10:00 AM - "Under **Jerusalem: The Buried** History of the World's Most Contested City" by Andrew Lawler

Under lerusalem delves into the historical and archaeological exploration of Jerusalem, a city with a rich and

complex past. The book explores the relentless quest by individuals, ranging from archaeologists missionaries, to to uncover the layers buried history of beneath the city's streets and shrines.



The narrative begins in 1863 when a French senator arrived in Jerusalem, aiming to unearth relics dating back to biblical times. His discovery of an ancient grave, which he claimed belonged to an Old Testament queen, sparked global fascination and inspired subsequent generations of fortune seekers and historians. Consul Danker has served in Los Angeles since August 2020, and has put special emphasis on revolutionizing the communications systems that serve over 250,000 Israelis and the wider community.

Given the recent challenging situation in Israel she has been called upon to provide immediate assistance to the İsraeli Wounded Veterans, Beit Halochem organization., the organization established in 1949 which in collaboration with the Ministry of Defense promoting the rights of veterans in the Knesset.

This startling exploration of the past and present of antisemitism starts with the surprisingly complex basics: what is a Jew? What is antisemitism? Why does it happen? Author Philip Slayton looks at the very different experiences of Jews

in Europe, the Middle East, North Africa, and America, and the longstanding tensions between Jews and Muslims, and Jews and Christians. He examines the Holocaust, which

brought the fight against antisemitism to new heights, and Zionism, which has set the fight back immeasurably. The role of media and particularly social media in spreading antisemitism is scrutinized. Identity Politics is found to have sidelined Jews in favor of other historically oppressed populations, a topic on everyone's mind today.


Philip Slayton was born in England. Slayton's family emigrated to Canada when he was a child. Slayton studied law at Oxford University as a Manitoba Rhodes Scholar and later clerked at the Supreme Court of Canada in Ottawa. He taught at McGill University and was Dean of Law at the University of Western Ontario. He practiced corporate law in Toronto with Blake, Cassels & Graydon from 1983 until his retirement in 2000. Slayton is an attorney and a regular contributor on law-related topics to Canadian magazines and newspapers. In 2008, and again in 2010, he was awarded a Kenneth R. Wilson Memorial Award by the Canadian Business Press for his column in Canadian Lawyer Magazine.

Slayton has received a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship and has served as President of the Canadian Rhodes Scholars Foundation and as Governor of Sheridan College. In 1998, Oxford University named him a "Distinguished Friend" of the university. Philip is a member of the Quadrangle Society of Massey College, Toronto, and the City of Toronto Legacy Project Committee, and is president of PEN Canada.

3:00 PM - Judaism **Disrupted: A Spiritual** Manifesto for the 21st **Century by Rabbi Michael** Strassfeld

Here I am again promoting a book that I discovered as part of the Jewish Book Council's collection of books and authors. I am not sure if or when you were a young



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challenges, and consequences of their this quest for heritage could potentially provide a roadmap for peaceful peoples and faiths connected to the city.

Andrew Lawler, an acclaimed journalist,

adult, a college student or a couple getting married, and you needed help exploring ways to connect Jewishly and didn't feel comfortable or welcomed in a synagogue. Or you wanted to become more "Jewish" beyond a bar or bat mitzvah. For example, if you wanted to learn how to bake challah, put on tefillin, create a ketubah or any number of mitzvahs. It was all there at your fingertips.

In those days as I pursued Judaism through and adult lens, I would reach for a copy of the First Jewish Catalog, by Richard Siegel, Michael Strassfeld and Sharon Strassfeld. This book gave thousands of my generation and other people easy access to growing a Jewish life. It was titled a do-it-yourself kit (way before DIY became mainstream).

I still have my original copy which I spiral bound for easy access. The authors added two more to the collection. I mention all of this because when I saw Rabbi Michael Strassfeld listed as one of the authors I had to explore his new book titled Judaism Disrupted. Judaism Disrupted clearly caught my attention knowing how much I still garner from his earlier work. I needed to find out what he means by Judaism Disrupted.

Strassfeld opens a door to how Judaism has evolved over time and how and why now is the time to explore it from a 21st century perspective. I agree. Living a Jewish life today is different than it was in biblical times or event early rabbinic times. The desire to hold true to early teachings and values is timeless.

Strassfeld breaks down his philosophy in 11 core principles guiding the reader and student through an exercise of expanding ones understanding and commitment to living a meaningful Jewish life. Each one of the core principles will resonate and help the reader connect with personal change and transformation.

Benyamin Cohen joins us in a fascinating discussion of his book "The Einstein Effect: How the World's Favorite Genius Got into Our Cars, Our Bathrooms, and Our

Minds". This book is a fascinating look into how Einstein's genius and science continues to show up in so many facets of our everyday lives and his enduring legacy as an unlikely pop culture icon.



Albert Einstein was the first modernday celebrity and, decades after his death, still has the world's most recognizable face. His influence is seen in much of the technology we use every day: GPS, remote controls, weather forecasts, even toothpaste. But it's not just Einstein's scientific discoveries that continue to shape our world. His legacy underpins the search for aliens, the rescue of refugees, the invention of time machines, and the debunking of fake news. He appears in new books, TV shows, and movies all the time—and fans are paying millions for Einstein relics at auction. Award-winning author and journalist Benyamin Cohen has a bizarre side hustle as the manager of Einstein's official social media accounts. which have 20 million followers—more than most living celebrities.

