### Philanthropy and in a Time of War and Antisemitism

### **PHILANTHROPY**

First, I want to thank all of you who have stepped up and contributed to the Swords of Iron Emergency campaign. Being that we are a snowbird community many of you have given to your "Home" community and some of you have given to both your home and here. As I have said many times, all giving to Israel, no matter where it comes from, will help. Thank you.

During conversations with many of you about the importance of supporting Israel and our annual campaign have asked the question, if whether raising money for Israel will impact the annual campaign. I replied, "I hope not." Some people think that if we raise money for Israel the community won't support our annual campaign. So far most of our donors are increasing their annual campaign support. Most philanthropic research studies have been conducted around the subject of running dual campaigns. Fortunately, people who understand and value philanthropy and the work we do understand the need to support both campaigns. And do!

### **ANTISEMITISM**

Most people today especially those in the Jewish community see both the devastating war in Israel and the rise in antisemitism as significant issues. Many have taken up the causes both financially and through advocacy. These two issues are historic and will

need a commitment for some time to come.

I have been reading and hearing stories of prominent Jewish people who in the past have passionately stood side by side supporting their friends during difficult times. Also, significantly supporting their causes. Now, they are feeling a little abandoned by their friends. As we witness the absence of our friends at this time, we should remind them that we stood beside them when they asked us to support their causes.

Let's look at the fallout from the three university presidents who in my opinion lacked the moral courage to say yes, when asked, "if harassing Jewish students with verbal threats and taunts is wrong." The debate around their position in Congress has been front and center as it should be. When it comes to combating antisemitism there seems to be a double standard when it comes to issues and Jews and Israel.

Antisemitism on college campuses is a symptom of a greater problem in society. The Pew Research Center came out with a poll with several results that should surprise us: 65% of Americans polled think Hamas was responsible for the war between Israel and Hamas. When I read that I was shocked. That means 35% of Americans don't think Hamas was responsible. Even after what Hamas did to innocent people on October 7<sup>th</sup>. So, many people have responded, in my opinion from a place of ignorance, "that Israel brought this on themselves, and what about the people in Gaza."

The level of misinformation and disinformation has clouded the judgment around Israel. Mainstream and social media are filled with negative coverage about this war. It is as though Israel should just let anyone who wants to attack Israel can because the world doesn't want Israel to respond the way they would. Look around, what other country isn't allowed to protect its citizens?

Recently, the United Nations passed a non-binding resolution calling on Israel for a ceasefire. No mention of Hamas releasing the hostages as part of the ceasefire. I might remind the UN that on October 6th there was a ceasefire in place between Hamas and Israel and on October 7th Hamas broke that ceasefire by invading a sovereign country, massacring 1200 innocent people, and taking 240 hostages (Which as of now the International Red Cross has not checked on the hostages).

Why does the United Nations treat the sovereign country of Israel with different standards than it holds for other countries? Currently there are wars going on in Syria, Sudan, and Yemen to name three that voted for the ceasefire. We are not seeing the UN calling for ceasefires in those countries. Look at Israel's neighbor Syria, over the past years over 300,000 people have been murdered by its own government, or how about Sudan who has been in a civil war for decades has recently displaced millions of its own citizens or Yemen, where the Houthis are firing long range missiles at Israel...Come on.



### "Embracing OUur Transitions: Thriving In A Time Of Change"

Beth Shalom's 13<sup>TH</sup> Annual Scholar-In-Residence Weekend, January 5-6, 2024

Rabbi Susan Leider, member of the Executive Council of the Rabbinical Assembly of Conservative Judaism, will serve as Scholar-in-Residence at Congregation Beth

Shalom Friday, January 5 and Saturday, January 6, 2024, made possible by a grant from Jewish Federation of the Desert. The Shabbaton's theme, "Embracing Our Transitions: Thriving in a Time of Change," will be explored through creative service modalities, teachings and interactive conversations throughout Shabbat, at the Palm Desert synagogue, located at 42600 Cook St., Second Floor. The entire community is welcome at both Shabbat sessions.

Since her 2006 ordination from the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies (AJU) in Los Angeles, Rabbi Leider has been a leading West Coast voice in the Jewish and multifaith community. She pioneered women's rabbinic leadership, while serving at Temple Beth Am in Los Angeles and Congregation Kol Shofar in Northern California. Rabbi Leider guides Jewish organizations with Insyte Partners, an international transformation consultancy. A graduate of the Institute for Jewish Spirituality's Clergy Leadership Program, she leads virtual daily meditations for

hundreds of seekers.

Rabbi Leider is recognized for her work in the area of social justice. Following a Rabbinical Assembly visit to Whitefish, Montana, in the wake of antisemitic trolling and threats to the Jewish community, she helped to found "Love Lives in Marin." Rabbi Leider is a leader on the Clergy Council of Roots, a unique network of Palestinians and Israelis living in the West Bank. She is a past Board member of the Industrial Areas Foundation, the nation's largest network of local faith and community-based organizations, and she participates in the Racial Justice Subcommittee of the Social Justice Commission of the Conservative Movement.

On Friday, at 7:45 pm, Rabbi Leider will lead a creative Shabbat experience, "Silence and Song in Enhancing Spirituality," exploring music modalities and meditation, drawing on her background in Fine Arts and voice. She will help participants rethink the use of different kinds of music and how to incorporate silence in our lives. This will be followed by at Oneg Shabbat Dessert Reception – an opportunity for delicious refreshments and delightful conversation.

On Saturday morning, Rabbi Leider will speak on "Becoming a Living Torah," drawing from her own personal experience to help participants think about themselves in deeper, more meaningful ways. The Shabbat morning service begins at 9:30 am

and is followed by a sumptuous Kiddush Luncheon.

During the weekend, Rabbi Leider will be in conversation with Rabbi J.B. Sacks, a local rabbinic figure and Beth Shalom member. Rabbi Sacks is the spiritual leader of Congregation Am HaYam in Ventura, CA and serves as Education Specialist for the Stories of Music Project at UCLA's Herb Alpert School of Music.

Rabbi Leider will lead a special Sunday

brunch session designed for Beth Shalom members only.

