, El Al's local competitor, Israir, said 95% of its pilots had had received the dose of the vaccine.

Another airline, Arkia Israeli Airlines, announced around 70% of its employees had been vaccinated against COVID-19.

On February 8 it was reported that El Al is to operate direct emergency

personnel, inoculated against the flights to New York and Dubai, after winning a bid by Israel's Civil Aviation Authority.

> However, it was reported on Friday that Ben-Gurion Airport will be shut down at least until February 21 in an effort to lower the COVID-19 infection.





# Marvel Comics Apologizes, Wipes Anti-Semitic Image from Latest Issue of 'Immortal Hulk'

Stung by widespread condemnation, Marvel Comics this week removed anti-Semitic imagery from the latest issue of its Immortal Hulk comic.

The issue, published in early February, was slammed after some readers noticed that one panel featured the character Joe Fixit, in control of Bruce Banner's body, stepping into a jewelry store.

The name of the shop – "Cronemberg Jewery" – is seen in reverse on the window above a Star of David. The site ComicsXF said: "[The] only conceivable

interpretation, to put it frankly, is that this is a visual play on the old and anti-Semitic trope of Jews running the diamond business." It described the panel as "an incredibly overt anti-Semitic dogwhistle."

The issue's artist, Joe Bennett, subsequently apologized on Facebook, writing that he had been including references to famous horror movie directors throughout the series, and that he had intended to feature a nod to David Cronenberg in issue 43. The misspellings of jewelry and Cronenberg, he said, were "an

honest but terrible mistake" because he was writing backwards, but he added that he had "no excuse" for the inclusion of the Star of David.

"I failed to understand this troubling and offensive stereotype, and after listening to you all, I now understand my mistake," he wrote. "This was wrong, offensive, and hurtful in many ways. This is a mistake I must own, and I am sorry to everyone who I hurt by this. I am working with Marvel to correct this, and I am using this lesson to reflect on how I approach my stories and my work."

Marvel said that it "fully acknowledged this mistake was missed on our side as well." The legendary comic book publisher has now wiped the Star of David and the writing from the store window in the digital edition and is reprinting the issue.

# Swastikas Painted in Front of Cal Poly's SLO Campus' Jewish Fraternity House

Police in California are investigating after a Jewish fraternity at the California Polytechnic State University reported finding swastikas and other anti-Semitic graffiti painted outside its house.

The symbols were scrawled in front of the Alpha Epsilon Pi fraternity house in California's San Luis Obispo County on Friday night, campus authorities said.

"We awoke to multiple swastikas and antisemitic statements spraypainted on and in front of our house," the fraternity wrote in an Instagram post on Saturday.

University President Jeffrey Armstrong and other officials Saturday evening said in a statement that the incident was reported to the San Luis Obispo Police Department and an investigation is underway, according to The Tribune of San Luis Obispo County, which is located about halfway between San

Francisco and Los Angeles.

"Let us be perfectly clear: behavior that promotes any form of hate and seeks to make members of our community feel unsafe and unwelcome – especially in their own home – has absolutely no place in our community," the university president's message said.

In 2018, Cal Poly made the news because of a push to increase funding to all student groups except those with a "Zionist ideology."

# Bipartisan Bill, Backed by Jewish Vets in Congress, Would Join US and Israel in PTSD Research

A slate of Democrats and Republicans, including two Jewish military veterans, introduced a bill that would join U.S. and Israeli researchers seeking to treat PTSD.

The bill introduced Thursday would establish a grant program for American universities and nonprofits to team up with Israeli counterparts to research post-traumatic stress disorder.

Its sponsors in the U.S. House of Representatives are Democrats Elaine Luria of Virginia and Chrissy Houlahan of Pennsylvania and

Republicans Michael Waltz of Florida and Lee Zeldin of New York. Luria and Zeldin are Jewish and Houlahan's father is Jewish; all

three are military veterans.

In the Senate, the sponsors are Robert Menendez, a New Jersey Democrat, and Jerry Moran, a Kansas Republican.


"Too many of our bravest men and women come home with invisible wounds from the trauma they experienced while fighting for our country," Luria said in a release. "Congress can uphold its end of the promise by facilitating groundbreaking research to find treatments for post-traumatic stress disorder."