In The Einstein Effect, Cohen embarks on a global quest to unearth Einstein's ongoing relevance today. He and his co-author Benji Lovitt do a great job as expats with decades of life experiences in Israel to help the non-Israeli lover of Israel get a glimpse into everyday life of, challenges and a little joy of living in Israel.



From the November 14 March for Israel in Washington, DC, Attended by Over 200,000

This is a transcript from the March for Israel. The speaker was Rachel Goldberg, the mother of Hersch Goldberg Polin.

"My name is Rachel and I am the mother of Hersch Goldberg Polin, a wounded civilian American Israeli kidnapped from the music festival on October 7th. Right now, how we are living is to describe to you, we hostage families have lived the last 39 days in slow motion torment for 38 nights. None of us have slept the real sleep of the before. We all have third degree burns on our souls. Our hearts are bruised and seeping with misery, but the real souls suffering are those of the hostages. And they want to ask everyone in the world, all the screamers, the indifferent, the experts, the academics, the knowledgeable, the passives, the

perfectly outraged, the righteous, the indignant, the haters, the leaders, the lovers, the every single one of us. Why is the world accepting that 240



These children of God range in age from nine months to 87 years. They are Christians, Muslims, Jews, Buddhists, and Hindu. Why are they being left underground in the dirt? Abigail Moore Idan is three years old. She watched her



parents get murdered in front of her and was then kidnapped. And she would like me to ask the world, why are you letting her stay in the dark in her trauma, buried in the earth's crust? And Joshua Moel, who is a Tanzanian African graduate student studying agribusiness, would like for me to ask you why somehow his life actually doesn't matter. The world must prepare what we will say to them. There was a Christian German who hid Jews during the Holocaust, and he was asked why he did such a heroic and dangerous act. His answer was simple. At least I will know when I die and stand before God. He will not ask me what he asked Cain in the Bible. Where were you when your brother's blood cried out from the ground? What the world needs to start thinking about today is what will your excuse be? Bring them home now. Bring them Home Now!"

Czech Defense Minister Calls to Quit UN

Czech Defense Minister Jana Černochová has called for her country to leave the United Nations following the General Assembly's approval of a resolution demanding a ceasefire in Gaza that didn't mention Hamas or the hundreds of hostages kidnapped by the Islamist terrorist group.

The Czech Republic, one of Israel's closest allies in Europe, was one of only 14 countries that opposed Friday's resolution, which came three weeks after Hamas massacred more than 1,400 persons in Israel and took some 230 others hostage to Gaza, including dozens of foreign nationals.

"In my opinion, the Czech Republic has no place in an organization that cheers on terrorists and does not respect the fundamental right to selfdefense," Černochová said. "Let's get out."

Her remarks were posted on X, formerly known as Twitter, by the executive director of UN Watch, Hillel Neuer.

Israel has decried the "despicable" resolution as "a day of infamy" for the world body, while Hamas has praised it.

Only 14 countries voted against the resolution: Austria, Croatia, the Czech Republic, Fiji, Guatemala, Hungary, Israel, Marshall Islands, Micronesia, Nauru, Papua New Guinea, Paraguay, Tonga and the United States.

"Exactly three weeks ago, Hamas murdered over 1,400 Israelis, more victims for their population than the militant Islamist organization al-Qaeda murdered in the US on 9/11. And only 14 countries, including ours, have spoken out clearly and understandably against this unprecedented terrorist attack perpetrated by Hamas terrorists! I am ashamed of the UN," Černochová said.

Last week, Czech Prime Minister Petr Fiala traveled to Israel to express his "clear support and solidarity" with the Jewish state amid its war against Hamas.

German Vice-Chancellor Criticizes Silence Over Hamas, Threatens Deportation

Germany's Vice-Chancellor notified antisemitic offenders that they face legal prosecution and, in the case of non-residents, deportation, in a hardhitting speech delivered on November 1st.

"Anyone who is German will have to answer for it in court. If you're not German, you also risk your residency status," Vice-Chancellor Robert Habeck of the left-wing Green Party in Germany's governing coalition said in a video posted to the X/Twitter platform.

"Anyone who doesn't have a residence permit provides a reason to be deported," Habeck said.

Antisemitic incidents in Germany have risen by more than 200 percent since the Oct. 7 pogrom unleashed by Hamas terrorists who invaded southern Israel from the Gaza Strip. During the last week, opposition politicians have been pushing the government to take more decisive action against Islamist groups in Germany. In the video, which had racked up nearly seven million views as *The Algemeiner* went to press, Habeck also criticized Muslim

associations in Vice-Chancellor Germany for failing Robert Habeck to condemn the Hamas atrocities.

While some groups had distanced themselves from Hamas' brutal actions, Habeck emphasized that it was "not all of them, and some are too hesitant and I think overall too few." He described Hamas as a "murderous terrorist group that works for the extinction of the State of Israel and the death of all Jews."

Outside of the Muslim community, he continued, antisemitism remained a serious presence on the far right as well as in "parts of the political left" and "among young activists."