### **Jewish Pop Star Pink Shuts Down Anti-Hanukkah Commenter**

Pink, a Jewish pop star, was one of many to celebrate the first night of Hanukkah on December 7. On a photo Pink shared of her menorah, a



negative comment quickly came in accusing the star of being "tone deaf" for her post. Pink's response to the comment has since been applauded by many social media users.

Captioning her post on Instagram, Pink wrote "Happy [Hanukkah] to all those who celebrate. May there be light in darkness always. May there be peace in our hearts, our homes, and in the world." Pink's celebration of the ancient

Jewish tradition and calls for peace were not well received by everyone. One commenter, whom Pink later replied to, wrote "Really tone death in the current climate. But enjoy your holidays."

In response to the comment, Pink simply wrote: "tone deaf to be Jewish? Or alive? I'm confused."

The commenter later told Pink that it was tone deaf "to post about it. I said previously I have nothing against the celebrating of religion and/or holidays but posting it seems kind of oblivious to the current reality of the situation."

In the less than 24 hours that the post has been up, it has amassed over 350,000 likes.


### Feast of Jewish Learning Brought Fascinating Speakers to our Community







# After Backlash Over Silence, UN Women Tweets, Then Deletes, Statement Condemning Hamas Attack in Israel

Nearly 50 days after Hamas' attack on Israel left 1,200 dead, and after weeks of criticism over its silence about allegations of sexual violence during the xattack, the women's rights group UN Women issued a statement condemning the terror group on Friday.

Then it deleted the post.

"We condemn the brutal attacks by Hamas on October 7 and continue to call for the immediate and unconditional release of all hostages," read the initial statement, posted on UN Women's instagram page. It was soon replaced with a statement that dropped the condemnation of Hamas and only called for the release of the hostages.

Word spread quickly among Jewish women activists and Israelis, reigniting their contention that UN Women — an official arm of the United Nations focused on promoting gender equality and women's empowerment — holds a double standard when it comes to gender-based violence against Israeli women. Some of the critics — including Sheryl Sandberg, a former top Meta executive — have lobbied openly on the topic. Many have used the hashtag "#MeToo\_UNless\_UR A lew."

Reached for comment, UN Women told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the Instagram post had been scheduled in advance and was deleted because the message in it no longer reflected where the organization wanted to put its main focus.

"In any social media team managing multiple campaigns and during a very busy time like the one we are now with 16 Days of Activism, mistakes can occur," a representative for UN Women said in a statement sent to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

In particular, said the media specialist, the release of some hostages over the weekend as part of a temporary truce changed the organization's priorities.

"UN Women social media team had pre-planned days in advance [of] this particular post, but then the news broke on the release of hostages and we really wanted to focus on that," she said. "UN Women has condemned the attacks by Hamas and the deaths of Israeli civilians from the beginning as well as called for the release of hostages, and we will continue doing so until the conflict ends. We have also called for all allegations of gender-based violence to be rigorously investigated, prioritizing the rights, needs, and safety of those affected."

In late October, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a resolution calling for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza but voted down a provision condemning the Oct. 7 Hamas terrorist attacks. On Monday, Israel's parliament, the Knesset, held a session on crimes against humanity committed against women during the Oct. 7 massacre.

After an initial statement on Oct. 13 condemning the attacks on civilians in Israel, all of UN Women's public comments

about the war and its impact on women had centered only on Palestinians. Last week, Sima Bahous, the group's executive director, called for an extension of the current temporary truce into a permanent ceasefire and for the release of all hostages.

The National Council for Jewish Women, which had previously criticized UN Women's silence on sexual violence against Israeli women, said the group's second statement last week was inadequate.

"The delayed issuance of a statement that fails to explicitly address the severity of Hamas' terrorist attack on Israel — such as the brutal murder of over 1,200 people in Israel, torture, and rape of women, as well as the targeting of civilians and families — is equally reprehensible," the statement said. "Immediate and unequivocal acknowledgment of these atrocities is imperative, given the blatant violation of international law."

### Havurah of the Desert



As Jews we live in perilous and difficult times. It can feel like our world is on fire. Weathering these days and times, our sense of lewish community is essential. Of course it always has been, but more so now.

The Havurah of the Desert provides a supportive and friendly environment focused on Jewish beliefs, culture, and customs. The Havurah was formed in January 2019 to fill the need for more interpersonal cultural engagement. Over the past 5 years membership has nearly tripled and the Havurah continues to evolve in terms of activities and membership.

The Havurah does not try to serve as a substitute for religious services or traditional classes. Rather its strength relies on bringing lectures to the community and engaging with other groups, be they Jewish or Gentile. We host holiday and end of Shabbat gatherings, in the development of community and friendship.

As with all groups, the pandemic presented enormous challenges. The Havurah became adept at using Zoom to provide its members with meaningful connections. We had a weekly Havdalah followed by discussion of a film or program which everyone had previously been asked to watch. We sponsored Rabbi David Zaslow of Ashland OR to discuss his outstanding book, "Jesus, First Century Rabbi". The lecture was attended by clergy and parishoners of several Christian congregations. We were fortunate to have presented an in-person lecture by HIAS (Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society) dealing with their world wide effort to assist immigrants. We also sponsored a Zoom tour of the Tenement Museum in New York City, and a documentary film, Sturgeon Queens, on the famous appetizer store, Russ and Daughters, in New York.

Committed to the value of Tikkun Olam, members participate in local food pantry efforts, volunteer with other Jewish organizations, and the Havurah has had successful fund-raisers to support HAIS' efforts worldwide and to provide blankets and warm clothing for Ukranians during their harsh winter conditions.

The Havurah is open to Jews regardless of lifestyle or observance. Our goal is to be inclusive. The Havurah continues its monthly Shalom Book Club and holds a monthly member-led Havdalah service followed by a social evening, generally including a meal or dessert in various homes. We also have a sub-group that goes to supper at various restaurants on Wednesdays.

We are not formally affiliated





with any synagogue, so for services, members of the Havurah have found their own connections with additional Jewish institutions both locally and via livestreaming.

# To Replace Santos, NY GOP Taps Ethiopian-born, Orthodox IDF Veteran By Andrew Bernard, Jewish News Syndicate

New York Republicans selected Jewish heritage. Mazi Melesa Pilip, an Ethiopian-born, Orthodox Jew and Israel Defense Forces veteran, on December 14 to run for New York's 3rd Congressional District.