Zeldin, the lead spokesman on Israel issues for Republicans, said in the same release, "It's estimated that 20 US veterans per day take their own life, oftentimes due to the invisible wounds of war and we cannot afford to waste any

time. Inspiring further research collaboration between our two nations will establish an international brain trust invaluable to the servicemembers of both our great countries."

Waltz and Luria advanced a similar bill last year, but it went nowhere. Now the measure has Senate backing and is getting off the ground early, suggesting it has a better chance of becoming law.

# Social Media Superstar Launches Campaign to 50 Million Followers Against Anti-Semitism Martin: 'As a girl of Jewish and Hispanic descent, I have received my fair share of hate on social media over the years.'

Social media superstar Baby Ariel has launched a new campaign, calling on her tens of millions of followers to spread awareness about anti-Semitism and hatred. In a message across her social media platforms, Baby Ariel reflected on the abuse she has received as a Jewish-Hispanic woman and detailed how such hate, if left unchallenged, can culminate in Nazism and white supremacism. In just three days, more than one million of her followers have engaged in the campaign.

Baby Ariel, whose real name is Ariel Martin, is an American social media star, singer and actress. She currently has 35 million Tik Tok followers, 9 million Instagram followers, 1 million Twitter followers and her YouTube channel has 3 million subscribers. Baby Ariel released the first of several singles in 2017 and has written and produced new music coming out in the summer. She has starred in a number of TV and movie roles, most notably in Disney Channel's "Zombies 2" and an upcoming starring role in the thriller "Oracle". Since her rise to fame aged 15, Ariel has always

spoken out against racism, bullying and has been a champion for the underdog. Her self-directed and produced music video Wildside, pays homage to the trans community. She won the Teen Choice Award for "Choice Muser" in 2016 and 2017 and has been cited as a top influencer by Forbes, People and USA Today.

In a video message, published across her social media accounts, Baby Ariel revealed her own personal experience of hatred, saying "As a girl of Jewish and Hispanic descent, I have received my fair share of hate on social media over the years and trust me, it always hurts to get hate because of who you are."

She then warned about a "hate that kills" and asked viewers to "Imagine getting targeted, arrested and killed because of your religion or skin color, your sexuality or because of your disability." Baby Ariel then described how "the Nazis murdered six million lews and another six million Catholics. Jehovah's Witnesses, gay men and women and children with disabilities."

In the video, she goes on to warn "that same kind of hate is riding

again in too many places around the world... We need to speak up now and do something about it, because it is spreading and it can happen again."

Emphasizing Martin Luther King Jr's quote that "Hate cannot drive out hate, only love can do that," Baby Ariel concludes by saying "let's spread awareness, light and love to drive out the hate," urging her followers to "Share your story of how you have received and overcome hate with the hashtag #smashhate and #neveragain".

The campaign aims to increase awareness among young people regarding the dangers of anti-Semitism, racism and hatred, encouraging them to speak out and take action against it. It is being coordinated in partnership with the Combat Anti-Semitism Movement.

Baby Ariel will join the discussion as a representative of her generation at the Combat Anti-Semitism Movement's Annual Summit, taking place online on March 1st.

Since Baby Ariel posted the video on January 27th, it has been liked, commented on or shared by more than one million people across Tik Tok, Instagram, Twitter and YouTube. In just a matter of days, the campaign has succeeded in bringing a message of tolerance and hope to a wide audience.

Sacha Roytman Dratwa, Executive Director, Combat Anti-Semitism Movement said, "We are delighted that Baby Ariel is taking this important step to engage young people in the fight against anti-Semitism and hatred. She is one of the most influential global voices for a new generation. Sadly, social media is too often filled with bigotry and intolerance and history shows us that such words are soon followed by acts of hate. Baby Ariel is amplifying the voices of tolerance and respect, spreading the hope which will ultimately defeat hate."

## Senior Iranian Cleric Calls for End to Hostilities with Israel

"It's time for the Iranian regime to cease inventing enemies that do not exist," says opposition figure Abdol-Hamid Masoumi-Tehrani. By i24NEWS and Israel Hayom Staff

A former senior Iranian cleric spoke with Israeli media for the first time from Tehran, calling for an end to hostilities between the two countries and saying that the Islamic Republic's frequent talks about their intention to destroy Israel are "serious."