"Anti-colonialism must not lead to antisemitism," Habeck said. "In this


respect, this part of the political left should review its arguments and be skeptical of the 'great resistance narrative.'"

Invoking the Nazi Holocaust, he added: "The responsibility of our history also asserts that Jews can live freely and safely in Germany. That they never again have to fear to show their religion, their culture openly. But precisely this fear is now back."

Habeck's speech met with a positive response across the spectrum, including from politicians belonging to the center-right Christian Democratic Union (CDU) party, which had previously expressed strong criticism of the government and its Interior Minister, Nancy Faeser, for allegedly dithering in the face of a new surge of antisemitism.

Habeck's words were "strong and necessary," CDU Vice Chair Karin Prien posted on X/Twitter.

Habeck also criticized the UN

Israeli NBA Player Sings Israel's National Anthem With Fans

Israeli professional basketball player Deni Avdija, who plays forward for the NBA's Washington Wizards, joined members of Atlanta's Jewish community in singing Israel's national anthem, *Hatikvah*, after his team played an away game against the Atlanta Hawks on November 1st.

At the end of the game, Jewish basketball fans in the State Farm Arena spontaneously began singing *Hatikva*, and the 22-year-old sang along while draping an Israeli flag on his back.

The former Maccabi Tel Aviv player, who is the only current NBA player born in Israel, shared clips of the singing on his Instagram Story and wrote in the caption, "It's been a long time since the last time I was moved like this." His fans also chanted "*Am Yisrael Chai*" ("Long live Israel") during the game, and Avdija came to meet some of them in the stands after the anthem. The athlete scored a season-high 22 points during his team's 130-121 loss to the Hawks.

with expertise in crisis medicine and trauma-informed care.

Hadassah Southern California President, Audrey Levine shared some of the heartbreaking stories of civilians, physicians and soldiers who risked their lives to help others injured in the northern Negev Hamas terrorist attacks. She spoke of the physicians and nurses working extra long shifts in spite of rockets falling in their home communities.

And she spoke of the emergency pediatric and adult psychiatric and mental health services now available at Hadassah, a new service that provides rapid, one-hour crisis intervention for traumatized victims and those suffering from anxiety attacks.

After 75 years of a successful Israel, it's hard to imagine that in its early years, Zionism garnered less than 10% of global Jewry's support. Many Jews preferred to assimilate into the nations in which they resided. Others were afraid that advocating for their own state would inspire antisemitic attacks.

It was only after the Holocaust that global Jewry, especially American Jewry, came around to supporting Zionism. As Germany transformed into an antisemitic killing machine, world Jewry witnessed the great powers refuse to admit Jews even though they were in danger of being exterminated.

American Jews were also powerless to influence President Franklin D. Roosevelt to bomb the train tracks to the concentration camps or do anything else to stop the Holocaust.

It was then Jews realized that without their own state and military, they could never guarantee their own safety. Today, over 90% of American Jews support some form of Zionism.

The world, by contrast, has usually favored Israel's enemies. It did so for several reasons. Many countries feared being denied Arab oil. Others worried about being dragged into Israel's wars. Latent antisemitism, of course, was a major factor.

Over time, it became the major factor. Antisemitism has long been the driving force behind anti-Zionist and anti-Israel sentiment around the world. Institutions like the United Nations, created to protect minority populations like the Jewish people, turned against the Jews and favored the Palestinians despite Israeli offers of peace and Palestinian rejectionism.

Today, the world has shown some sympathy for the Jewish people since Israel was brutally attacked by Palestinian barbarians on Oct. 7, but is still mostly sympathetic to the Palestinians. In a recent U.N. General Assembly vote, only 14 out of 196 votes went in Israel's favor.

... While pointing the finger at Israel was always the easy way out, it has become obvious that it was at best a superficial and erroneous understanding of the Palestinian situation. While the conflict with Israel caused great harm to the Palestinians, this was entirely due to their decision to continue the conflict by the most barbaric means possible. It was the poor decisions of the Palestinian leadership, the abominations committed by Palestinian terror groups and the Palestinian obsession with destroying Israel that ultimately doomed the Palestinians to their current state.

Going forward, instead of the shallow paradigm of "power equals oppressor" and "weak equals oppressed," the world must judge nations by their morality, not their relative strength and weakness. When it comes to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the world must look at the values of both peoples and see which values best reflect their own.

The barbaric Oct. 7 attack was an expression of a morally corrupt culture that encourages its people to rape, behead, murder and kidnap the innocent. These, we hope, are not the values and morals of the civilized world. It is time for the world to change its ways, view Israel with new eyes and demand a change in Palestinian values and culture....

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

Hazzak V'Amatz - Strong, Courageous and Resolute

speakers at the recent Stand with Israel rally in Palm Desert. As a national board member of Rabbis United, an advisory council to StandWith Us, it was gratifying to see so many lews from across the Coachella Valley coming together in one voice.

It was deeply moving to see a United Jewish Community who is deeply committed to bringing the hostages home now and supporting Israel and Israelis in their time of need.

We were also there to speak out against the surge in antisemitism.

ADL's latest survey,_fielded after the Israel-Hamas war began, reveals a 316% increase in antisemitic incidents compared to a year ago. Almost 28 incidents per day on average.