A current Nassau County legislator, Pilip is running for the seat that Republican Rep. George Santos held before being expelled from the U.S. House of Representatives, on December 1, following federal criminal indictments for fraud. It was also revealed that Santos had fabricated his backstory, including his supposed

Santos's inventions stand in dramatic contrast with Pilip's real-life biography. Born in Ethiopia, she emigrated to Israel as a refugee in 1991

as part of an Israeli operation to airlift Ethiopian Jews. She served in the IDF as a paratrooper before moving to the United States with her husband and becoming a U.S. citizen. A mother of seven, Pilip was first elected to the Nassau County legislature in 2021.

The New York 3rd district special election holds national significance, given how narrowly Republicans control the House. Following the expulsion of Santos, House Speaker Mike Johnson (R-La.) wields an eight-seat, fractious majority.

"Winning this battleground seat is critical to maintaining the GOP majority in the House of Representatives," Matt Brooks, CEO of the Republican Jewish Coalition, said in a statement. He endorsed Pilip, whom he called "a

remarkable candidate whose strength of character and firm principles are clear to anyone who looks at her life story and her work."

NY-03 was one of several Republican pickups in New York in the 2022 midterms, though Pilip will face a difficult challenger in the Democratic nominee, Tom Souzzi, who previously held the seat and has been a figure in Long Island politics for decades.

The special election will be held on February 13.

# Argentina's President-Elect, Javier Milei, Visits Lubavitcher Rabbi's Grave to Offer Thanks for his Surprise Victory

For his first trip abroad since being elected president of Argentina in mid-November, Javier Milei picked an auspicious destination: the tomb of the Lubavitcher rebbe in Queens, New York.

The site is a frequent pilgrimage location for Jews and others who believe there is special spiritual significance to prayers made at the burial place of Rabbi Menachem Mendel Schneerson, the last leader of the Chabad-Lubavitch movement.

Milei is Catholic, but his admiration for and engagement with Judaism runs deep. He studies with a rabbi in Buenos Aires, has quoted Torah passages in rallies and walked out on stage for a campaign event to a recording of a shofar. He has said he wishes to convert to Judaism but does not see Shabbat observance as compatible with running his country.

He last visited the rabbi's grave, known as the Ohel, in July during his campaign.

"I am going to be thankful because when I last visited this place, I asked

for courage, wisdom and temperance: wisdom to separate good from bad, courage to choose good, temperance to maintain myself in the position I have," Milei told the TV news channel LaNaciont.

"Also to accept the will of the Creator," he added. "The Creator put me in a place of maximum responsibility so I am going to thank and try to be up to the task."

The trip to the grave was Milei's second Jewish event since the far-right "anarcho-capitalist" was elected in a runoff November 19. On Saturday night, he participated in a havdalah ceremony to mark the end of Shabbat in Once, a Jewish neighborhood of Buenos

Aires, where he received blessings from the Kabbalistic Rabbi David Hanania Pinto.

For his trip to New York, Milei traveled with a few members of his future cabinet, as well as Marc Stanley, the U.S. ambassador to Argentina, and Gerardo Werthein, an Argentinean Jewish businessman who is rumored to be in the running to become Argentina's ambassador in Washington, D.C.

Another Argentinean Jewish businessman accompanied him to the rabbi's grave. Eduardo Elsztain is chairman and chief executive of IRSA, Argentina's largest real estate company, which manages the largest shopping malls in Buenos Aires. Elsztain, who was a protege of the Jewish financier George Soros, has also supported Chabad social programs and Jewish youth-related projects in Argentina.

Milei's inauguration is December 10. He has said he wants his first international trip as president to be to Israel, where he has vowed to move Argentina's embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem.

### 'Flip Your Diploma' Effort Responds to Failure to Curb Campus Antisemitism

Asaf Eyal, a graduate of Columbia University, has started a campaign to show his dissatisfaction with the administration's response to extreme antisemitism in the wake of the October 7 Hamas terrorist attacks in Israel.

In response to viral anti-Israel and anti-Jewish demonstrations at Columbia University in New York City, coupled with the lack of action by college presidents and other administrators, alumni have started an online effort to shame their alma maters' failed responses. That effort has now spread to other schools.

The "Flip Your Diploma" campaign calls on graduates who oppose their schools' inadequate responses to the rise in campus antisemitism to take a photo of themselves with their diploma turned upside-down.

The organizers of the effort urge others to "express your opprobrium of the institutional inversion of values and lack of moral clarity with a black-andwhite photo showing our upside-down diploma."

The campaign is sponsored by the Columbia Alumni Association and the SAFE Columbia chapter of SAFE CAMPUS.

A video about the campaign shows photos of those who have joined in, as well as video of protests on the Columbia campus featuring large crowds marching and chanting "intifada" and "from the river to the sea."

Victor Muslin, a promoter of the campaign, told JNS the campaign began with Asaf Eyal at Columbia, "but has been joined by alumni from more than a dozen major universities in the U.S. and at least one university abroad so far."

Muslin said to JNS that he was surprised how "alumni from different schools have picked up the campaign, even though it started as a purely Columbia initiative. Of course, now that it happened organically, we encourage it."

He said many people had told them privately that they wanted to participate

and agreed with the message, but "are afraid of retaliation." Muslin replied that it "surprised me because the campaign is so innocuous and non-confrontational. For me, this is a sad comment on the current illiberal cultural climate."

Participating schools include American University, Brandeis University, Cornell University, the University of Pennsylvania, Ohio State University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, among others.

### Jewish TikTok Employees Open Up About Antisemitism from Colleagues

In early December current Jewish and Israeli employees of TikTok opened up about facing antisemitism at the Chinese-owned social media company following the Hamas terrorist attacks on October 7 in southern Israel and the ensuing war between the Jewish state and the terror organization controlling Gaza.

The employees, who opted to stay anonymous, detailed to Fox Business being targeted by coworkers of the videosharing app with harassment and even calls to boycott companies and products related to Israel. They also said employees openly express antisemitic and anti-Israel sentiments on the company's internal chat system, Lark.