In an unprecedented interview, Ayatollah Abdol-Hamid Masoumi-Tehrani, a current opposition figure whose "ayatollah" title was revoked by Tehran due to disagreements with the regime, told Israel's Channel 12 News that he has «no problem» with the lewish state.

"It is time for the Iranian regime to stop inventing enemies that don't exist," he asserted. "The Iranians and the lews have many years of friendship, I have not met any Iranians who had a negative opinion

of Israel."

The ex-religious figure confessed that his longtime wish has been to travel to Jerusalem and "pray at the Western Wall."

Tehrani also added that since the 1980s, Iran's Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei has been trying to "ruin"



According to the opposition figure, the Islamic Republic is a "dictatorship that stifles dissenting opinions and freedom of expression."

"With God's help, if I stay alive, I would like to see the day when the illogical hostility between Iran and Israel will end," he concluded.

# Itzhak Perlman, Rep. Jamie Raskin and a Blind Rabbi Highlight the Need for **Disability Advocacy**

When Israeli-American violinist Itzhak Perlman debuted at Carnegie Hall in 1963, he performed while seated — a consequence of the polio that left him unable to walk without leg braces or crutches since

"I got a standing ovation, but The New York Times reviewer wasn't sure if that was because of the way I played or because of the fact I was sitting down while playing," recalled Perlman, now 75. "That thing followed me for two or three years. Then people got used to me and they stopped talking about it."

The renowned musician and conductor — the winner of 16 Grammy Awards, four Emmys and the Presidential Medal of Freedom - spoke of his experience at a

recent online panel organized as part of Jewish Disability Advocacy

Perlman was joined by a young synagogue pianist from New Jersey with autism, a Chicago elementary school teacher who has multiple sclerosis, a blind rabbi and three influential members of Congress, among others.

The event was organized by the lewish Federations of North America as a kickoff for 50 planned online events in February to highlight disability awareness and advocacy ranging from "Israel's Disability Trailblazers" to "Making the World More Accessible During COVID."

"One in four adults in this country has a disability. That means inclusive communities aren't just something that would be nice to have, they're essential to ensuring the future of our Jewish community," Mark Wilf, chair of the Jewish Federations' board of trustees, said at the February 3 event. "Given how few in number we are as a people, we need to make sure that we're pursing every avenue available to engage as many Jews as possible."

One of those Jews is Rabbi Lauren Tuchman, 35, who was ordained in 2018 by the Conservative movement's Jewish Theological Seminary as the world's first blind female rabbi. A resident of the a wheelchair. Right now, I'm in a Washington, D.C., area, she speaks often about disability inclusion.

"The Torah teaches us that we all stood outside Sinai collectively and received the Ten Commandments. This is one of the most important — if not the most important foundational events in our collective experience as a Jewish people," Tuchman said.

She began reading at age 2, used a Braille embosser in rabbinical school, and today employs a variety of software apps to help her read and study.

"Though we still live in a world with many barriers," Tuchman said, "with a lot of discrimination and challenges — particularly in this past year of unparalleled challenge — ours is a tradition that commands us to always make sure we are including everyone, and that we're doing all we can to break down those barriers that preclude us from creating a society in which all of us can thrive."

Shayla Rosen, 35, is a first-grade

teacher at Chicago's Oriole Park School and a cabinet member of the lewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago. In 2009, doctors diagnosed her with multiple sclerosis — a debilitating disease that's not always apparent to outsiders.

"I've always said I have an invisible illness," she said at the event. "There are times when things are a struggle, and I've learned to hide it well."

Perlman explained how it's often the person with disabilities who is treated as invisible.

"I used to go to the airport in scooter because I don't walk quite as I used to," Perlman said. "But people still look at you sitting in a chair, and for some reason they stop talking to you, and instead they talk to the person with you. For example, at the airport, the person behind the counter would ask, 'Where is he going?' It's always the case."

Last year marked the 30th anniversary of the Americans With Disabilities Act, or ADA, a civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities in all areas of public life, including jobs, transportation and all places open to the general public.

Rep. Steny Hoyer, D-Md., the House majority leader who sponsored passage of the ADA in 1990, described the landmark legislation during the event last week as "a grand instrument of tikkun olam," repairing the world, because it changed the way Americans viewed their neighbors

whose physical abilities differed from their own.

Thanks to the ADA, Hoyer said, crosswalks with audible guides and ramps are now taken for granted. New buildings are required to have elevators. Wheelchair-accessible ramps are standard at public buildings.