October 7, 2023, will go down in history as one of the deadliest days Israel has ever faced. Instead of celebrating the Jewish holiday of Simchat Torah and the Sabbath in peace, Israel came under massive attack by Hamas and other terrorist groups invading from Gaza. As I write this, over 1200 Israelis have been murdered, over 2,000 wounded, and over 150 men, women, and children have been brutally kidnapped. Israeli homes were attacked in small towns and some were set on fire to force families to come out and be kidnapped or murdered. Terrorists have also fired over 3,000 rockets and missiles at Israeli communities, sending families into bomb shelters.

Videos of unspeakable war crimes are beginning to surface. Close to 300 Innocent young people going to a music festival in Southern Israel were found killed and many of their bodies mutilated. The same fate happened to residents of several kibbutzim, who were also brutally murdered, along with scores of members of the IDF, who bravely fought to protect them, also perished in this barbarous act.

The IDF, now in Gaza, must finally put an end to the insidious threat that is Hamas, not only for Israel, but for the entire world.

Fifty years ago, many of us woke up to the horrific news that Israel was savagely attacked on the eve of Yom Kippur by several Arab nations. The American

I was honored to be one of the Jewish community responded with unwavering support. On Shabbat/ Simchat Torah, we were awakened to another awful surprise attack, this time by Hamas.

> We in the lewish community need and must speak out in one clear voice of support for the State of Israel, because quite simply it is the right and moral thing to do. A regime like Hamas who takes mothers and children as hostages (1903-1993), was the preeminent

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US House Passes Bill Requiring Annual Report on Palestinian Textbooks

The US House of Representatives on November 2 passed legislation that would require the US secretary of state to issue an annual public report on teaching materials provided to Palestinian students addressing whether their education is promoting antisemitism and hatred of Israel.

The bipartisan Peace and Tolerance in Palestinian Education Act was introduced by Rep. Brad Sherman (D-CA), along with Reps. Brian Mast (R-FL), Josh Gottheimer (D-NJ), Elise Stefanik (R-NY), and David Trone (D-MD). The measure also drew 30 other co-sponsors.

If the bill became law, the US secretary of state would be required to annually audit textbooks and other education content that the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA) — the UN agency responsible for Palestinian refugees and the Palestinian Authority (PA) provide to students.

Lawmakers have been pushing to determine whether US foreign aid, which goes to both the PA and UNRWA, has been financing violent and antisemitic materials.

One of those lawmakers is US Rep. Mike Lawler (R-NY), who on November 1 urged Congress to pass the legislation.

"We have known for decades that Palestinian children are taught from a young age to hate Israel and the Jewish people," Lawler said in a speech delivered on the floor of the House of Representatives. "Nongovernmental institutions continue to show that Palestinian school children are being indoctrinated with deeply disturbing violent imagery."

Lawler went on to cite several examples of incitement in Palestinian curricula that have been reported by *The Algemeiner*, including poems glorifying jihad and textbooks describing Jews as "dangerous" and "perverted in nature."

During his remarks, Lawler linked Hamas' invasion of Israel on Oct. 7 to what he described as Palestinian schools manufacturing successive generations of antisemites and terrorists, arguing that the problem is an obstacle to resolving the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

"We will never arrive at a peaceful solution for Israelis and Palestinians if Palestinian children are being taught hatred," Lawler said. "Why else would Hamas terrorists call home bragging that they murdered Jews? Why else would they live-stream their barbaric attacks? That disgusting and gruesome cruelty is possible because these Hamas fighters were indoctrinated with hatred at a young age. They were taught to glorify terrorism and other so-called martyrs who killed Jewish people, and this must end."

Thursday's vote to the pass the legislation drew praise from Israeli education watchdog Impact-se, which earlier this month reported that at least 100 Hamas terrorists involved in the Oct. 7 massacre of Israelis graduated from UNRWA schools.

"Impact-se has been warning for years about UNRWA indoctrination. This bill takes on a great deal urgency following the Oct.7 massacre," Impactse CEO Marcus Sheff said in a statement, citing examples of violent texts taught to Palestinian students. "Let's be crystal clear: this modern-day pogrom was conducted with relish by thousands, with the majority likely graduates of UNRWA education in Gaza."

Sheff added, "Where did they learn to 'cut the necks of the enemy?' Where were they taught that 'Jews spread corruption which will lead to their annihilation?' More



than half of UNRWA's budget is earmarked for education. No decent society can continue paying for this horror."

Antisemitic incitement and violence in Palestinian curricula has persisted despite years of outrage and international pressure to change the teaching materials. Study cards for 11th graders accusing Jews of being "in control of global events through financial power," seventh graders instructed to describe Israeli soldiers as "Satan's aides" in a textbook chapter imploring Muslims to "liberate" the Al-Aqsa Mosque, and children gathered to listen to a poem with the following line: "Give me a Kalashnikov, an [M-] 14, an axe and a knife" are just some of the examples of the themes to which Palestinian students are exposed.

In a science textbook for seventh graders — images of which can be found in a report released by Israeli education watchdog Impact-se in May 2021 — Newton's Second Law of Motion is explained with an illustration depicting a masked Palestinian "aiming a slingshot at approaching soldiers." In another textbook, titled *Mathematics* and used in grade nine, a word problem asks students to calculate, based on a given probability, how many Palestinians would be shot by "one of the settlers."