Screenshots obtained by Fox Business even show multiple TikTok employees celebrating the October 7 Hamas massacre and promoting the Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) movement against Israel. The screenshots also show that even after Jewish employees reported to their managers about feeling threatened, TikTok failed to address their concerns.

One employee said many Jews working at TikTok feel like the company "no longer has any control over the 40,000 moderators working to fact-check and remove content that is inflammatory, inciting, and simply incorrect." Another employee said, "The teams dealing with policy at TikTok have always been overwhelmingly staffed with

individuals who are openly hostile to Israel and whose opinions often blur the lines on antisemitism."

The same employee claimed that TikTok allows "the permissible posting of anything violent or gory relating to issues sympathetic to Palestinians. But when videos depicting evidence of atrocities against Jews are removed before the world can see them, we then feel that the world's most popular media platform is working against us as a people."

The Jewish employees who spoke to Fox Business all expressed similar sentiments that they have received insufficient support from senior management at TikTok in response to their concerns.

"Currently, the atmosphere for Jewish employees at TikTok is very difficult," said a Jewish employee based in the US. "We feel we were not provided with the relevant support that was afforded to our peers working in other tech companies at the outset of the conflict. We feel that we had to fight for recognition that something horrible had happened to us and fight for recognition of our very difficult feelings of insecurity."

The same employee said Jews working for the company feel they "should keep his or her head down far more than any other minority in terms of expressing themselves culturally or politically." In addition, the employee added, "many of us who expressed this to our [human resources] HR representatives were simply shrugged off."

A TikTok spokesperson denied the claims made by the employees, saying they "do not reflect the experience of the majority of our employees."

"TikTok has strong policies against discrimination and harassment in the workplace, and employees are encouraged to report their concerns – anonymously if they so choose," the spokesperson said to Fox Business. "Every incident is investigated by the appropriate internal team."

"Hateful ideologies, including antisemitism, are not and have never been allowed on our platform," the spokesperson added. "From Oct. 7 to Nov. 17, we have removed more than 1.1 million videos in the conflict region for breaking our rules, including content promoting Hamas, hate speech, terrorism and misinformation. Community guidelines are applied equally to all content, and our recommendation algorithm does not 'promote' one side of an issue over another."

In November, a group of more than 50 Jewish TikTok social media influencers, content creators, and celebrities blasted TikTok in an open letter for not doing more to counteract antisemitism and online hatred on the platform. Many of them — including Sacha Baron Cohen, Debra Messing, and Amy Schumer — then participated in a private video call with TikTok executives and accused the videosharing app of "creating the biggest antisemitic movement since the Nazis."

"There are Jews [working within TikTok and outside] who are trying to fight this antisemitism," said one of the employees who spoke to Fox Business. "But there are two problems. One is that people are afraid of losing jobs and are therefore not speaking out enough. The other problem is that those at the top do not really care about fighting this and are making no real effort to change it."

### Egypt, US Shoot Down Houthi Drones Aimed at Israel

US destroyer downed 14 drones launched by Yemen's Houthis in the Red Sea

A spokesman for Yemen's Iranianallied Houthis said the group had attacked the Israeli Red Sea resort city of Eilat on December 16 with a swarm of drones.

Egyptian air defense shot down a suspected drone off the Red Sea coast near the resort town of Dahab on Egypt>s eastern Sinai coast, two security sources said.

The security sources said the drone's origin was unknown.

Witnesses in Dahab said they saw an object fall into the water. They said they saw another flying object fall in the nearby mountains.

In late October, drones caused explosions that rocked two other Red Sea towns, which Israel said Yemen's Iranian-backed Houthi movement sent them to strike its territory.

A US guided-missile destroyer also shot down 14 drones launched by Yemen's Houthis in the Red Sea,

the US Central Command said in a statement.

"In the early morning hours of December 16 (Sanna time) the US Arliegh Burke-class guided missile destroyer USS CARNEY (DDG 64), operating in the Red Sea, successfully engaged 14 unmanned aerial systems launched as a drone wave from Houthi-controlled areas of Yemen," read the statement. "The UAS were assessed to be one-way

attack drones and were shot down with no damage to ships in the area or reported injuries. Regional Red Sea partners were alerted to the threat."

### Houthis threats against international shipping

Earlier in the day, the US military said attacks from Houthi-controlled Yemen struck two Liberian-flagged ships in the Bab al-Mandab Strait,

underlining the threat to vessels in shipping lanes being targeted by the Iran-aligned group.

Part of the Iran-aligned "Axis of Resistance", the Houthis have been attacking vessels in Red Sea shipping lanes and firing drones and missiles at Israel.

The Houthis, who rule much of Yemen, have said they will continue their attacks until Israel stops its offensive in the Gaza Strip.

### Academic Group Denounces National Women's Studies Association for Silence

A group of feminists and scholars at US universities has issued a searing open letter censuring the National Women's Studies Association (NWSA) for not condemning the rapes and other sexual violence perpetrated by Hamas terrorists during their deadly rampage across southern Israel on October 7.

The Section for Women Faculty of the Academic Engagement Network (AEN), a nonprofit that advocates academic freedom and open exchange in higher education, noted in its letter that since the Palestinian terror group's onslaught, the NWSA has issued two statements attacking Israel's military response, neither of which mentioned Hamas' female victims or the 240 people abducted as hostages to Gaza. Beyond the kidnappings, Hamas terrorists murdered 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and injured thousands more.

NWSA's silence, AEN argued, is a seismic moral failure. "We are outraged by the NWSA's abandonment of women and girls who have experienced horrible atrocities and by its utter refusal to acknowledge the plight of Israeli women and girls in either its recent programming or public statements," said the letter, which was shared with *The Algemeiner*. "The two statements that the NWSA released on October 11 and October 31 condemn Israel's military response to the Hamas

massacre yet fail to denounce the brutality of Hamas terrorists, who were given orders to rape."

It added that in refusing to condemn Hamas, NWSA alienated Jewish academics and students of women's studies — a problem, the group explained, that goes back to 2015, when NWSA endorsed the boycott, divestment, and sanctions (BDS) movement against Israel. The BDS movement seeks to isolate Israel from the international community as a step toward the Jewish state's eventual elimination.