But full equality remains elusive. With a disability-friendly administration now in the White House, Hoyer said, "Now is exactly the time for the disability advocacy community to carry forth the fight full inclusion, access and equality."

Rep. Jamie Raskin, D-Md., whose 25-year-old son, Tommy, committed suicide Dec. 31 after a lifelong battle with depression, said the issue of disabilities is particularly close to his heart.

"There are tens of millions of people who have different kinds of disabilities — whether they're physical or mental — and we want a society that is open for everybody, and that promotes everybody's success and best health," said Raskin, thanking the Jewish Federations for its advocacy efforts on Capitol Hill throughout the coronavirus pandemic.

"Your work is more critical than ever," he said. "There's going to be lobbying around telehealth and making sure that's part of the solution. Consider me a close partner."

Fellow Jewish lawmaker Rep. Kim Schrier, D-Wash., said she left her work as a pediatrician to go into politics in 2017 "because I wanted everybody to be able to afford health care."

Among other things, Schrier said she's pushing for the next stimulus package now being debated in Congress to include greater

insurance coverage for telemedicine, as well as more funding for nutritional programs that benefit low-income Americans.

"Many of my patients have disabilities of one sort or another. But the reason I'm here is to go to bat for people who need a hand - whether that's a mom with two kids trying to get by on one job or a child who needs special education," Schrier told Darcy Hirsh, the Jewish Federations' director of government affairs.

"This is a time of really unprecedented need in our country. Supporting advocacy work for people with disabilities just makes sense to somebody who's a mother, a pediatrician, a member of Congress and frankly as a Jew who sees the humanity in everyone."

I decided we all have meat and chicken recipes we can prepare, but Pesach desserts have special requirements. Chocolate is always a pick-me-up in sad moments, so chocolate desserts it will be!

Wishing you a safe seder so that you will be well and here to celebrate in the years to come! Hag samayach Pesach! MHB

#### **CHOCOLATE CHIP MIRACLE BARS**

2 cups ground almonds

2 eggs

1 cup brown sugar 1 cup chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease a 9" x13" pan. Lay a piece of parchment paper (or wax paper) on bottom and grease too. Grind almonds in your food processor but watch carefully as you grind them, so they don't become almond butter! Adding a little of the sugar in with the almonds helps with controlling the grinding. Mix ingredients together and spread in pan with spatula. Batter will be thick but do not add water. Just mix it well. Bake for 23 minutes. Cool before cutting.

#### **CHOCOLATE SPARKLE COOKIES**

½ lb. semisweet chocolate

3 Tbsp. pareve margarine, room temperature

2 eggs

1/3 cup sugar, plus more for rolling

3/4 cup ground almonds (take a teaspoon from the sugar and grind in food processor)

"Confectioner's sugar": ¼ cup sugar mixed with ½ teaspoon potato starch

Melt the chocolate (I do it in short bursts in the microwave oven). Cut the margarine into a few pieces and stir into the chocolate until melted. Beat the eggs with an electric mixer, gradually adding the sugar until ribbons form. Fold in the chocolate-butter mixture. Gently add the ground almonds. Cover and refrigerate overnight to set.

Use a cookie scoop to form the dough into 1" balls. Roll the balls in granulated sugar, place on the baking sheet about 2 inches apart and immediately place

Bake until the center of the cookies is no longer wet, 10 - 12 minutes. When slightly cool, lightly dust the cookies with Pesach-acceptable "confectioner's sugar" made by whirling together the ¼ cup sugar with ½ teaspoon potato starch in the food processor.

#### **CHOCOLATE COATED FIG-GINGER BALLS**

2 cups dried black mission figs\*

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon ground cinnamon 1 Tablespoon honey

(about 8 oz)

Chocolate chips to melt for coating balls

1/4 cup crystallized ginger (about 2 oz) Remove the stems from the figs and discard. Coarsely chunk the figs and put in a food processor with the crystallized ginger, cinnamon and honey. Pulse until ingredients are finely chopped but not processed into a paste. Roll the fig mixture into heaping teaspoon sized balls. Dip balls in melted chocolate, then place on a parchment paper lined cookie sheet and refrigerate until the chocolate hardens! Makes about 18 balls. \*Other figs will work just as well. Mission figs just make a softer ball.