Bill Amplo's Sugar-Free Challah Bread Pudding

In last month's Food column the last two lines of the bottom recipe ended up being cut off when the page for formatted, and very important information was left off. Not simply to be fair, but this is a really good recipe, so we are giving the complete recipe now. As we explained when we first ran the recipe six years ago, we loved when Bill started out his directions with, "start by freezing leftover challah..."

Sugar-free Challah 'Bread Pudding"

Make the bread pudding in a full-sized aluminum tray (such as sold in bulk at Costco).

Ingredients:

- Full tray of leftover parve Challah (see approximate quantity below)
- 18 large eggs, beaten
- 8 cups of Splenda
- 1 half-gallon of Mocha Mix (parve)
- 8 teaspoons of pure vanilla extract
- 4 cups Craisins (or raisins if you prefer)
- Non-stick cooking spray (parve) (not olive oil)

Start by freezing leftover parve challah from Shabbat or yontif. When you have approximately 3 full gallon size freezers bags, you should have enough. Cut the challah into cubes and fill the aluminum tray. Let the bread sit overnight to harden.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. In a large mixing bowl beat the eggs. Mix in the Splenda, Mocha Mix, and vanilla. Pour the liquid over the cubes of bread. Add the Craisins and mix them in. Press down on everything so that all the bread is sitting in the liquid mixture. Let the bread soak for about 10 minutes.

Spray a second full-sized aluminum pan with non-stick cooking spray. Be certain to spray the sides. (Bill's suggestion: set the tray in the open dishwasher to spray, to avoid excess spray getting onto counter surfaces. Easy clean-up!) Pour the pudding mixture into the "greased" tray. Bake for 50 - 60 minutes, testing to be certain that it is cooked through. Remove from oven and allow to cool. Serve warm or cold. Serves 64.

Education Secretary: Colleges Could Face Funding Cuts Over Antisemitism

Education Secretary Miguel Cardona said colleges could lose federal funding if they fail to address antisemitism and other bigotries, following up on a meeting last month with Jewish leaders alarmed by rising antisemitism on campuses in the wake of the Israel Hamas war.

Cardona made his warning in an interview on CNN on November 6 ahead of the release the next day of a letter reminding federally funded schools of their obligation to protect Jews and other minorities.

"I would want to provide support for these universities, provide guidance. And if there are egregious acts, I want to make sure that we're investigating," he told the network. "Ultimately, if we have to withhold dollars from a campus refusing to comply, we would."

Cardona's comments do not represent a new policy, but they suggest that Cardona is prepared to be aggressive in pressing colleges to act. In a release on November 7 formally announcing the letter, Cardona tied the letter's instructions to what Jewish organizations have said is a massive spike in antisemitism on campuses since Hamas terrorists struck Israel on October 7, launching the war.

"The rise of reports of hate incidents on our college campuses in the wake of the Israel-Hamas conflict is deeply traumatic for students and should be alarming to all Americans. antisemitism, Islamophobia, and all other forms of hatred go against everything we stand for as a nation," he said.

The letter sent November 7 to colleges that receive federal funds, signed by Catherine Lhamon, the department's assistant secretary for civil rights, describes in its first paragraph "an alarming rise in disturbing antisemitic incidents and threats to Jewish, Israeli, Muslim, Arab, and Palestinian students on college campuses and in P-12 schools."

In her second paragraph, Lhamon ties the money the schools get from the government to their legal obligations to protect minority students. Both public and private universities receive federal funds through a variety of pathways.

"I write to remind colleges, universities, and schools that receive federal financial assistance of their legal responsibility under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and its implementing regulations (Title VI) to provide all students a school environment free from discrimination based on race, color, or national origin, including shared ancestry or ethnic characteristics," Lhamon said in her letter. "It is your legal obligation under Title VI to address prohibited discrimination against students and others on your campus including those who are or are perceived to be Jewish, Israeli, Muslim, Arab, or Palestinian — in the ways described in this letter."

In his October 30 meeting with Jewish leaders, Cardona noted that the Biden Administration had already, prior to the October 7 Hamas deadly attack on Israel, extended Civil Rights Act protections to religious minorities, including Jews and Muslims. He promised a two-week deadline to come up with a plan.

Jewish leaders at that meeting noted that the federal government in recent years has expanded Title IX of the same act, which bans gender discrimination, to allow for funding to be withheld from universities that do not address sexual harassment and assault. They suggested that the department could apply similar measures to Title VI as an incentive for compliance.

Sen. Jacky Rosen, a Jewish Democrat from Nevada, had sent a letter in early November, urging the Education Department to issue "updated guidance to college and university administrators making clear the consequences of failing to ensure the safety of Jewish students," among other measures.

Rosen, who cofounded an antisemitism task force in the Senate, welcomed Cardona's November 7 letter. "I'm glad to see the U.S. Department of Education is taking action at my urging to remind school administrators of their legal responsibility to keep students safe from antisemitism and other forms of discrimination – or face consequences," she said. "I'm continuing to urge the department to form a task force to counter campus antisemitism."



Fighting Back: Moms Rally to Combat Antisemitism on Campus

With antisemitism soaring in the U.S. and abroad following the horrific Hamas attacks of October 7th, a group of concerned mothers is organizing to counter the spread of anti-Jewish bigotry and harassment on college campuses.