"We are deeply concerned that on account of this indefensible position, Jewish scholars and students are now thoroughly ostracized from the association, and by extension, from the discipline of Gender Studies," the letter continued. "Jewish feminist engagement in the NWSA has been in decline for a number of years. The organization's professional standing has truly been diminished by its antisemitism."

Beyond the NWSA, women's groups and sexual assault centers on university campuses and even within the United Nations have been noticeably silent on well documented cases of Hamas terrorists raping Israeli girls and women, as well as other acts of sexual violence, during their Oct. 7 onslaught.

OnDecember 15, AEN executive director Miriam Elman stressed during a

conversation with *The Algemeiner* that recognizing the traumas Israeli women endured does not exclude advocating for Palestinian women whom Hamas denies basic economic and political freedoms through its enforcement of Sharia law.

"You can show empathy for Palestinian women and girls — and please do — because they are oppressed through subjugation and honor killings," Elman said. "Many in the section also want to say that they recognize that Palestinian women and girls are impacted by the war. You can do that and also recognize that Hamas systematically used rape as a weapon of war, condemn that, and call for the release women and girls who are still hostages Gaza"

She added, "There are still young women in their 20s and early 30s still being held hostage. G-d knows what has happened to them since being taken into captivity. NWSA has released two statements that did not say one word about these atrocities."

Feminist author Phyllis Chesler, a professor emerita of psychology and member of AEN's Section for Women Faculty—called NWSA's spurning of Jewish women "craven," adding that "women's studies has been more concerned with the alleged occupation of a country that never existed — Palestine — than with the real

occupation of women's bodies in Gaza and throughout the Arab world."

Founded in 1977 with help from a grant awarded by the Ford Foundation, the National Women's Studies Association is a professional academic society that claims to have over 300 members and institutional partnership with over 350 university academic departments. In recent years, its public statements have rarely addressed rising antisemitism in the US and across the world, doing so only after neo-Nazis marched through Charlottesville, Virginia in 2017. The group has, however, issued statements in support of Asian Americans, African Americans, and Palestinians.

"Palestinian solidarity is a feminist issue," NWSA said during Israel's 2021 war with Hamas while alleging that Israel has "perpetrated" sex crimes against Palestinian women.

Anti-Israel bias in professional academic societies has increased in recent years. Within a year, both the Middle Eastern Studies Association (MESA) and the American Anthropological Association (APA) endorsed the BDS movement, drawing criticism from scholars who condemned the decisions for being "shameful" and "profoundly destructive."

The problem also exists in prestigious post-graduate academic programs, Elman told *The Algemeiner*. She noted that over 100 scholars organized by her group recently issued a second letter denouncing the Fulbright Program, as well as the Fulbright Association, for not issuing any statements denouncing Hamas' atrocities on October 7, despite Hamas abducting one of its alumni, Israeli academic Shoshan Haran, and murdering her husband, sister, and brother-in-law.

The doucment also denounced a separate letter signed by nearly 1,000 Millennial and Generation-Z Fulbright Scholars, all but one of whom participated in the program during the 21st century, that accused Israel of committing genocide and did not reference the Hamas atrocities.

"Haran was an accomplished alumnus of Fulbright, and you can't say anything about her, you can't speak out, you can't say one sentence calling for her release? Their selectivity of empathy is unconscionable," Elman said. Commenting on the tendency of young scholars to be virulently anti-lsrael and to promote falsehoods about the Jewish state, she added, "It's very concerning that all these young scholars are so morally confused."



### Pew Poll: 50% of Democrats Blame Israel for War in Gaza Goldberg/Flash90)

More than twice as many Democrats (50%) as Republicans (21%) say that the Israeli government bears "a lot" of responsibility for the war against the Hamas terror organization in the Gaza Strip.

That's according to a new poll that the Pew Research Center conducted of 5,203 adults between Nov. 27 and Dec. 3.

Many more respondents said Hamas is to blame "a lot" (65%) and "a little" (9%) for the war than said the Israeli government is to blame "a lot" (35%) and "a little" (24%). Smaller numbers said the Palestinian people are to blame "a lot" (20%) and "a little" (29%), and that the Israeli people are responsible "a lot" (13%) and "a little" (28%).

It wasn't clear to what extent respondents took the question— "How much responsibility do each of the following have for Israel and Hamas currently being at war?"—to mean morally culpable or otherwise responsible.

Most Republicans and Republicanleaning independents (73%) and Democrats and those who lean Democrat (62%) said Hamas bears a lot of responsibility, per the survey. Nearly half (46%) of those ages 18 to 29 said that Hamas is very responsible for the war.

Pew also asked respondents about Jewhatred stateside. Nearly half (49%) of those who are or lean Democrat and nearly the same number (48%) of those who are or lean Republican are extremely concerned about increasing violence against U.S. Jews. Half of those who are or lean Democrat are extremely concerned about the war going on for a very long time, compared to 39% of those who are or lean Republican.

Nearly the same number of Democrats and Democrat-leaning Independents (45%) and Republicans and Republican-leaners (41%) worried greatly that the war would expand in the region. The gap was much wider for extreme concern about the war leading to terror attacks in the United States (48% from those on the right, 36% on the left) and to violence against Muslims stateside (53% on the left, 22% on the right).

Some 53% of Republicans are at least somewhat concerned about anti-Muslim violence potentially rising in the United States, while 46% weren't too concerned or concerned at all at that prospect. Just 15% of Democrats weren't concerned too much or at all.

More than four in 10 (41%) of respondents disapprove of the Biden administration's response to the Israeli-Hamas war, with 21% strongly disapproving. Some 35% approve, with



9% strongly approving. Nearly a quarter (24%) wasn't sure.

U.S. President Joe Biden's approval numbers varied among different groups. Most (51%) of those who are or lean Republican disapprove, with 27% disapproving strongly, compared to 33% of those who are or lean Democrat who disapprove, with 15% doing so strongly.

A little more than a quarter (28%) of those who are or lean Republican approve of how Biden is responding to the war, while 44% of those who are or lean Democrat approve, with 14% approving

strongly.