In the wake of the aHamas massacres, the number of antisemitic incidents in both the U.S. and across the world have soared, in particular in and around major universities.

In response to the now violent climate in the once bucolic halls of academia, Elizabeth Rand founded Mothers Against Campus Antisemitism (MACA), a new Facebook group.

Rand, a Manhattan lawyer who is also the mother of a college-age son, started MACA to bring other concerned mothers together, in order to effectuate change.

Begun on October 26, the group quickly grew to over forty thousand members in less than a week.

Rand says she has been overwhelmed by the tremendous interest in the FB group. A working mother, she can't single-handedly manage the flood of postings and requests for advice on handling the giant spike of



hateful rhetoric targeting Jewish students on even the "best" university campuses throughout the country.

So Rand is delegating responsibility for running the group: she brought a communications manager on board, assembled a team of administrators and monitors for the postings, and reached out to followers with legal and non-profit experience to help advise the group.

Besides offering a forum for member moms to decry the current climate of hatred on campus, supportive practical action is encouraged.

The members of the 40,000-strong

group can circulate petitions, or write letters and make phone calls to politicians, school administrators, and university donors. They can withhold donations and demand additional campus security for students.

One goal of the new group is to harness the legal clout of the group to pressure college administration to condemn antisemitic attacks and intimidation of students. Rand would like the group to assist students with bringing lawsuits against colleges and student groups when necessary.

As well, the FB group provides a

"community," offering emotional support for like-minded mothers concerned and anxious about their children.

Considering the exorbitant cost of university tuition, parents feel that their children should at least be assured of a safe environment in which to learn.

For many parents who were not previously involved in anything Jewish, the current spate of antisemitic assaults threatening their children on college campuses is a real wake-up call.

Rand says she draws inspiration from MADD, Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

Formed in 1980 by a mother whose daughter was killed by a drunk driver, the group of "ordinary mothers" accomplished a major change in social attitudes.

Laws were enacted raising the legal drinking age in the US from 18 to 21, saving many lives. MADD brought their cause into public awareness, making drunk driving socially unacceptable.

Likewise, Rand says about her new group: "I want to make it socially unacceptable to display Jew hatred on college campuses."

IRA ROLLOVER TO CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS

While you're planning for the remainder of this year, we want to remind you that the IRA Charitable Rollover provision permits individuals 70 1/2 or older to donate up to \$100,000 annually from their IRAs to charities without having to count the distribution as taxable income. The donation counts toward the donor's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). The provision allows for rollover directly to charitable organizations such as The Jewish Federation of the Desert, but NOT to "Donor Advised Funds".

The SECURE Act allows people 72 and over to abstain taking a required minimum distribution (RMD) from their IRA's in 2021. Therefore, your RMD for this year may be more than you expect. Rather than taking the entire RMD and paying income tax on the distribution, you can maximize your tax savings and support Federation's mission driven work for "Tikkun Olam", repairing the world.

GIVING STOCK

If you are using appreciated stock, it is important that you contact our office at (760) 324-4737 or email Alberto.Tejero@jfedps.org, and provide us with the donor's name, name of the security, and number of shares being transferred into our Charles Schwab account by December 26 to ensure a 2023 tax benefit.

'Stunned, Sickened' by Harvard's Silence on Hamas, Wexner Cuts Ties

The Wexner Foundation supports up to 10 Israeli "outstanding government and public service professionals" to study in a one-year, mid-career master's degree in public administration at the Harvard Kennedy School, per the philanthropy's website. The goal of the Israel fellowship, per Wexner, is "providing Israel's next generation of public leaders with superlative training."

The webpage, which notes Harvard's "rich environment that is conducive to reflection and dialogue about Israel's policy challenges and the diverse leadership strategies that could address those challenges," will need updating.

Wexner told the Harvard Kennedy School on Oct. 16 that it is cutting ties after more than 30 years. "We believed that at its core, HKS was a school with moral purpose, matching the core values we embrace in our own work," wrote three Wexner leaders: Rabbi B. Elka Abrahamson (president), Ra'anan Avital (director general, Israel) and Abigail and Leslie Wexner (chairmen).

"We have observed that this cherished tolerance for diverse perspectives has slowly but perceptibly narrowed over the years. A disappointing consequence of this trend is that our Wexner Israel Fellows are increasingly marginalized, their voices and views even shouted down," the philanthropy leaders wrote. "Disappointingly, HKS has been slow to craft a strategy to enable Israeli students to engage in productive—even if difficult dialogue within the school. We believe this is an unfortunate trend for the entire MPA student community."

Following Hamas's terrorist attacks on October 7, which killed more than 1,400 Israelis, the Wexner leaders were "stunned and sickened at the dismal failure of Harvard's leadership to take a clear and unequivocal stand against the barbaric murders of innocent Israeli civilians by terrorists," they wrote.

"Since then, many of our Israel fellows no longer feel marginalized at HKS. They feel abandoned," the leaders wrote. "Our core values and those of Harvard no longer align. HKS is no longer a place where Israeli leaders can go to develop the necessary skills to address the very real political and societal challenges they face."

Gilad Erdan, Israeli ambassador to the United Nations, praised Wexner's decision. "The leadership of Harvard have proven they have lost their moral compass. Not only do they allow Jew-hatred and proterror rhetoric to permeate their campus, but they cannot bring themselves to immediately condemn terrorism," the diplomat wrote. "I call on every North American Jew and supporter of Israel to send this message to every university that behaves similarly."

"If your child's university thinks twice before condemning the murder of innocents or allows a culture of hate to grow on campuses unhindered, then it cannot receive one more cent from any of you," Erdan said. "Whoever stays silent after the massacre of children does not hold the moral credibility to educate our children."

"It shouldn't have taken this long to realize what a morally compromised institution Harvard has become, but ... better late than never," wrote Jeff Jacoby, a *Boston Globe* op-ed columnist.

Idan Ofer, an Israeli billionaire, and his wife Batia quit Harvard's executive board. "We denounce those who seek to place blame on the people of Israel for the atrocities committed by the terrorist organization, Hamas," the couple said.



Have A Nosh

Sufganiyot for Chanukah It's been five years since I gave you

sufganiyot instead of latke recipes for Chanukah in the December paper, so here are some fun, easy recipes for you to try. Israeli sufganiyot are, basically, jelly donuts. I started making 'donut holes' to



bring into my son's classroom when he was a child, and often used quick, baking powder donut holes instead of a yeast batter for the ease and convenience, which was met with equal enthusiasm by the kiddies. Wishing you a sweet Chanukah! – Miriam Bent

"Donut Hole" Sufganiyot (Parve)

3/4 cup orange juice (or water) 2 eggs, beaten 1/4 cup parve margarine dash of salt 4 Tablespoons sugar 1/3 cup powdered sugar, mixed with1 teaspoon cinnamon2 pkg. dry yeast3 cups flourVegetable oil for deep frying

Combine orange juice, margarine and sugar. Heat until margarine melts. Cook to lukewarm and add yeast. Stir util dissolved. Add flour, eggs and dash of salt, and mix well. Remove from bowl onto a floured board and knead until smooth. You may need a little more flour. Place dough in a greased bowl, turning dough so all sides have a light film of oil. Cover bowl and let dough rise in a warm spot for 30 minutes. Punch down. Break dough into pieces and shape into small balls. Cover with a light kitchen towel and let rise another 30 minutes. Deep fry in 375-degree oil until golden brown. Drain on paper towels and dust with cinnamon sugar.

Chocolate Filled Sufganiyot (Milchig)

3/4 cup warm water
(about 100 degrees)
1 envelop active dry yeast
2½ cups all-purpose flour, plus more for
work surface
1/4 cup sugar plus ½ cup for coating
1/2 teaspoon salt

2 large eggs, separated 2 Tablespoons unsalted butter, room temperature Frying oil Chocolate bars, (gourmet chocolates work best) cut in to approximately oneinch squares.

In a large metal bowl, stir together warm water and yeast. Let stand until foamy, about 5 minutes. Add 3/4 cup flour, 1/4 cup sugar, and salt; mix until well combined. Add egg yolks and remaining 1 3/4 cups flour. Mix until combined, then knead dough in bowl until all flour is incorporated. Turn out dough onto a lightly floured work surface; knead a few minutes until smooth. Knead in margarine until incorporated. Transfer dough to a well-oiled bowl; turn dough several times to coat entirely with oil. Cover tightly with plastic wrap, and refrigerate overnight.

About 30 minutes before you're ready to form doughnuts, remove dough from refrigerator to let come to room temperature. On a lightly floured work surface, roll out dough into an 1/8 inch thick. Using a 2 inch cookie cutter (or a glass), cut out about 24 rounds, dipping cutter in flour as needed to prevent sticking. Re-roll scraps and cut out about 16 more rounds.

Line a baking sheet with a clean kitchen towel. In a small bowl, lightly beat egg whites. Brush edge of a dough round with egg white, then put chocolate bar pieces in center. Top with another round and press edges to seal. Repeat process with remaining rounds. Transfer to prepared baking sheet; let doughnuts rise until puffy, 20 to 30 minutes.

Heat a few inches of oil in a large (4-5 quart) heavy pot until it registers 360 degrees on a deep-fry thermometer or a scrap of dough sizzles upon contact. Working in batches of 4 to 5, carefully slip doughnuts into hot oil. Fry, turning once until golden brown, about 1 minute. Using a slotted spoon, transfer doughnuts to paper towels to drain.

Place remaining $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar in a medium bowl. While doughnuts are still hot, toss them in sugar, turning to coat. Serve immediately. Makes 20 sufganiyot.

Baking Powder Quick Sufganiyot (Dairy)

1/4 cup sugar	1 teaspoon nutmeg or mace
3/4 cup milk	½ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon baking powder	1 egg
¹ / ₂ cup sugar, mixed with 1 teaspoon	Vegetable oil for deep frying
cinnamon	

Combine flour 1/4 cup of the sugar, baking powder, nutmeg (or mace) and salt. Add egg, oil and milk. Mix throughly. Drop by small teaspoons into 375 degree oil and fry until golden brown. Drain on paper towels and sprinkle with the remaining 1/4 cup cinnamon sugar. Makes about 4 dozen.