Age was also a factor. Seniors 65 and up approved at a rate of 50% (15% strongly) compared to 37% disapproval (17% strongly so). Those ages 18 to 29 largely disapproved (46%, 26% strongly so) compared to 19% who approved (5% strongly so), and 30- to 49-year-olds also disapproved (43%, 21% strongly) compared to approved (30%, 6% strongly).

A quarter of respondents think that Biden is striking the right balance in dealing with Israelis and Palestinians, while 21% think he favors Israelis too much, and 16% think he favors Palestinians too much. Some 38% weren't sure.

While 25% of respondents said Israel has the right approach in its military campaign in Gaza, 27% think it's going too far and 16% not far enough. Democrats and Democrat leaners (45%) were much likelier than Republicans and Republican leaners (12%) to reply "going too far."

A quarter of those who are or lean Republican think Israel isn't going far enough, while just eight percent of those who are or lean Democrat think that. Nearly one in five (18%) of those who are or lean Democrat think Israel has the right approach, compared to 34% of those who are or lean Republican.

More than half (52%) overall said a peaceful, two-state solution is possible, with those who are or lean Democrat (62%) considerably more likely to say that than are those who are or lean Republican (43%).

About a quarter overall (26%) said it is watching the war "very" or "extremely" closely.

### Oakland, California Coffee Shop Apologizes for Anti-Israel Employees Blocking lewish Woman from Bathroom with Antisemitic Graffiti

Farley's Coffee in Oakland, California, issued an apology on December 7 after three staffers at the family-owned coffee shop blocked a Jewish woman from using the store's restroom, which will filled with antisemitic graffiti, and later shared on social media, that

made anti-Israel comments.

The Jewish woman recorded a video,

showed employees at Farley's Coffee standing in front of the door to the bathroom and asking her to leave the shop. The employees did not want the woman to go inside the bathroom and record antisemitic graffiti that said "Zionism=Fascism," and also accused her of "misgendering" an employee.

In a statement posted on Instagram, Farley's Coffee insisted "we're not antisemitic," and said it is "committed to ongoing staff training" after the incident.

"We do not support hate speech; this does not reflect our values," the coffee shop said. "After a customer used the bathroom and wished to return to document the graffiti, they were initially denied access and then allowed to reenter to document the graffiti. The staff handled the situation poorly, and we apologize for this error and the distress caused to the customer."

The video recorded by the Jewish woman showed her repeatedly telling the three coffee shop staff members she wanted to use the restroom. One employee, seen wearing a yellow beanie and a face mask, told her: "This is a private property. I do need you to leave."

Another employee — wearing glasses, a black shirt, and a black apron — chimed in and said: "We've given you all your food. You've eaten, you're holding up s—t. I know Israel loves taking private property and saying it's their own, but we gotta head ..."

A third employee, who had dyed blue hair and was wearing a red face mask, remained silent during the ordeal but stood in front of the restroom's closed door.

### MIT President Called Out For 'Failure to Control Antisemitism' In Letter from Alumni

Hundreds of MIT alumni, particularly alumni and **lewish** have criticized the school's administration for supporting President Sally Kornbluth after her controversial congressional testimony.

argue that her failure They to address antisemitism has damaged MIT's reputation and urge concrete actions, including consequences for rule violations, the establishment of an antisemitism-specific task force, and a public announcement regarding expulsion for advocating violence against civilians.

The alumni seek assurance that calls for genocide against lewish students will be considered harassment and met with disciplinary action

The letter pointed to President Sally Kornbluth's testimony in Washington, where she "implied that calls for genocide of Jews may not constitute bullying and harassment under MIT's code of conduct, depending on context."

"Exactly what kind of message was the MIT Corporation trying to send to the MIT community, and especially its lewish members, with such a statement so at odds with the overwhelming majority of the public?" the letter presses.

"President Kornbluth's failure to control antisemitism on MIT's campus has distracted MIT's students and administration from MIT's core mission," the alumni wrote.

"We are alarmed to observe MIT earning a national reputation for antisemitism

on President Kornbluth's watch, rather than for academic excellence, and joining a group of ignominious universities currently struggling with antisemitism on their campuses."

"MIT's public reputation affects its ability to attract the best students, faculty candidates, and corporate research partners for its scientific work."

"Even in view of the disastrous congressional testimony by President Kornbluth, the executive board of the MIT Corporation chose to extend its full support to the President."

"Notably, President Kornbluth was the only University president that did not issue any apology or clarification in response to the intense backlash to her Congressional testimony," they wrote.

"We defy the MIT Corporation to find any other point of common agreement amongst these diverse public figures, or indeed any prominent public figure who found President Kornbluth's testimony from December 5, 2023 to be acceptable," they added.

The alumni pushed for the school to "enforce meaningful consequences for the individuals who violate MIT's rules, create an antisemitism-specific task force on campus, and publicly announce that calls for violence against civilians is grounds for expulsion and amend the MIT Code of Conduct to include this if necessary."

"We look forward to hearing about concrete actions that the MIT administration is taking to right this flailing ship and create a protected, supported, and safe environment for the entire MIT community without exception, and to reassure lewish students that calls for their

genocide are considered harassment at MIT and will be met with swift and meaningful disciplinary action," they

### Jerusalem Restaurants Chip in for War Effort

The Torah tells the story of how Abraham's servant Eliezer chose Rivka to be Isaac's wife, thus making her the matriarchal ancestor of the Jewish people. It was her act of kindness at a well that won him over. As if we did not know it, these past few weeks confirm that the Children of Israel have inherited Rivka's quality of kindness.

Taken by surprise on October 7, the country was unprepared for the thousands of homeless refugees from the Western Negev, and the hundreds of thousands of soldiers in the fighting force. Before the authorities could organize themselves to provide for the overwhelming numbers, restaurants all over Israel stepped up to do what they

do best: provide food.

These restaurants did not ask how they were going to do it and how they would pay for it. By the day after the attack, many restaurants had already transformed themselves from serving food at tables to providing packaged meals to soldiers and survivors. Suppliers donated raw ingredients, the kitchen staff cooked the meals, and an army of volunteers came to pack, load, and deliver the meals to soldiers and displaced citizens. This was Israel at its



### OpEd - Formalizing the Evil of Hamas - Clearly, Officially, and Openly - Analysis

If Israel does not complete its operation in Gaza, we will not be able to eradicate Hamas terrorism.

For seventy-five years, international media coverage of Israel has been, for the most part, asymmetrical, unfair, and hypocritical. For decades, the media has depicted Israel as the strong, Goliath-like conqueror and oppressor, and the Palestinians as the weak oppressed nation, in a comparison that is designed to automatically evoke sympathy for the Palestinian cause. Fake news and a lack of professionalism run rampant in today's media climate and prevent the truth from coming to light.

It is for these reasons that I firmly believe that Israel must obtain international legitimacy and approval for its just war against the Hamas terrorist regime, and the only impactful way of doing so is by presenting all of the evidence in its possession about the unbelievable atrocities committed by Hamas- clearly, officially, and openly through its highest offices - the prime minister, the president, and the IDF chief of General Staff. The battlefield of the 21st century extends far beyond the terror tunnels of Gaza. I am speaking about the battle of public perception in the global media.

I have stated the following on numerous occasions, and I reiterate: Israel has committed a serious error in judgment by not holding an official open-door media event for the foreign press aimed at publicly displaying and exposing the vile acts perpetrated by Hamas. Since the onset of the war, over 1,000 foreign correspondents have arrived in Israel to cover the aftermath of the October 7th attack and the events that followed. The fact that these journalists traveled far and wide should have been utilized by Israel's government to garner widespread support for its operation. This support is critical. The foreign journalists should have been invited to a massive public press event hosted by an official Israeli agency that their networks would surely broadcast live. They should have heard and seen firsthand, by Israeli officials and survivors, what happened here on Oct. 7th. They should have been provided with all the evidence in Israel's possession - the official, undeniable, horrifying documentation of the brutalities that occurred - and they should have published this evidence as part of their coverage of the war.

If we want to have a chance of reaching our two major war objectives – the complete elimination of Hamas and the return of all of our hostages- Israel must gain widespread international support from our allies and the moderate Arab world to see the operation through to the end.

Israel must publicly formalize the evil of Hamas, once and for all. It must shake the public sphere with a special press conference that would turn into a massive worldwide media event, live-streamed by all the major international networks, hosted by one of Israel's leaders, under the official capacity of their state office, presenting the official data, forensic pathology reports, the graphic videos, photo evidence, and live testimonies of survivors and released hostages. And I believe it is still not too late.

We have official autopsy reports from world-renowned forensic pathologists who assisted Israeli colleagues in identifying desecrated bodies and human remains- many of the victims burned, decapitated, mutilated, essentially unrecognizable. These reports paint a clear picture of what Hamas did, and the evidence is all there, in writing by the experts, ready for public review. We have video footage from security cameras taken from the streets and homes of the kibbutzim, and ambulance footage from the first responders, who are seen running around treating countless civilians and soldiers while under fire. We have security cam footage from the IDF bases that were infiltrated.

We know precisely what Hamas

did because we have go-pro and body cam footage from the terrorists captured and killed in Israel, and we have Israel Security Agency (Shin Bet) reports from the interrogations conducted with the

terrorists who survived. We have video from the body cams of IDF soldiers and the official forensics reports of the Israeli Police and law enforcement agencies. In short, we have ample sources of official, reliable, and undeniable information that cannot be contested by any government, agency, or human who views them. All this information must be displayed on the world stage.

The perfect example of how an official display of the evidence steers the public discourse in Israel's favor is the recent special session held at the United Nations this past Monday, aimed at publicly condemning and raising awareness for Hamas' sexual violence during the Oct. 7 massacre. The initiative, spearheaded by Israel's UN Ambassador Gilad Erdan, included graphic testimonies and records obtained during the Israeli Police investigations of what transpired in southern Israel- a compilation of over 700 testimonies from survivors and tens of thousands of videos that chronicle monstrous and shocking acts. Hamas terrorists raped and tortured many women and children in the southern Israeli communities. Some were raped to death, others gang-raped. Some

women were murdered and then raped. Bodies were dismembered, and some victims were beheaded.

### Formalizing the evil of Hamas – clearly, officially, and openly

All of this information was displayed at the UN conference via Israel's official channels, and it proved effective and highly successful. Israeli Police Chief Superintendent Yael Reichert described the violent acts that were committed. When a policewoman in full uniform, representing Israel's official security body, stands up on stage at an official global event and speaks of the harsh truth, presenting the evidence on record, the world listens.

She stated that what she reported was just "a portion of the shocking testimonies that prove the horrendous crimes against humanity. My life and our lives as women, as a mother and a police officer, will never be the same as before October 7." Another speaker said the bodies of many women raped and killed on Oct. 7 were almost unrecognizable.

Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand, former Facebook COO Sheryl Sandberg, and former Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton were among the women who addressed the special session and called out the global failure to support Israeli women. Sandberg said that "silence is complicity, and in the face of terror, we cannot be quiet."

The vast array of gruesome evidence of the depravity of Hamas was shown to an influential audience of diplomats, ambassadors, and members of women's organizations, and was broadcast to the world. The extensive coverage engendered by the UN Conference was also bolstered by the chilling testimonies from former hostages freed from captivity and returned to Israel, who have reported that they were starved, abused, drugged, and even branded with the exhaust pipes of a motorcycle to mark them as captives. These testimonies are so shocking that the international media simply cannot stay silent.

The UN session accomplished its mission, and the world's awareness of Hamas' atrocities has dramatically increased since Monday. The session

### Have A Nosh TU B'SHEVAT ...

It's All About the Fruit

There are fun recipes that translate well for Tu B'Shevat: recipes celebrating fruits from the many varieties of trees honored during this holiday. I must admit I do not remember where I got the roasted fruit salad recipe, below, but I've



had it for years and it is a inventive way to combine the foods we celebrate during this holiday. TU B'Shevat is January 24th this year ... plenty of time to gather the ingredients and try out some of these delicious recipes! (Note that the Turkish fruit compote must be made two days ahead). Enjoy! MHB.