Meet the Christian Cowboys Defending Israel's Heartland

Fifteen American Christian cowboys with their wide-brimmed hats, denim shirts, tight Wrangler jeans, leather belts with large buckles, and well-worn boots have come to Israel to protect the lewish residents of the biblical heartland - Judea and Samaria.

"We want to live for Israel; that is our goal," said 24-year-old Yosef Strain from Montanna, his voice carrying a subtle twang.

The young men, mostly in their early 20s, hail from across the South: Tenessee, Missouri, Texas, Arkansas, and Montana. They join other faith-driven volunteers in Israel through Hayovel. For 20 years, this organization has been bringing several hundred Christians to Israel each year to help harvest the grapes of the biblical heartland. These Evangelical Christians are usually focused on restoring Christianlewish relations and confirming Israel's right to their ancestral homeland.

However, after the October 7 Hamas massacre, "we understood the morbid reality that we are facing a serious enemy and the world does not recognize it," explained Hayovel Director of Operations Joshua Waller. "If we did not say yes [to helping Judea and Samaria], no one was."

Hayovel launched Operation Itai to raise \$29 million for security supplies for the West Bank. So far, more than \$2 million has been raised from American Christian Zionists for bullet-proof vests, helmets, night vision binoculars, drones, flashlights and more.

Itai was the non-Jewish commander of King David's 600-men army, mentioned in II Samuel, chapter 15.

"We did not set a budget," said Waller.

"We asked the communities what they needed, and Operation Itai responded."

In addition, Hayovel decided to bring a group of "hardcore guys" to help install security roads, build warehouses for supplies, deliver supplies, and do 24/7 guard duty, Waller said. 15 cowboys were selected.

"Everyone is talking about a proportionate response," he added. "A proportionate Christian response would be to bring the supplies needed to stop another Jewish massacre from happening."

He said Gaza is only one front. Syria and Lebanon are two other fronts, and the West Bank is the fourth front.

"This is one of the most severe fronts. You have around 500,000 Jewish people scattered among 200 different communities living next to two- to threemillion Palestinians, and there are no security fences between them and us," Waller added. "No one wants to say it, but these Palestinians, many of them are also involved with Hamas or another terrorist organization, and if they believe they are strong enough and Israel is weak enough, they will strike."

The cowboys stay on Har Bracha with Hayovel but work throughout the West Bank, including in the southern Hebron Hills. They participate in what they call "farm watch" – staying up all night to catch cattle and sheep thieves and terrorists.

These boys are the real deal. "A lot of people think we are dressing up," Strain, 22, wearing a large Star of David metal belt buckle, told The Jerusalem Post. "We just have a different style and culture."

Strain, whose family farm trains horses

and rides them in rodeos, said he had been to Israel three times before, and his parents were "pretty supportive."

And none of the cowboys seemed very afraid of violence.

Charles Hutsler, 19, from Huntsville, Arkansas, said he was "not scared" about being in the country during a war because "God has my back."

Ezekiel ("Zeek") Strain, 20, Yosef Strain's brother, said he believes in Israel in the promised land, specifically, the biblical heartland.

"I ain't scared of what could happen or might happen. I just want to help," he said.

"God put a special calling on my life and has given me certain talents, direct my life in a certain path, that I can do something when the time comes," added Johnny Plocher, 24. "I am not on Earth for money, a new truck or property, a vacation - that is not my purpose. I feel called here now and am glad to be here."

The cowboys stressed that they do not represent the Biden administration or liberal Americans.

"Biden does not represent these cowboys," Waller said. "Americans support Israel, including Judea and Samaria. The Biden administration believes in a twostate solution and would like to see 500,000 Jews pushed out of here, their biblical heartland.

"These cowboys represent the America behind Israel and the Bible."

He continued: "We are here to say no way to have to cut the State of Israel in half and the ability to create an Arab state in the idle of Israel's heartland. These cowboys are not going to see it."

Jewish Billionaire Henry Swieca Quits Columbia Business School Board, Saying Campus is 'Unsafe' for Jews

A Jewish billionaire investor and philanthropist quit the board of Columbia Business School, saying the campus had become unsafe for lews since the launch of the Israel-Hamas war.

"With blatantly anti-Jewish student groups and professors allowed to operate with complete impunity, it sends a clear and distressing message that Jews are not just unwelcome, but also unsafe on campus," Henry Swieca

said in an Oct. 30 letter obtained Tuesday by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. "My resignation is an expression of my deep concern for the direction in which the

Henry Swieca university is heading."

The Board of Overseers is the school's main fundraising arm.

Swieca, 66, is the founder in 2010

of Talpion Fund Management and the cofounder of Highbridge Capital Management, which was acquired by J.P. Morgan Chase in 2008. The child of Holocaust survivors, he has been a member of the business school's Board of Overseers since 2014. Forbes lists his worth as \$1.9 billion.

His resignation, which he did not announce publicly, comes amid a flurry of protests by Jewish supporters of elite universities in response to

the schools' handling of the Israel-Hamas war following October 7, when Hamas attacked Israel. Prominent supporters of Harvard University and the University of Pennsylvania have announced that they will or might no longer support their alma maters because of the presidents' response to the war, and the private equity CEO Marc Rowan is reportedly trying to get others in the finance field to withhold donations over the issue.