### "PERENNIALS" ROASTED FRUIT SALAD

2 large apples, thickly sliced 1 large pear, thickly sliced 1/3 cup raisins 5 Medjool dates, cut into pieces 3/4 cup unsalted, raw chopped mixed nuts (suggest almonds and pistachios) 1/2 pomegranate, seeded

1/2-1 tablespoon pomegranate molasses 1 tablespoon olive oil Tiny pinch of cardamom Pinch of cinnamon Pinch of salt

Pre-heat oven to 400°F. Wash and thickly cut apples and pear. Line baking sheet or tray with parchment paper. Add fruit and drizzle with olive oil. Add cinnamon, cardamom and salt. Roast for approximately 45-60 minutes until soft, lightly browned. In the last 20 minutes, add chopped dates. In the last 5-10 minutes, add raisins. While fruit is roasting, toast nuts until browned. Cut and seed pomegranate. Remove fruit

from oven. Let sit for a couple of minutes, then transfer fruit to serving platter. Fold in nuts. Add pomegranate seeds and drizzle pomegranate molasses over top. Serve warm. Serves 2 to 4.

### TU B'SHEVAT TRUFFLES

1 cup dried figs (suggest mixture of Calimyrna and mission figs) 1 cup raw almonds ¼ cup honey 2 tablespoons carob powder (if not available, used cocoa powder) 1 teaspoon cinnamon Pinch of sea salt ½ cup turbinado sugar

Toast almonds in 350 degree oven until fragrant. Remove pits from dates and add to food processor along with figs and almonds. Process until finely chopped. Add honey, carob (or cocoa) powder, cinnamon, and sea salt. Pulse several times until the mixture begins to clump together and pull away from the sides of the bowl. Roll into bite-size balls and dip into turbinado sugar. Serve immediately or refrigerate for up to one month.

### **FIG-GINGER BALLS**

2 cups dried black mission figs\* (about 8 oz)

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon ground cinnamon 1 Tablespoon honey.

1/4 cup crystallized ginger (about 2 oz)

Remove the stems from the figs and discard. Coarsely chunk the figs and put in a food processor with the crystallized ginger, cinnamon and honey. Pulse until ingredients are finely chopped but not processed into a paste. Roll the fig mixture into heaping teaspoon sized balls. Makes about 18 balls. \*Other figs will work as well.

### **TURKISH DRIED FRUIT COMPOTE**

½ cup dried cranberries 1 cup dried apricots (6 ounces) 4 ounces pitted prunes

2 tablespoons pine nuts 2/3 cup slivered almonds 3 tablespoons honey 3 tablespoons rosewater

2/3 cup golden raisins 7 ounce package figs-cut into quarters

Pour all dry ingredients into a mixing bowl. Pour honey and rosewater over fruit and nuts. Mix well. Cover all ingredients with water. Mix well. Cover mixing bowl and refrigerate for two days. Serve fruit compote chilled.

and its contents made headlines in all major global news outlets, including a cover story in The Sunday Times, the United Kingdom's newspaper of record, which featured the testimonies of the survivors of the Oct 7th in advance of the UN conference. John Spencer, the head of the Modern War Institute's Urban Warfare Studies Department, posted a thread on X this week about the Hamas atrocities that received over 15 million views. When official agencies work on a high level and invest in a major public display to get an important message through to the world, these are the results.

Information about sexual abuse by Hamas has been underplayed and underreported by international women's organizations. As a woman who worked closely with world leaders on global issues, and in my role as chief strategic advisor to Israel's ninth President Shimon Peres, I met influential and well-respected female leaders, from the late Queen Elizabeth to the former Chancellor of Germany Angela Merkel. I witnessed, firsthand, the strength that women possess, and how they can move mountains and change the world. I am ashamed of the silence of international women's rights organizations. They know the facts, and they still choose silence, failing to condemn Hamas. The silence of women is no less severe than the silence of men - perhaps, it is even worse, and they should know when a red line has been crossed and speak up in the harshest tone.

Today is the first day of Hanukkah, and from my perspective, the UN event, led by Ambassador Erdan, that officially publicized what happened in Gaza is the "first light" of Hanukkah, enlightening the world with the truth about what Israeli women endured. It has managed to change the discourse around the world. We need more events of this type that will formally and officially release the details of the massacre.

While it is true that Israel has presented the evidence to world leaders such as President Biden, US Secretary of State Blinken, UK Prime Minister Sunak, and French President Macron, it is not enough. Showing evidence behind closed doors is ineffective, and releasing small snippets on social media is counterproductive, as some might think that the footage was staged or fake.

Some will say that we should be considerate of the sensitivities of readers around the world and spare them the chilling and gory details. We cannot do that. If we do not tell the world exactly what happened, these horrors will likely visit their children, because the terror of Hamas-ISIS is spreading across the globe.

After the success of the UN event, I believe that the US Congress should be the next big stage to showcase the horrors of the Hamas attack to the world. As Israel's closest ally, and as the world's greatest superpower and force for good, the United States has a special role to play in exposing the truth and facilitating Israel in garnering international legitimacy. The most effective way to do this is for the US to hold a special joint session of Congress in the Chamber of the House, or a special open-door congressional committee hearing, centered on displaying official evidence of the October 7th massacre to US leadership, US lawmakers from both chambers and to the entire world, who will surely be watching and reading about the contents of this historic session and the reactions of the congressmembers who were there to witness it in person.

Israel has the hard evidence, and it can easily provide groundbreaking materials to US Congress- evidence that would leave the world astounded and horrified. Israeli officials dealing with hostages and survivors can facilitate bringing brave individuals to give live testimonies of survival, abuse, rape, and torture on center stage. Israel must bring its top officials and leadership to present this documentation of horror to its allies in Congress. There will not be a dry eye in the room when this happens. America, as the world's leading superpower and a beacon of values, morality, and justice, must do this for the sake of the entire world.

The world must realize that the atrocities that Hamas committed were not perpetrated because of a land dispute, or because Israel conquered Gaza. Israel withdrew from Gaza in 2005. Hamas wants the world to think that their actions took place as a response to Israel's rule over Gaza, which is simply untrue. They attacked because of their fanaticism. If we do not expose the truth about Hamas in a big way, if Israel doesn't complete its operation in Gaza, the threat of Hamas terrorism will not be eradicated from the world.
